
Who We Are


Promoting policies at the state and local level that support solar access for underserved communities, and ensuring that equity is a driving principle in the transition to a clean energy economy

District of Columbia Policy



- 2016 Renewable Portfolio Standard bill established DC's Solar for All Program
 - Target is to provide solar to 100,000 low-income households and reduce their energy bills 50% by 2032
 - Funded by the Renewable Energy Development Fund (RPS Alternative Compliance Payments)
- Year 1 competitive grant process and expansion programs
 - Solar Works DC (GRID, DOEE, DOES)
- Year 2 developed by DCSEU, with DOEE approval
 - DCSEU's Request for Proposals submission period recently closed

District of Columbia Policy






- CleanEnergy Omnibus Amendments Act of 2018 passed in DC Council
 - Doubles RPS from 50% to 100% by 2032
 - Increases solar carve-out
 - Directs some additional funding to low-income renewable energy, efficiency, workforce development
 - Building energy efficiency/clean energy standards applicable to existing (larger) buildings
 - Some transportation provisions
- GRID testified in support, with requests for a few changes to improve equity, solar market
- This bill is expected to take effect in spring 2019

Virginia Policy



Governor's 2018 Energy Plan

- Recommends raising net metering cap, allowing thirdparty PPAs, and expanding community solar
- Little focus on LMI



Legislation in 2019 session TBD

- Solar Rights bills HB2329, SB1456
- Other clean energy and green jobs bills
- GRID will be in Richmond with our partners to advocate for Virginia to jump-start its renewable energy future!

Maryland Policy



Years 2-3 of Community Solar Energy Generating System (CSEGS) pilot program

- LMI carve-outs
- Additional incentives
- Income verification issues

RPS legislation to be re-introduced in 2019

- "Clean Energy Jobs Act"
- Doubling from 25% to 50% by 2030
- Legislature overrode Governor Hogan's veto of last RPS increase to 25% in 2017
- GRID was, and will be, in Annapolis with our partners to advocate for Maryland to regain its leadership in solar policy and increase equity!

Key Take-Aways

- Well-designed programs can overcome the solar adoption barriers facing low-income families, while ensuring consumer protection and broader community benefits
- Long-term vision to develop a sustainable low-income market segment
- Long-term financial commitment, while being creative about looking at different funding sources
- Comprehensive strategy that integrates low-income energy efficiency and workforce development programs
- Working with mission-aligned partners and community members is essential to program success
