Jurisdiction Spotlight: City of Alexandria

The City of Alexandria Department of Community and Human Services has retained their resource parents by being proactive, professional and thorough in their approach. From community recruitment to orientation, training, and home assessment, parents who agree to be a resource for the City of Alexandria are aware of the expectation the city has of them. Now this jurisdiction is focused on supporting the families who have agreed to support the agency by launching CARPA, City of Alexandria Resource Parent Association.

The mission of CARPA is to better connect resource families with one another so they can exchange ideas, vent as needed, and support each another. CARPA will be organically developed by the parents themselves with an emphasis on the group's first four goals: to establish monthly meetings, develop and distribute a resource parent directory, generate a computer list serve group, and to create a CARPA website: www.carpava.org.

As a whole, the City of Alexandria is making headway with building CARPA. Along with support from staff at the agency, three motivated parents who volunteered are spearheading the effort. The very first support group is scheduled to meet later this month. The first meeting will focus on the topic of *compassion fatigue*, but the format will be open to allow for free discussions of the issues most relevant to those in attendance.

In addition to launching their first association for their current resource parents, the City of Alexandria has been busy ensuring that their waiting children have permanent parents. This jurisdiction celebrated the finalization of 34 adoptions this year (the highest number of finalized adoptions within one year ever), and the identification of permanent homes for all of their children. For the first time in recent memory, they have *no* waiting children.

There are three key strategies that have contributed to Alexandria's success. First, the city has a designated adoptive home recruiter who partners with adoption social workers to develop a recruitment plan and materials that best reflect the types of families needed for waiting children. Secondly, supervisors within the Foster Care and Adoption Units meet monthly to review cases and assign concurrent workers. Finally, they purposefully look at placement decisions at different times throughout the case to make sure that the child's placement meets their needs. Staff also credit their success to the tremendous attention the city gives to the child's first placement. If a child cannot be safely reunified, ideally their first placement will be their last placement. Of the 34 adoptions Alexandria had this year, 12 children were adopted by their resource families, 5 were relative adoptions, and 7 families were recruited from outside of the agency.

With a strong beginning to the foster parent association, a beautiful ending for 34 children who were adopted this year, and the identification of permanent homes for all of the city's waiting foster children, this jurisdiction has an awful lot to be thankful for this November. Their synchronized teamwork should be celebrated.

Wednesday's Child Success: A Social Worker's Perspective

Shanda Carr was very excited to feature a beautiful 5 year old named Katrina on Wednesday's Child. Shanda, a Recruitment Social Worker for Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA) in the District of Columbia, was having trouble finding an adoptive

family for the little girl because of a medical issue. Shanda was very optimistic though that a feature on Wednesday's Child would vield results for little Katrina.

Katrina's taping was filmed in January 2010. The filming centered around a fancy tea party held at the Ritz Carlton in Pentagon City. The hotel provided Katrina with a princess dress for the

special occasion. The dress was all pink, (Katrina's favorite color), curls fell to her shoulders, and her smile could have lit up the world. Staff at the Ritz Carlton, especially Angella Reid and Julie Matos, made Katrina feel like the little princess she is. They showered her with dainty treats and lady-like conversation. Shanda had no doubt that numerous inquiries would be received for Katrina, given how adorable and loveable she is, and the camera only illuminated her preciousness.

Along with the inclement weather during January, staff at the Council of Governments (COG) experienced a storm of our own after Katrina's segment aired. COG staff, who answers and returns 100% of the calls to 1-88-TO-ADOPT-ME received over 200 calls and emails for Katrina. All inquiries were pre-screened by COG staff. COG alerted CFSA to follow-up on each inquiry, and receive more insight on the family's preparedness to adopt Katrina. In turn, Shanda spent hours filtering through

copious home studies and speaking with the families who were definitely appropriate for Katrina. Needless-to-say, the thought of making one selection was challenging.

A final decision was made. The family selected is not only loving and nurturing, but is extremely dependable and committed to Katrina's care. There is no doubt that this family will meet Katrina's needs on all levels forever.

Today, Katrina couldn't be happier! Shanda recently learned that Katrina picked out a princess bed for her new room, and that she loves having a big sister, and a new puppy in the home. Finally a family was able to see beyond Katrina's medical issue to notice this lovely little girl anxious for a family. Thanks to the Wednesday's Child feature, and the Council of Governments efforts before and after the feature, this little princess has her forever family.
