#### 6. REGIONAL IMPACTS OF FINANCIAL AND CREDIT CRISIS

A. Adoption of Resolution Supporting Continued Charitable Giving by Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae (12:20 – 12:35 p.m.)

Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae perform vital roles in the nation's housing markets and are also significant businesses and employers in the Washington area, together donating approximately \$47 million to area non-profits and community groups in 2007. Both Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae were placed under federal conservatorship in September to restructure the organizations and stabilize housing finance markets. Federal regulators are reviewing the charitable giving activities of Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae as part of their restructuring responsibilities. COG has been part of a coalition of area organizations, including the Washington Regional Association of Grantmakers, the Non-Profit Roundtable of Greater Washington and others urging that federal regulators not lose sight of the vital, positive community impact Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae charitable giving has had on thousands of families and many communities in the National Capital Region. The Human Services Policy Committee met on September 25 and recommended that the COG Board of Directors convey its support for continued charitable giving by Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae as part of any federal restructuring of these organizations.

Tightening credit, rising interest rates and uncertainty about national and global efforts to stabilize financial markets have begun to affect the ability of local governments, including those with otherwise strong bond ratings, to borrow money to support schools, road improvements and other municipal projects, including governments. The Board will be briefed on the impact on local governments nationally as well as in the Washington area and discuss ways to strengthen the ability of local governments to responsively borrow to address public infrastructure needs.

## 7. BRIEFING ON INITIAL WASHINGTON REGION PREPARATIONS FOR THE 2010 CENSUS (12:55 – 1:15 p.m.)

Every ten years, COG works closely with local governments in the Washington region and the U.S. Census Bureau to prepare for the decennial census. In addition to determining the apportionment of Congressional representation, U.S. Census data is also used to allocate nearly \$300 billion in federal funds to towns, cities and communities around the country. COG will soon begin its Census 2010 program to promote the Census, one key element of which will be the creation of a COG Regional Complete Count Committee. Mr. Hatcher and Mr. Armstrong will brief the Board on the working activities of the U.S. Census Bureau, its preparation for Census Day, April 1, 2010, and how COG can be an important partner in this initiative.

## 8. ENDORSEMENT OF greenSPACE LEARNING CENTER AND COG GREEN BUILDING POLICY UPDATE

In December, 2007, the Board adopted a regional green building policy that included recommendations for public and private green building standards. Mr. Freudberg and Ms. Kelsch will update the Board on local government implementation of the regional green building policy and recent discussions concerning expanding the policy to include new single family residential buildings. A central element of the regional green building policy is the need for continuing training and establishing information clearing house to facilitate regional green building implementation. COG's Intergovernmental Green Building Group recently reviewed and endorsed the proposed "greenSPACE" learning center that would help fill this void. Ms. Kelsch will summarize this initiative and seek conceptual support for the proposal by the Board.

### A. Resolution Approving COG's Policy and Program Priorities from the July 2008 Retreat

The resolution endorses the comprehensive short and long term priorities identified by COG's leadership and requests that the appropriate policy boards and committees, as identified in the summary report, return to the Board for a briefing upon completion of their respective priorities.

# B. Resolution Revising Resolution R43-08 to Reflect Updated Budget Estimates for COG to Receive and Expend Funds from the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority

The Board will be asked to adopt Resolution R59-08, revising Resolution R43-08 and authorizing the Executive Director to receive and expend funding from the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority in an amount not to exceed \$560,000 for the purpose of conducting water quality monitoring in the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers to assess pollution abatement actions. This resolution will also authorize the Executive Director to execute a contract with Virginia Tech's Occoquan Watershed Monitoring Laboratory in an amount not to exceed \$480,000 to provide COG with technical and scientific services in undertaking the implementation of water quality monitoring in the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers. No COG matching funds are required.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution R59-09.
