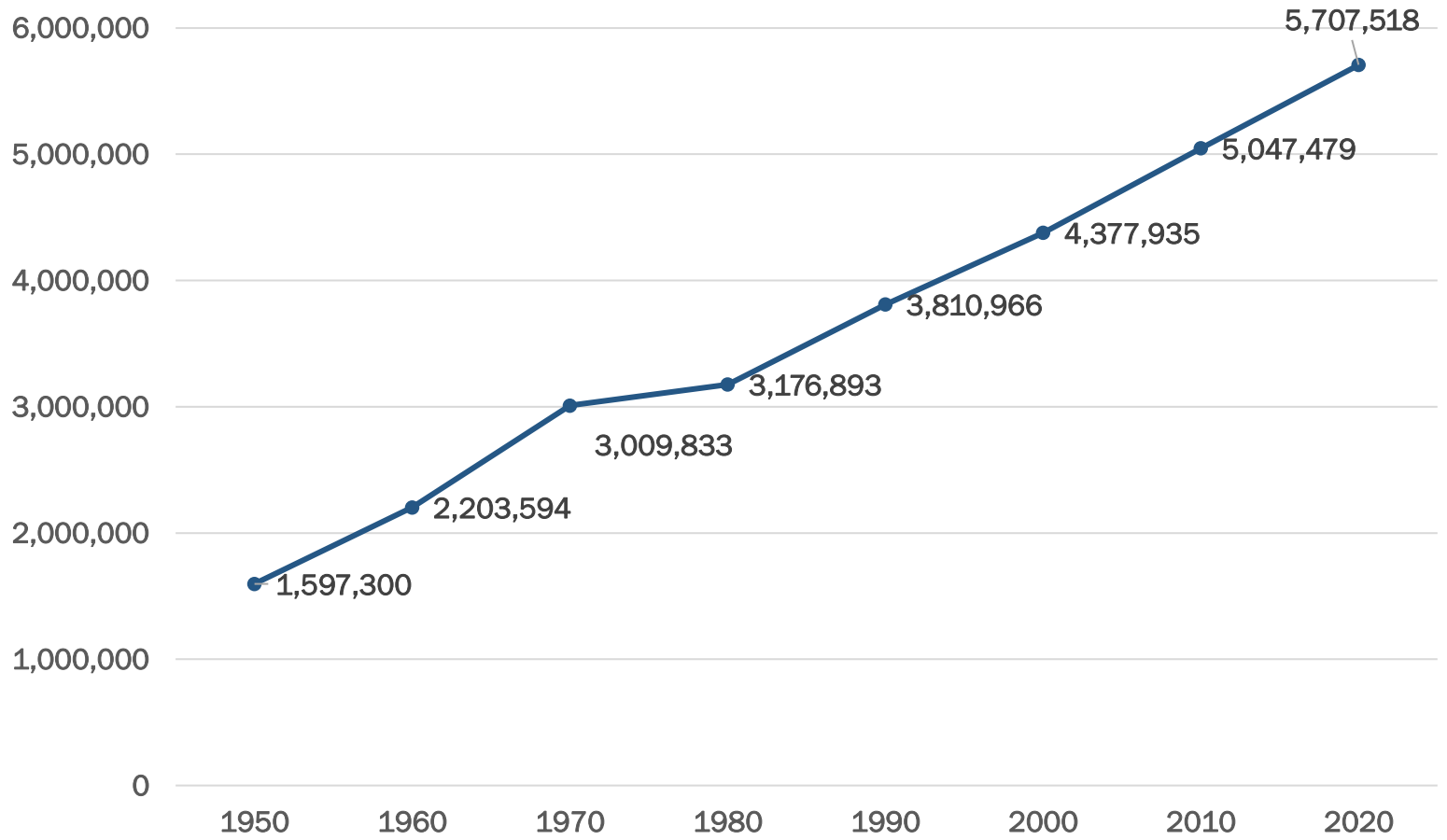

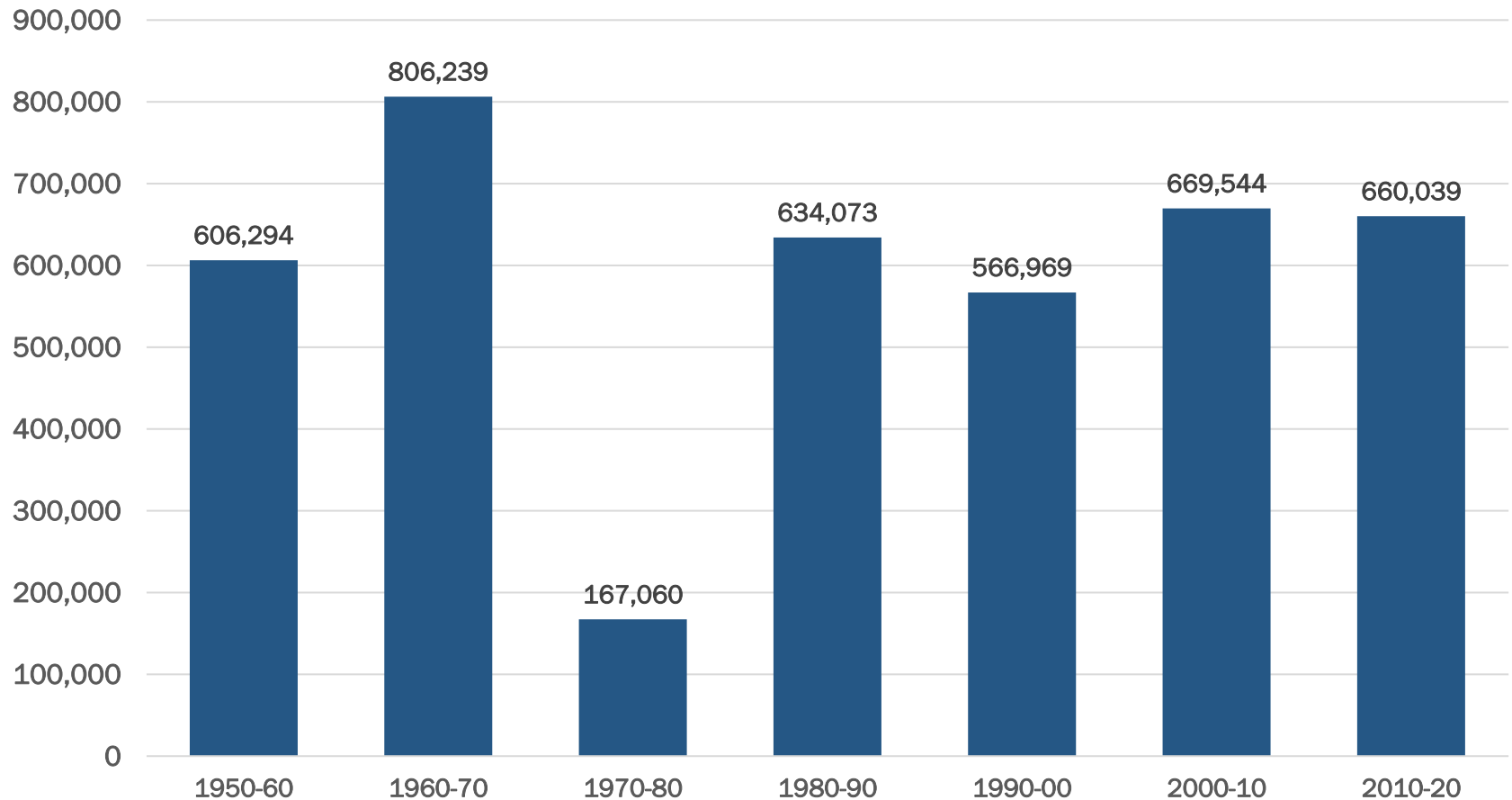

Total Population for COG Region Decennial Censuses 1950 - 2020

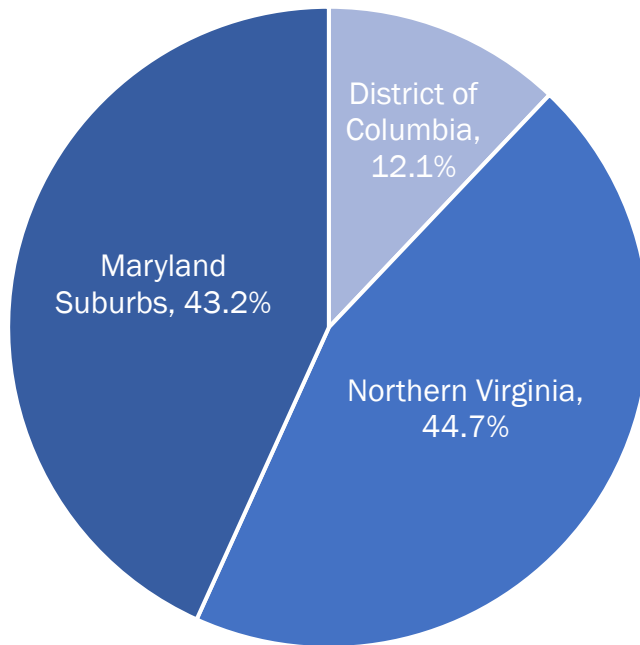


