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

In Memoriam:

Ron Kirby

Following the death of our friend and colleague, Ron Kirby, the Council of Governments received tributes about him from the many groups and individuals he touched throughout his life. They include current and former staff members, elected officials, government managers, business and advocacy organizations, transportation experts, journalists, and citizens. Among the accolades, Ron has regularly been described as a brilliant man, consummate professional, trusted colleague, and fair and thoughtful manager.

For 26 years as COG Director of Transportation Planning, Ron led staff in supporting transportation decision-making in the region, whether by collecting, analyzing, and sharing data, convening conferences where officials and the public could share their ideas about transportation, or any number of other planning and outreach activities. In his time here, Ron solidified the role of the Transportation Planning Board, and that of the Council of Governments more broadly, as a forum for regional dialogue, discussion, and consensus-building.

Ron had a keen desire and ability to help everyone—staff, elected officials, the media, and engaged citizens—better understand the transportation challenges and opportunities facing the region, so that we might make more informed decisions about our shared future. He was also an active leader in national transportation research and policy organizations, like the Transportation Research Board and the Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations, a group he helped found in 1994.

COG has created a new award in honor of Ron: the Ronald F. Kirby Award for Collaborative Leadership. The award will recognize non-elected government officials, such as city and county managers and department directors who have demonstrated a commitment to working with other leaders and stakeholders to solve problems and make this region a better place. We are committed to further honoring his legacy by continuing the exceptional work at COG and the TPB during this critical time for regional transportation planning.

2013 Annual Meeting and Awards Luncheon

Bruce Katz, Vice President and Founding Director of the Metropolitan Policy Program at the Brookings Institution, told over 200 D.C. area



officials at the 2013 COG Annual Meeting that metropolitan regions, rather than the federal government, will play the lead role in shaping the 21st century economy. Katz said the D.C. region was a leader in smart land use, sustainable development, and transportation. He said the region's top challenge, as home to the nation's capital, will be adjusting to a future with less support from the federal government.

COG Executive Director Chuck Bean said officials were very pleased to hear Bruce Katz's message in support of regional cooperation and innovation, which aligns closely with our Region Forward vision and Economy Forward plan. Bean went on to say that in 2014, the Council of Governments, its member governments and partners will continue to build on our many competitive advantages, such as the Metro system and vibrant Activity Centers.



Crafting a landmark, cross-border water agreement

egionalism at its best. That's how area leaders described a new multi-jurisdictional agreement to support the world's largest advanced wastewater treatment plant, the Blue Plains plant in Washington, D.C. The Blue Plains Intermunicipal Agreement (IMA) ensures service for more than 2 million area residents and 18 million annual visitors, cleaner rivers, and a healthier Chesapeake Bay.

Area leaders announced the pact at the May COG Board of Directors meeting, which included District of Columbia Mayor Vincent Gray, Fairfax County Chairman Sharon Bulova, Montgomery County Executive Isiah Leggett, Montgomery County Chief Administrative Officer Timothy Firestine, and Bradford Seamon, Prince George's County Chief Administrative Officer, representing County Executive Rushern Baker. The four jurisdictions are parties to the agreement along with two utilities, DC Water and the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission.

The agreement determines how participants will share the plant's capital and operating costs, which total more than \$800 million annually. The IMA also provides a sound base for economic and land use planning for generations in our growing region. Reaching the agreement was a long journey, and every step of the way, COG assisted in its development and will continue to support its members with implementation.

Ensuring healthier air

f it's summer in the DC area, it's probably going to be hot. But it's now less certain that hot days will be unhealthy air quality days thanks to the work of area governments and the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee, which coordinates regional air quality planning. On hot, sunny days, dangerous levels of ozone can occur at ground level. Ozone pollution can cause shortness of breath, coughing and a litany of other health problems.

