EPA announced its proposed approval of the Severe Area SIP for the one-hour ozone standard in January and February, 2005. EPA expects to complete rulemaking on the three states' SIPs by May 3, 2005. Additionally, EPA designated the Washington metropolitan region as nonattainment for fine particulates (PM2.5) in January. The rule will become effective on April 5, 2005. Ms. Rohlfs will report on these actions and give additional detail.

Item 5: Proposed MWAQC 2005-FY 2006 Work Program and Budget

The strategic planning sessions will be funded by supplemental local government contributions to MWAQC.