Population Change by Decade In the COG Region, 1950 - 2020

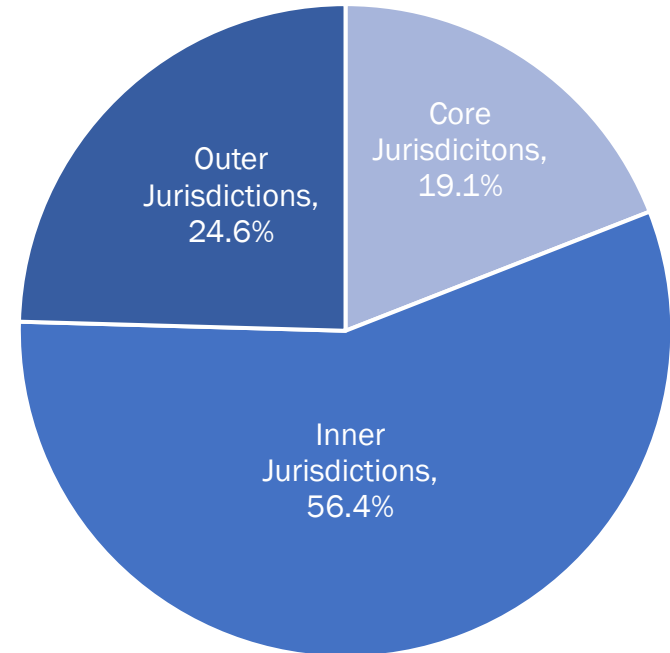

Share of Population by State Subregion

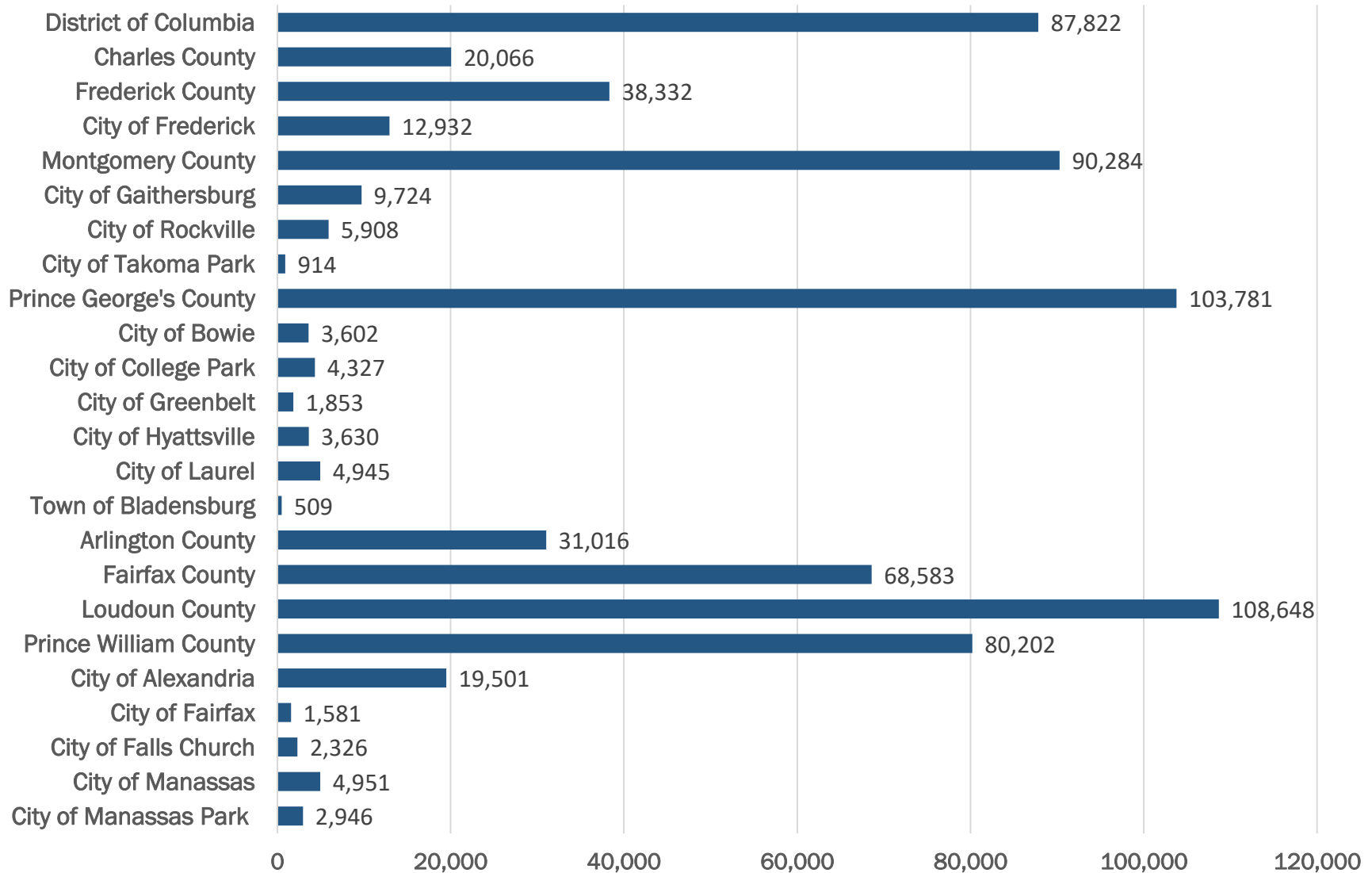