This year out of 18 days above 90 degrees, only 4 were Code Orange levels—unhealthy to sensitive groups—and none were Code Red, the level of ozone pollution that negatively affects even people in good health. During a September air quality meeting, District of Columbia Council Chairman and MWAQC Vice Chairman Phil Mendelson said that 2013 was the cleanest summer since 2009. COG experts also pointed out a trend since 2006 of fewer unhealthy days during hot weather.

Federal, state and local actions, including regulations to reduce emissions from power plants, passenger vehicles, and large diesel trucks




have contributed significantly to the reduction in ozone. Officials also noted that Clean Air Partners—a partnership between COG and the Baltimore Metropolitan Council—contributed to this accomplishment by educating the public about pollution and encouraging people to take action to protect their health and clean the air.

Designing greener roadways

rea officials are exploring several strategies to reduce stormwater runoff, which can carry trash, oil, and other road-related pollutants into nearby waterways. One strategy being considered by an increasing number of governments is adding "Green Street" features like rain gardens to the medians and sides of streets along with planting trees and introducing permeable pavement. Green Streets reduce the effects of stormwater runoff and urban heat islands

by capturing water before it can enter storm drains.

In response to a request from the Anacostia Watershed Restoration Partnership, the Transportation Planning Board at COG began developing a regional Green Streets policy. The TPB convened a workshop in April 2013 of more than 90 people from area transportation and environmental agencies or other interested individuals to discuss the challenges and opportunities associated with implementing Green Streets treatments. In February 2014,

the TPB approved a regional Green Streets policy encouraging local jurisdictions to improve both environmental quality and street aesthetics with cost-effective green upgrades.

The recent focus on Green Streets follows the May 2012 adoption of a regional Complete Streets policy, which encourages local jurisdictions to promote the safe integration of multiple transportation modes on new and existing roadways.



Supporting solar power initiatives

n increasing amount of the sun's free and bountiful energy is being captured in the D.C. area thanks to a variety of local, state, and federal actions. To support the further adoption of solar power across the region, COG is working on several new initiatives.

Through the U.S. Department of Energy SunShot Initiative Rooftop Solar Challenge program, COG has partnered with two teams to reduce regulations and lower costs for rooftop solar systems. On the Solar Ready II project, COG, the Mid-America Regional Council (Kansas

City area), the National Association of Regional Councils, and Meister Consultants Group, are working with eight other regions to share and implement solar best management practices, training materials and methods. Solar Ready II will help the region diversify its energy options, improve the region's energy resilience, and increase the region's economic competitiveness with others. COG is also working with Optony, a solar research and consulting firm, to encourage area governments to join the

online Solar Roadmap platform that connects governments, utilities and consumers with the nation's largest resource library of solar best practices and online tools.

In addition, COG is working with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Green Power Partnership on solar bulk purchasing, which will reduce up-front costs by bundling projects for local governments. This effort led to governments assessing their solar potential and has spurred new solar system purchases.

Preparing for 1.6 million new residents

magine if everyone living in Philadelphia were to move to our region. While this won't happen overnight, COG forecasts 1.6 million more residents by 2040. The best way to accommodate this significant influx of people will be to encourage more growth in the region's business and residential hubs. And by encouraging non-car travel with housing, jobs, and amenities close together, these "Activity Centers" reduce demand on highways and make good use of our existing transit system.

Area leaders like Arlington County Vice Chair Mary Hynes, who serves as Chair of COG's Region Forward Coalition, have been committed to making Activity Centers all they can be in recent years. Centers were a major focus in both the Region Forward vision plan and Economy Forward competitiveness plan. In January 2013, COG and area governments unveiled a new map of 141 Centers identifying them as the region's priority areas for growth.


COG followed up this work with *Place + Opportunity*, a new report to inform officials on planning and development actions by offering strategies tailored to different types of Centers. While these places come in various shapes and sizes, some communities share common challenges and could benefit from similar initiatives. The report, which

was adopted by the COG Board in January 2014, studied and grouped 92 Activity Centers.

Moving forward, COG is working with member governments and private sector organizations, such as the Urban Land Institute-Washington, to help area leaders address development challenges and create stronger Centers.


