At its annual meeting scheduled for May 12, the Chesapeake Executive Council will announce generalized two-year implementation milestones and an "end date" for achieving the levels of implementation that could attain water quality standards. However, the Bay Program has postponed major decisions on allocating nutrient and sediment loads, which is a key aspect in determining regional impacts. COG staff and the Water Resources Technical Committee continue to track these developments and Ms. Spano will provide an update on the revised schedule, highlight WRTC concerns about developments to date, and note how COG staff is working to provide input on behalf of COG members.

Dr. Graham will discuss several recent public reports (*Att. 5a-d*), including the Chesapeake Bay Foundation's "State of the Bay" report and the report card of the Potomac River Conservancy that paint a gloomy picture of a Bay still in decline. Building on Mr. Bieber's presentation in Item #4, Dr. Graham will propose both a COG Board presentation and a public response to these reports that would present COG's view of progress to date and the need for local government input on how best to achieve a restored Bay.

Recommended Action: Direct staff to prepare a briefing on Bay Program developments and Potomac water quality trends for presentation to the *COG* Board; draft an advocacy piece to respond to recent public reports on Bay and Potomac water quality.