Share of Population by Geographic Subregion

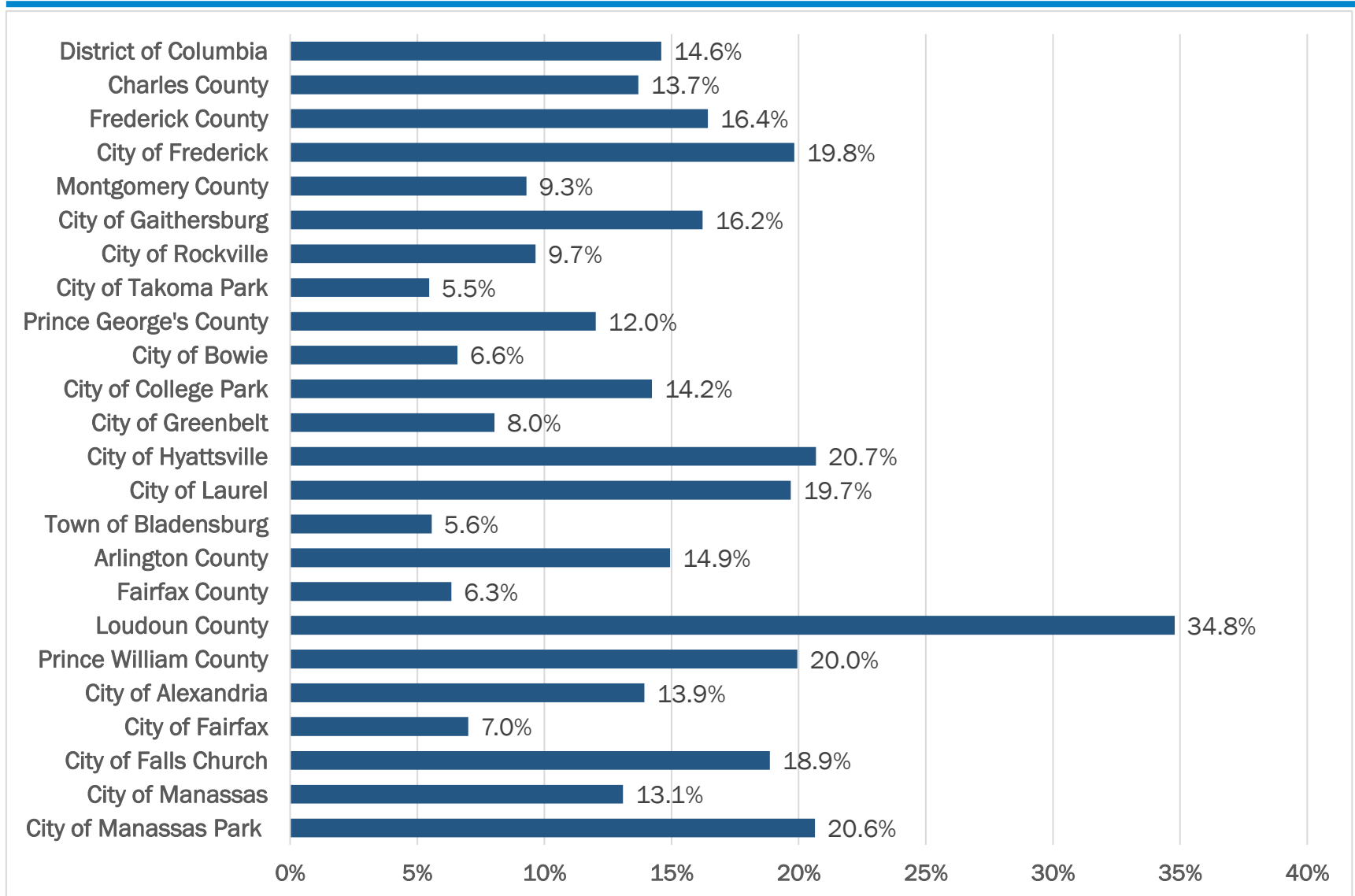


- The District is home to about 1 of every 8 residents, while the shares of the region's population in the Maryland Suburbs and Northern Virginia are nearly equal.
- More than half of the region's population resides in the Inner Jurisdictions of Montgomery, Prince George's, and Fairfax counties.

