TPB Affirms Greenhouse Gas Reduction Goals

SUPPORTS JOINT WORKING GROUP TO IDENTIFY VIABLE REDUCTION STRATEGIES

The TPB in December officially affirmed its support for regional greenhouse gas reduction goals adopted by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG) five years ago. The goals call for emissions reductions of 20 percent below 2005 levels by 2020, and 80 percent below 2005 levels by 2050.

The TPB affirmed the goals in a formal resolution at its meeting on December 17. In the resolution, the Board also expressed its support for a new joint working group, to be convened by COG, that will examine potential greenhouse gas reduction strategies across the major sectors responsible for greenhouse gas emissions in the region—energy, land-use, the built environment, and transportation.

The new COG-led working group will be made up of professionals from the energy, environment, transportation, and land-use agencies at the local, state, and regional levels. With assistance from COG staff and outside consultants, the group will work to identify viable, implementable local, regional, and state actions

TPB RECOGNIZES GRADUATES OF COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

Recent graduates from the November 2014 Community Leadership Institute (CLI) attended the December TPB meeting to receive certificates and recognition for completing the program. CLI provides an opportunity for community leaders to learn about and discuss how transportation decisions are made in the region.

At the meeting, John Swanson of TPB staff briefed the board on the history of the program. He said that the program was developed as a way to educate community leaders about the region's long-range transportation plan and to provide guidance on how the public can get involved in the planning process at the local level.

Swanson said that since 2006 the TPB has hosted 13 CLI sessions and that more than 250 people from across the region have participated. He added that several TPB members, including 2014 Chair Patrick Wojahn and Todd Turner, participated in the program, as have nine members of the 2014 Citizens Advisory Committee.

REGIONAL BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN PLAN NEARS FINAL APPROVAL

The latest four-year update of a regional bicycle and pedestrian plan identifying hundreds of major improvements planned across the region through 2040 will be up for final TPB approval on January 21.

At its meeting on December 17, the Board was briefed on the final draft of the plan, which also includes recommended best practices and data on regional traffic safety trends and growing use of bicycling and walking.

According to Jim Sebastian, who briefed the Board, the plan includes more than 4,000 miles of planned new or upgraded bicycle lanes or shared-use paths, compared to a little more than 700 miles of such facilities today.

In his presentation, Sebastian told Board members, "The plan focuses on projects that will have a regional impact, and also achieve other goals, like providing access to transit stations and Activity Centers, and improving safety for travelers."

Sebastian chairs the TPB's Bicycle and Pedestrian Subcommittee and manages the active transportation branch at the District of Columbia Department of Transportation (DDOT).

Following the briefing, Board members focused on how the TPB will use the plan going forward.

Kanti Srikanth, the TPB's staff director, explained, "This plan serves at the policy level to help identify where the gaps are, where the focus should be. For example, the

plan shows that to realize all of the improvements that have been planned in the region, we would need to increase our investment from about 2 percent of all spending to 6 percent."

Board member Jay Fisette, who represents Arlington County, emphasized the need to focus on key regional projects. "I think we should be looking for the key projects, those that actually provide some increased interconnec-

tivity, for example, and that have benefit across borders," he said.

Allison Davis, who was representing WMATA at the December 17 meeting, urged staff and the subcommittee that worked on the plan to incorporate some of the key unfunded bicycle and pedestrian projects in a larger list of unfunded highway and transit projects that staff will be developing early in 2015.

The TPB is scheduled to consider the Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for final approval at its January 21 meeting.

At its December 17 meeting, the TPB unanimously approved its new officers for 2015. Phil Mendelson, from the District of Columbia, will serve as TPB Chair. Mendelson will be joined by Timothy Lovain, from Alexandria, who will serve as the First Vice-Chair, and by Bridget Donnell Newton, of Rockville, who will serve as Second Vice-Chair.

The 2015 officers were recommended by a Nominating

Committee comprised of former TPB chairs Scott York and Todd Turner, and by Sam Zimbabwe. The TPB officers will serve a year-long term, which begins in January and ends in December.

Outgoing TPB officers are Chair Patrick Wojahn, from College Park, and Vice-Chair Tommy Wells, from the District of Columbia. Wojahn will continue to serve on the TPB.

TPB RECONSTITUTES REGIONAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SUBCOMMITTEE

The TPB's Regional Bus Subcommittee has been reconstituted as the Regional Public Transportation Subcommittee, expanding its membership to include representatives from all public transportation agencies and providers in the region, as well as human services and private transportation providers.

TPB staff briefed the Board on the changes to the subcommittee on December 17. The staff briefing also included details about the reconstituted subcommittee's new mission statement and planned activities.

Among the planned activities are developing MAP-21 performance targets for safety and state of good repair, increasing public transportation providers' participation in TPB activities, and addressing providers' issues and interests.

The changes to the subcommittee come in response to

new MAP-21 requirements for Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO), such as the TPB, released by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) earlier this year. The MAP-21 requirement is that public transportation providers must be represented on the policy boards of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs). The TPB already meets that requirement, but the new subcommittee enhances the existing process used to identify, discuss, and coordinate action on issues affecting providers of public transportation.

In addition to requiring public transportation representation on MPO policy boards, the MAP-21 requirement also says that the MPOs must coordinate with providers of public transportation on establishing performance targets related to safety and state of good repair, and that MPOs must demonstrate progress in meeting those targets. The first meeting of the TPB's Regional Public Transportation Subcommittee will be January 27, 2015. ◆

in each of the four sectors, quantify benefits, costs, and implementation timeframes, and jointly develop an action plan for the region. The group will also explore specific greenhouse gas emission reduction goals, measures, and/or targets, along with reductions in other air pollutants as a co-benefit, for the four sectors.

The TPB was originally briefed on the creation of the working group at its November 2014 meeting, following discussions and an official request from two other COG committees—the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee (MWAQC) and the Climate, Energy, and Environment Policy Committee (CEEPC).

In 2010 the TPB conducted a study, called "What Would it Take?", that examined the types of projects that would be needed to achieve the regional greenhouse reduction goals within the transportation sector alone. The working group being convened by COG now includes participation by MWAQC and will examine greenhouse reduction strategies in all sectors, not just transportation.

At the November meeting, COG Deputy Director Stuart Freudberg told Board members that the joint working group is expected to begin its work in January 2015. An interim report is anticipated by September 30.