Identifying transportation priorities


iven our region's continued growth and a future of limited funding options, the Transportation Planning Board at COG undertook an effort to identify the region's top transportation priorities that are within reach both politically and financially. This effort was further supported by Economy Forward, which stressed that smart investments in transportation are critical to the region's competitiveness.

The TPB developed the Regional Transportation Priorities Plan to inform decision-makers as they set budgets and consider projects for the Constrained Long-Range Plan, the federally-mandated list of all projects and programs the region can afford to build, maintain and operate in coming decades.

The Priorities Plan, which was approved by the TPB in January 2014, was guided by the TPB's technical work as well as extensive public outreach and stakeholder feedback. It identifies strategies in three priority areas: maintaining the existing transportation system; focusing on fairness, efficiency, and transparency to strengthen public confidence; and moving more people and goods more efficiently.

The plan emphasizes that maintaining the transportation system we already have is the foundation for any improvement we make in the

Involving people in transportation decision-making

ransportation decisions are made every day at many different levels of government. In our complex region, it can be difficult to understand how and where these take place, so the Transportation Planning Board developed the Transportation Planning Information Hub. The website explains the different planning processes at the state, local, and regional levels, and the unique role that the TPB plays in pulling it all together.

The website stresses that public involvement is a key part of the decision-making process and provides links to various opportunities for people to get involved. In addition to the planning processes, the website highlights high-profile projects in the region. This section includes projects already in the TPB's Constrained Long-Range Plan, such as the Purple Line in Maryland and the Frederick Douglass Memorial Bridge in the District of Columbia, as well as projects that do not yet have funding plans or anticipated funding sources identified, such as Metrorail extensions to Centerville or Potomac Mills in Virginia.






The Info Hub lists comprehensive plans like Frederick County's Comprehensive Plan, city, county, and state-wide transportation plans like Arlington County's Master Transportation Plan, as well as information on who operates and maintains area road and transit systems.

61 percent of participants in the public acceptability study expressed the most support for pricing at least one lane on all area highways.

57 percent of participants also supported increasing gas taxes to pay for transportation.

27 percent of participants in **Commuter Connections' 2013 State of the Commute Survey** reported working from home or working remotely "at least occasionally," up from 18 percent in 2006.

DC area workers commuting on public transit increased almost 4 percent—from 11.8 to 15.4 percent—over the past decade, according to an analysis of Census and TPB data.

Seeing our transportation future

rea officials, stakeholders, and reporters turn to the Transportation Planning Board at COG as the go-to source for regional transportation information. In 2013, the TPB released a wide range of data, analyses, and studies, including the results of a survey of household travel in specific communities, a Commuter Connections survey of regional commuting behavior, an analysis showing a decline in driving per person in the region between 2005 and 2011, and an analysis of TPB and Census data showing a significant increase in transit commuting over the past decade.

The TPB also released the findings of a study of the public acceptability of congestion pricing. The study, carried out in partnership with the Brookings Institution, was funded through the Federal Highway Administration's Value Pricing Pilot Program. Using deliberative forums, the researchers engaged more than 300 area residents in extended discussions about their views on three potential pricing scenarios: priced lanes on all major highways, pricing on all roads and streets using vehicle-based GPS systems, and priced zones for entering designated areas, similar to pricing systems in London and other cities.

Focusing on health needs for diverse populations

n 2013, the Council of Governments focused several health initiatives on some of the region's growing population groups including Latinos and older adults. To discuss factors that affect access to healthcare for area Latinos, Arlington County Board Chair Walter Tejada, Montgomery County Council President Nancy Navarro, and the District of Columbia's Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services Beatriz "BB" Otero worked together with COG to host a Regional Latino Health Forum in September. The forum brought together about one hundred participants, including elected officials, government health directors, service providers, and other community stakeholders.