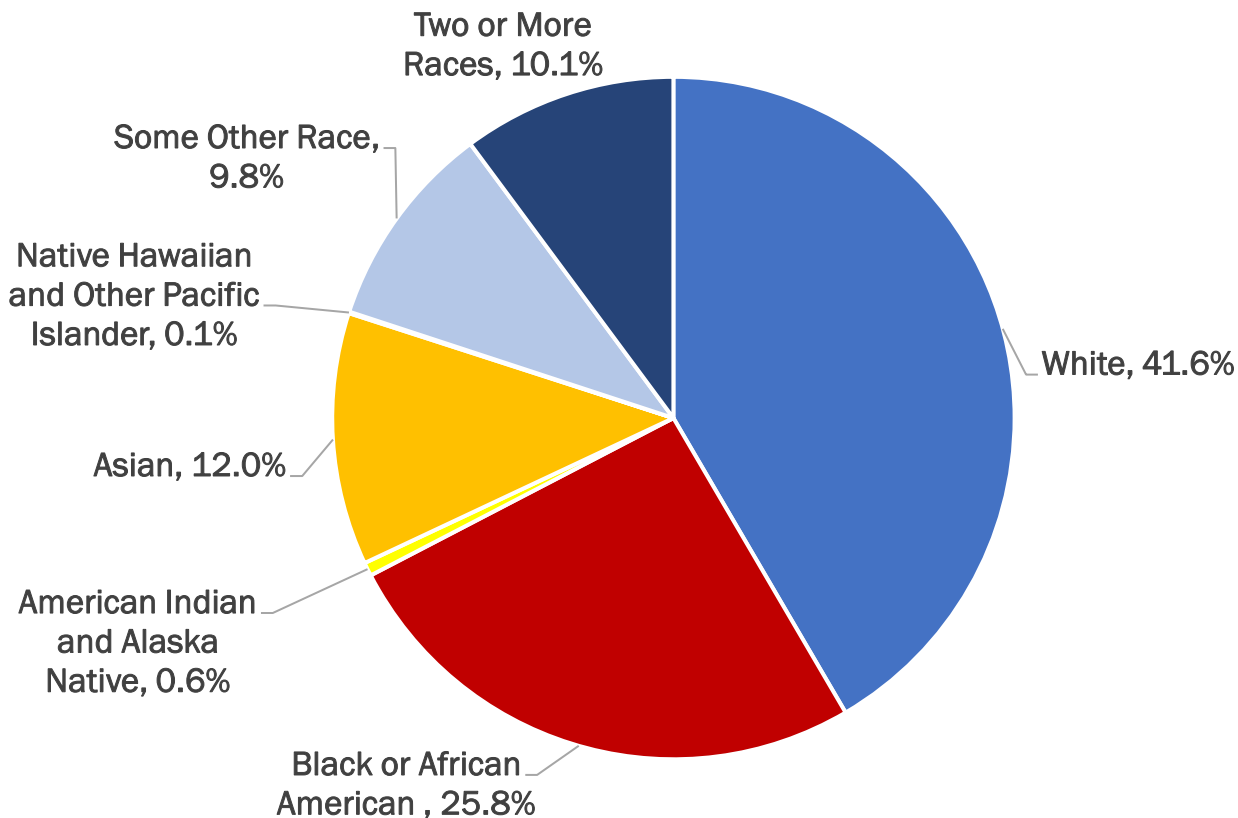
2010 to 2020 Population Growth



% Population Change 2010 to 2020



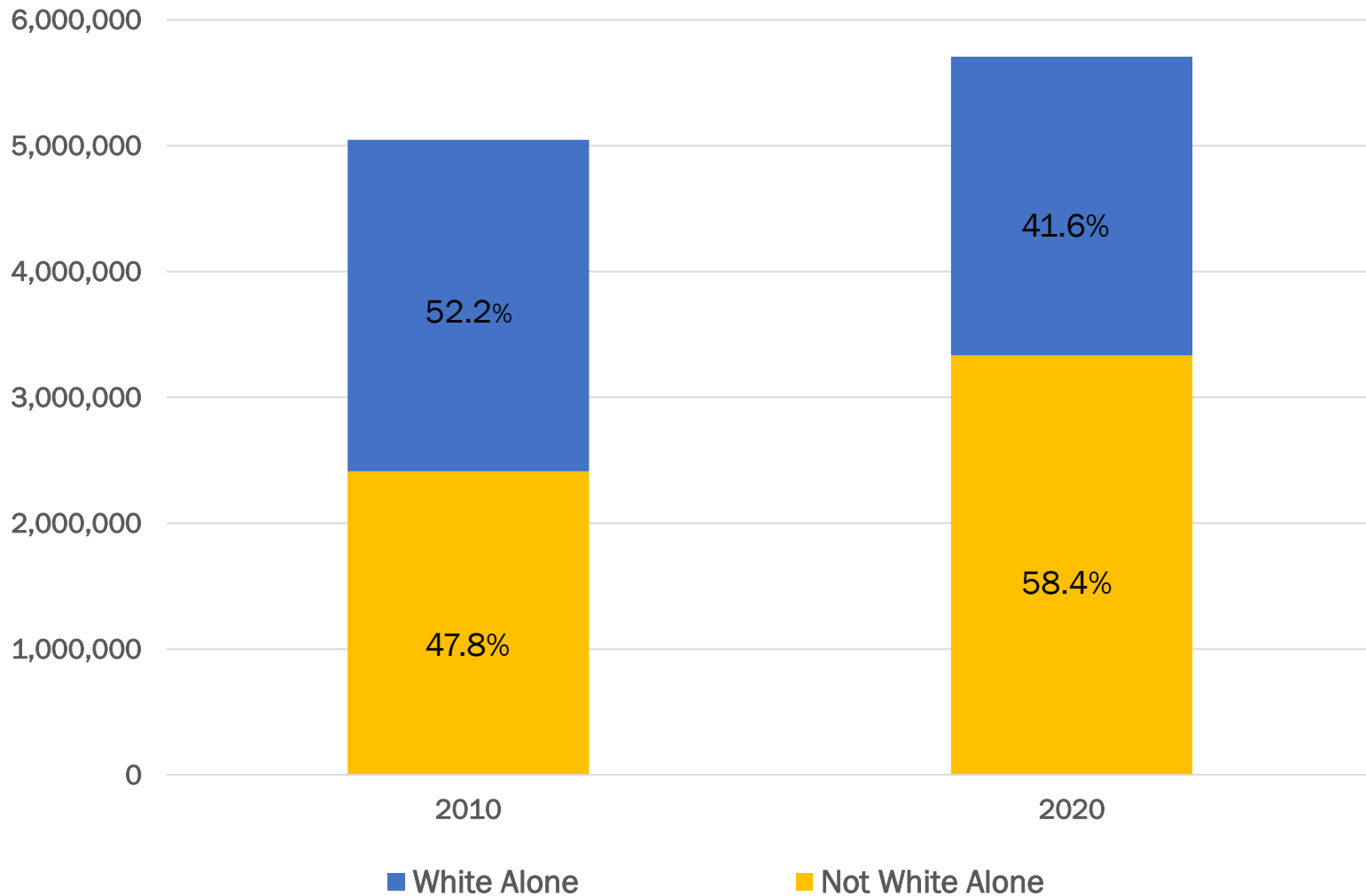
Total Population by Race, COG Region



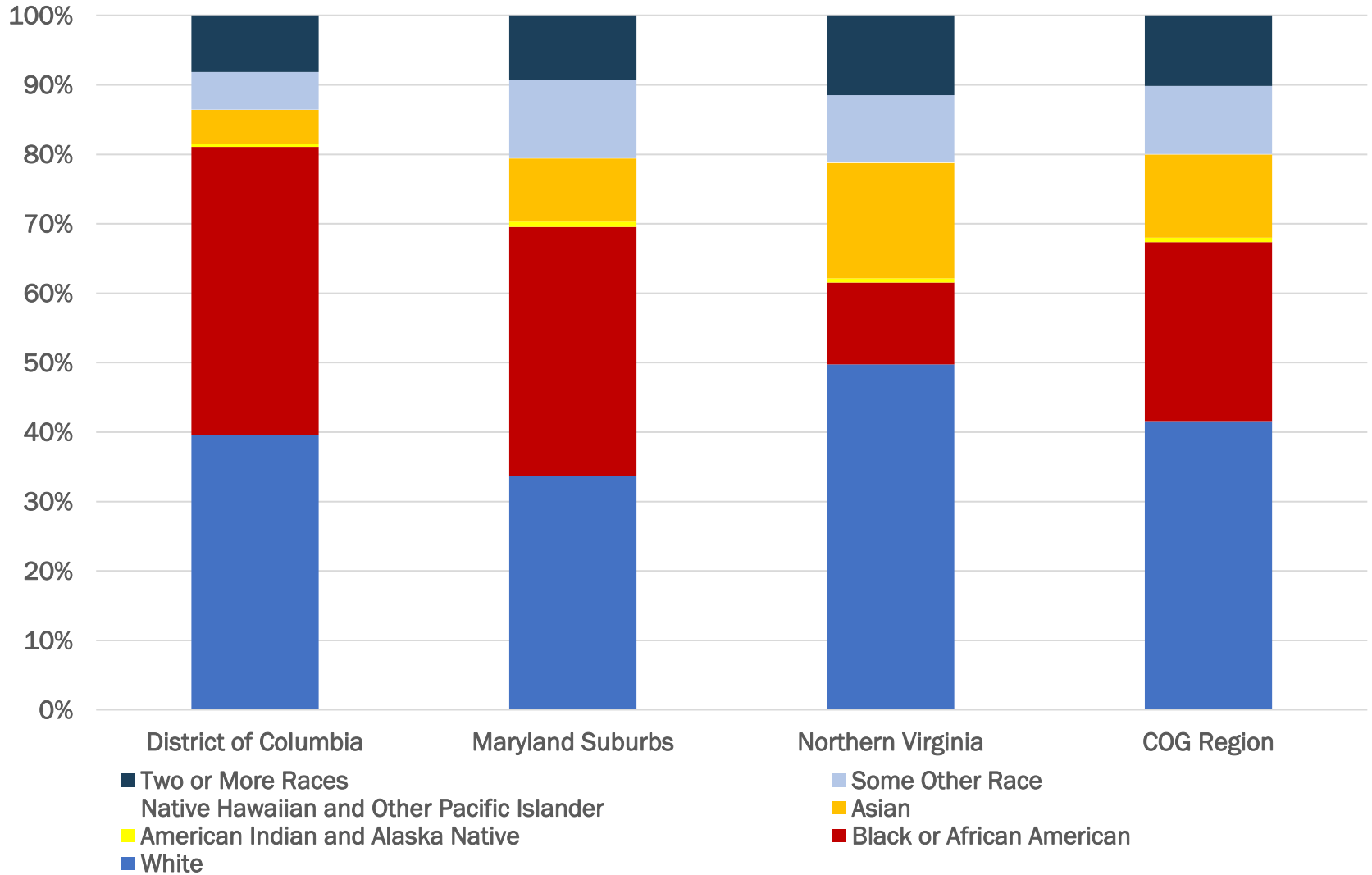
- The COG region is now predominated by people of color as approximately 42 percent of residents identify as “White”. Black or African American residents account for the next largest racial group at about 26 percent. Approximately 10 percent of the population identifies as “some other race,” and another 10 percent identifies as being of “two or more races.”
- “Hispanic” or “Latino” is an ethnicity and not a race. People who identify as Hispanic or Latino are included in the race totals above.



