

The Morningstar Foundation's DC Investments

- Between 2018 and 2022, The Morningstar Foundation made nearly \$30 million in philanthropic investments in the District. Key areas of funding include:
 - Support for emergency food needs, which drastically increased during COVID;
 - Programs seeking to alleviate poverty;
 - Out-of-school-time programs;
 - Support for communal institutions and programs.
- New in 2022: \$1 million per year for The Food Gap Project, a new initiative largely supporting District small businesses and NGOs.
- The Morningstar Foundation is committed to investing another \$2 million over the next two years in The Food Gap Project.

The Food Gap Project

Conducted expert interviews with DC-region food system stakeholders and identified a gap of support for 'Medium-Term' needs (6 months to 3 years).

Developed three priority areas to address, in addition to existing investments in emergency food distribution.

In cooperation with key partners like DC Central Kitchen, Martha's Table,
Dreaming Out Loud, Capital Impact Partners and others, these priority areas include:

Economic strengthening to address food/nutrition security.

Infrastructure, specifically cold storage.

Regional food policy council collaboration.

From Cold Storage to Keeping it Cool (Year 1)

Launched the *Keeping it Cool* grant program based on the success of Nourish DC and the emerging need for cold storage infrastructure.

Keeping it Cool is a \$500,000 investment in cold storage infrastructure for businesses and NGOs, including technical assistance.

Application demand demonstrated the significant needs across the food system including food production, corner stores, etc.

Keeping it Cool received \$12.6 million in requests (and 312 applications) during the first grant round with a mix of NGOs and small food businesses.


Of this \$12.6 million in grant requests, nearly \$7 million was from DC entities.





Keeping It Cool Grant – Year 2 – Narrower Scope




Total Applicants