In November, COG held a special panel on age-friendly initiatives at the November Human Services and Public Safety Policy Committee. Officials from government agencies on aging and The George

> Washington University led the discussion. As an increasing number of older residents choose to age-in-place—and many are attracted to the region's walkable Activity Centers—area officials are planning accordingly in regards to health services, public safety, and transportation.

As with many successful COG events, people exchanged information, best practices, and business cards and made connections across jurisdictions and disciplines.

Enhancing emergency communications

fter a powerful thunderstorm rolled through the region in the summer of 2012, 9-1-1 emergency call centers in Fairfax County, Prince William County, and the Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park experienced a complete failure of their connections provided by Verizon's 9-1-1 and telephone services, while additional jurisdictions experienced a partial failure of these services. The widespread outage drew attention to the vital role of emergency communications and prompted swift action by Sharon Bulova, Chairman of Fairfax County's Board of Supervisors, and other leaders at COG.

In March 2013, the COG Board of Directors approved a report calling on Verizon to take actions to prevent outages to 9-1-1. The report also urged Verizon's regulators, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and state commissions, to establish service level agreements to ensure 9-1-1 reliability and continuity. To ensure continued coordination. the COG Board also established a permanent committee of 9-1-1 directors to continue working with Verizon and the regulatory bodies.

Final Report 9-1-1 Service Gaps During & Following the Derecho Storm on June 29, 2012

The FCC adopted rules in December to hold 9-1-1 service providers accountable for providing reliable and resilient telecommunications services to both citizens and the 9-1-1 Call Centers. This historic action was informed by COG's work and showed the power of regional collaboration to help spark progress.

Strengthening the region's emergency preparedness

t the Council of Governments September 2013 meeting, a panel of area leaders discussed how governments, non-profits, and private partners have worked together to strengthen the region's emergency preparedness in the twelve years since the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

The panel said major improvements are being made by COG Public Safety, Emergency Management, and other committees by making the best use of approximately \$50 million in Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) funds that are provided to the region annually by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. The funds have helped purchase new equipment and trainings for first responders and tactical teams as well as emergency management software, text message alert

> systems, and patient tracking and disease surveillance systems at hospitals.

> > In November, the National Capital Region Emergency Preparedness Council convened a seminar of over 100 high-level officials to discuss how to prepare and respond to cyber threats in the Washington area. Information discussed during this Senior Leaders Seminar will be used to inform cyber security planning being developed for the region.

Helping members save on goods and commodities









uel, heating oil, natural gas, paper, and road de-icing salt. All are in-demand commodities by area governments and agencies. And through volume buying through the regional Cooperative Purchasing Program, COG members can save millions. In 2013, the COG Board approved a new partnership with the Baltimore Metropolitan Council to merge cooperative purchasing and expand our purchasing power.

Another valuable service of the Purchasing Program is COG's Purchasing Rider, which expedites orders and secures lower prices. Members save money on administrative expenses by substantially reducing the paperwork associated with competitive procurement.

COG also now hosts a clearinghouse of local government solicitations that is automatically populated and accessed by hundreds of vendors in the region. In addition, area leaders on COG's Climate Energy and Environment Policy Committee have urged the creation a new sustainable purchasing program. COG has coordinated recent trainings on buying products like energy efficient lighting, copy paper, and toner cartridges and is working to also incorporate sustainable purchasing into the overall Cooperative Purchasing Program.










Loudoun County, for example, has used the COG Purchasing Rider 57 times last year, saving significant staff time and resources and offering the **County access to more** competitive pricing.

FY 2013 Budget Highlights



COG's membership is comprised of 300 elected officials from 22 local governments, the Maryland and Virginia state legislatures, and U.S. Congress.

Policies are set through the COG Board of Directors, the National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board, and the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee. These three boards are responsible for a broad range of issues under the COG umbrella. Supporting committees help shape programs through the dedicated work of a wide array of public servants, from police chiefs to social workers.