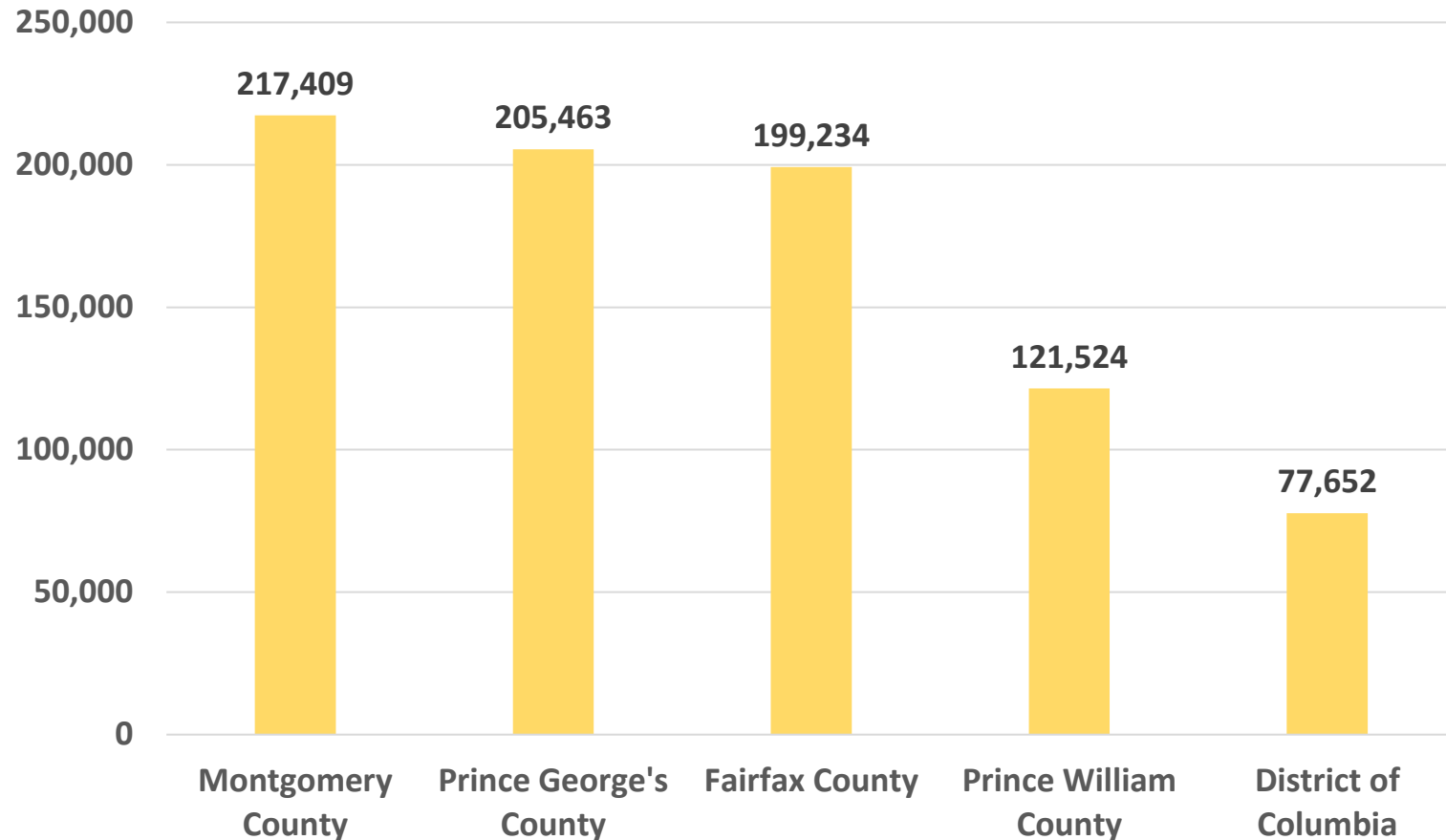
Share of the Population that is Non-White, COG Region 2010 and 2020



