At its meeting on May 3, the TPB Steering Committee approved the following resolutions:

- SR19-2019: To amend the FY 2019-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to include \$28.2 million in advanced construction funding (with \$8.2 million of that to be converted to National Highway Performance Program, or NHPP funding), \$10.4 million in FHWA Demonstration Project funding, \$5.8 million in NHPP funding, \$20 million in state and local revenue sharing funding, and \$6.6 million in Surface Transportation Block Grant funding for the VA Route 28 Widening project between the Prince William County line and US Route 29 in Fairfax County, as requested by the Virginia Department of Transportation. This project is included in the conformity analysis of Visualize 2045 and the FY 2019-2024 TIP.
- SR20-2019: to amend the FY 2019-2024 TIP to include \$1.5 million in Highway Safety Improvement Program and local matching funds for the I-395 Sign Structure Improvements project, as requested by the District Department of Transportation. This project is exempt from the air quality conformity requirement.

The Steering Committee also reviewed a draft amendment to the FY 2019-2024 TIP that has been requested by the Maryland Department of Transportation to reprogram funds and include an additional \$186.1 million in state funding for the Governor Harry W. Nice/Senator Thomas "Mac" Middleton Bridge Replacement project. The Steering Committee recommended that the TIP amendment be approved by the TPB with resolution R18-2019 under Item 8 of the May 15 meeting.

The TPB Bylaws provide that the Steering Committee "shall have the full authority to approve non-regionally significant items, and in such cases, it shall advise the TPB of its action."

RESOLUTION ON AN AMENDMENT TO THE FY 2019-2024 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) THAT IS EXEMPT FROM THE AIR QUALITY CONFORMITY REQUIREMENT TO INCLUDE FUNDING FOR THE VA ROUTE 28 WIDENING PROJECT FROM THE PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY LINE TO US ROUTE 29 IN FAIRFAX COUNTY, AS REQUESTED BY THE VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (VDOT)

WHEREAS, the National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board (TPB), which is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the Washington Region, has the responsibility under the provisions of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act for developing and carrying out a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process for the Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, the TIP is required by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) as a basis and condition for all federal funding assistance to state, local and regional agencies for transportation improvements within the Washington planning area; and

WHEREAS, on October 17, 2018 the TPB adopted the FY 2019-2024 TIP; and

WHEREAS, in the attached letter of April 24, 2019 VDOT has requested that the FY 2019-2024 TIP be amended to include \$71 million (\$28.2 million in Advanced Construction (AC) funding with \$8.2 million of that to be converted to National Highway Performance Program (ACC-NHPP) funding, \$10.4 million in FHWA Demonstration Project (DEMO) funding, \$5.8 million in NHPP funding, \$20 million in state/local revenue sharing (REVSH), and \$6.6 million in Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funding) for the VA Route 28 Widening project between the Prince William County line and US Route 29 in Fairfax County (TIP ID 6450), as described in the attached materials; and

WHEREAS, this project is included in the Air Quality Conformity Analysis of Visualize 2045 and the FY 2019-2024 TIP (CON ID 737, VP6N);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Steering Committee of the National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board amends the FY 2019-2024 TIP to include \$71 million (\$20 million in AC funding, \$8.2 million in ACC-NHPP funding, \$10.4 million in DEMO funding, \$5.8 million in NHPP funding, \$20 million in REVSH, and \$6.6 million in STBG funding) for the VA Route 28 Widening project between the Prince William County line and US Route 29 in Fairfax County (TIP ID 6450), as described in the attached materials.

Dear Chairman Nohe:

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) requests an amendment to the FY 2019-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to program funding to widen VA 28 from four to six lanes between Old Centreville Road and the Fairfax County/Prince William County line. This project, which also includes intersection improvements and pedestrian/bicycle facilities, will reduce congestion on a heavily traveled section of VA 28 in Fairfax County.

The amendment adds approximately \$71 million in Federal, State and local funds to the TIP. Funding sources include Federal Demonstration and Federal NHS/NHPP funds for right-of way in FY 2019; and Federal Demonstration funds, Federal NHS/NHPP, Federal Surface Transportation Program funds, Advance Construction, Virginia Revenue Sharing funds (matched by 50% NVTA funding) for the FY 2019 Construction phase. In FY 2020, 8.2 million in Advance Construction funds is converted to Federal NHS/NHPP. The total project cost is estimated at approximately \$76.6 million. The attached TIP table shows more detail.

The proposed additional funds are part of VDOT's revenue estimates included in the Visualize 2045 Financial Plan. This project was included in the Visualize 2045 air quality conformity analysis.

VDOT requests approval of this TIP Amendment by the Transportation Planning Board's Steering Committee at its meeting on May 3. VDOT's representative will attend the meeting and be available to answer any questions about the amendments.

The District Department of Transportation (DDOT) requests that the FY 2019-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) be amended to reinstate and increase funding for one project as detailed below:

Project proposed for reinstatement and funding increase:

The state departments of transportation administer the TA Set-Aside Program in each state, but the TPB is responsible for selecting TA Set-Aside projects using portions of the program funding that are sub-allocated to our metropolitan region. Past recipients of technical assistance through the TPB's Transportation Land Use Connections (TLC) Program are encouraged to consider seeking funding through the program. The TPB also encourages TA Set-Aside applications that support policies highlighted in Visualize 2045, our region's recently adopted long-range transportation plan.