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Transportation Planning Board (TPB)

he National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board (TPB) is the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the region, and plays an important role as the regional forum for transportation planning. The TPB is responsible for developing regional transportation policy and a long-range transportation plan for the metropolitan Washington region, as well as programs that the federal government must approve in order for federal-aid transportation funds to flow to the area. The TPB was created in 1965 by an agreement among local governments and the state departments of transportation in response to the requirements of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1962. In July 1966, by mutual agreement, the TPB became associated with COG. The TPB meets monthly and has a public comment period during each meeting.



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Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee (MWAQC)

he Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee (MWAQC) is the entity certified by the mayor of the District of Columbia and the governors of Maryland and Virginia to prepare an air quality plan for the Washington Metropolitan Area under the Federal Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990. In executing its responsibilities, MWAQC coordinates air quality planning activities among COG and other external committees and the Transportation Planning Board, reviews policies, resolves policy differences, and adopts a regional air quality plan for transmittal to the District of Columbia and the states of Maryland and Virginia. MWAQC meets five times a year and has a public comment period during each meeting.



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COG Policy Committees and Advisory Bodies

Chesapeake Bay and Water Resources Policy Committee (CBPC)

CBPC advises the COG Board on the Chesapeake Bay Program activities and other regional water quality issues. It focuses on developing proactive Bay policies on behalf of the COG membership, as well as communicating with COG member jurisdictions on Bay Program activities. Its membership includes representatives from COG's member governments.

Climate, Energy and Environment Policy Committee (CEEPC)

CEEPC advises the COG Board on climate change, energy, green building, alternative fuels, solid waste and recycling issues and supports the implementation of the National Capital Region Climate Change Report. Its membership includes representatives from COG's member governments, state environmental, energy, and transportation agencies, state legislatures, the Air and Climate Public Advisory Committee, federal and regional agencies, electric and gas utilities, environmental organizations, business organizations, and members of the academic community.

Human Services and Public Safety Policy Committee (HSPSPC)

HSPSPC advises the COG Board on law enforcement, fire and rescue services, affordable housing, health and human services, foster care, substance abuse, and mental health. Its membership includes elected officials, department managers and directors from COG's member governments.

National Capital Region Emergency Preparedness Council (EPC)

The EPC oversees and supports the implementation of the Regional Emergency Coordination Plan, coordinates activities of emergency support groups, and develops emergency preparedness training with the Chief Administrative Officers Committee and state/federal Senior Policy Group. Its membership includes area elected officials and senior representatives of federal, state, nonprofit, and private sector stakeholders.

Region Forward Coalition

The Region Forward Coalition oversees and supports the implementation of the *Region* Forward vision plan. Its membership includes area government officials and stakeholders from area businesses, nonprofits, and philanthropic, advocacy, and community-based organizations.

Public Input

he COG Board of Directors, Transportation Planning Board (TPB). and Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee (MWAQC) hold open meetings that area stakeholders, residents, and members of the media are welcome to attend. In addition, TPB and MWAQC have public comment periods during each meeting as well as advisory committees representing members of the public.

Air and Climate Public Advisory Committee (ACPAC)

ACPAC advises MWAQC on air quality planning and the Climate, Energy and Environment Policy Committee on climate and energy issues and initiatives. The ACPAC is comprised of 18 members chosen by MWAQC. Members serve staggered 1-3 year terms and represent communities across the region and from various backgrounds including business/industry, education/scientific, environmental/health and civic organizations. ACPAC meets on the third Monday of the month from 5:30 pm - 7:30 pm at COG.

Transportation Planning Board's Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC)

The CAC promotes public involvement in transportation planning for the region and provides independent, region-oriented citizen advice to the TPB on transportation plans and issues. It is comprised of 15 area residents, evenly divided among D.C., suburban Maryland and Northern Virginia, who represent diverse viewpoints on long-term transportation policy. Nine members of the CAC are appointed annually by the TPB. The other six members are elected by the previous year's CAC. CAC meets on Thursdays preceding the regular meetings of the TPB, beginning at 6 pm. Special outreach meetings are also held throughout the year at different locations across the region.

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
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