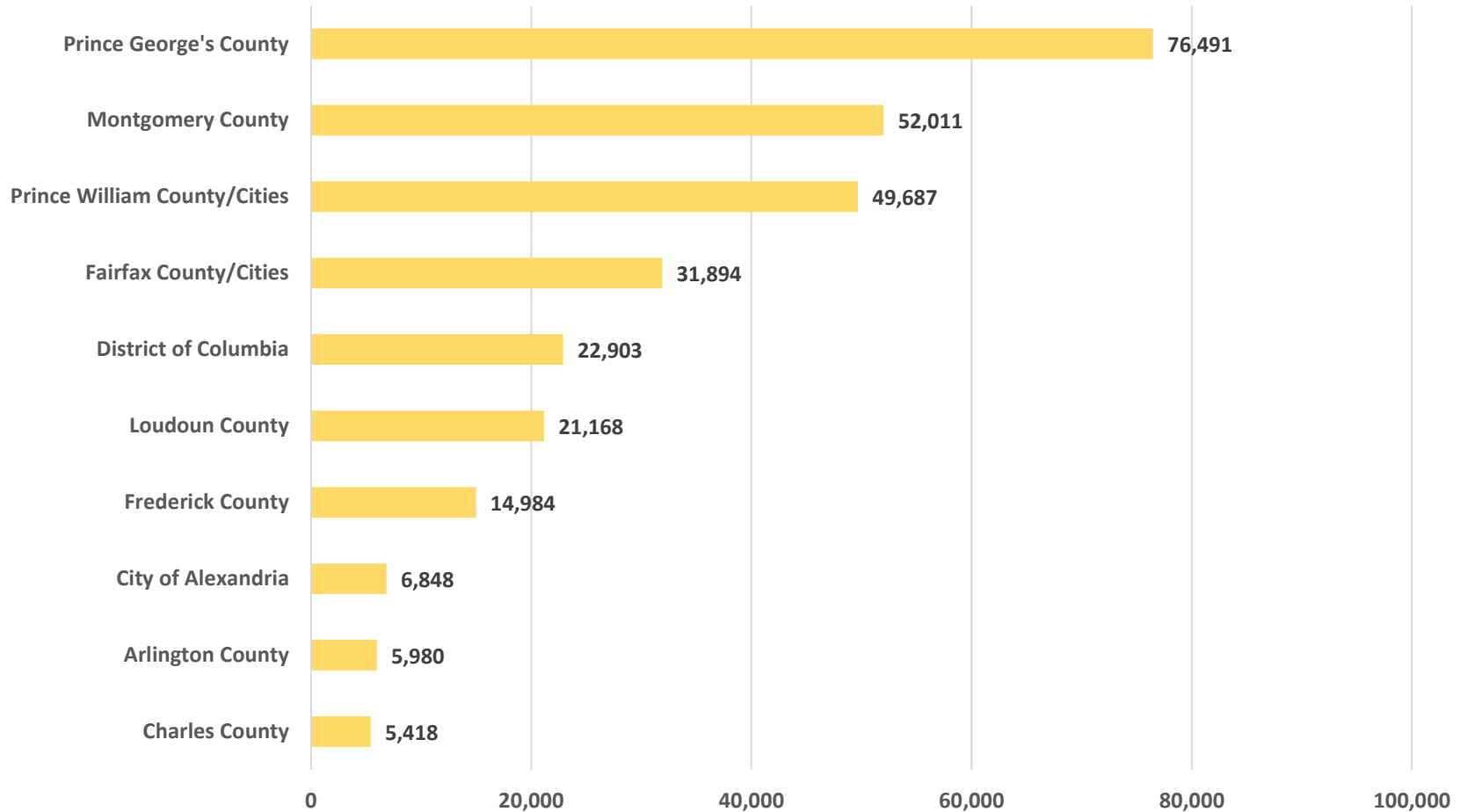
Racial Distribution by State Subregion



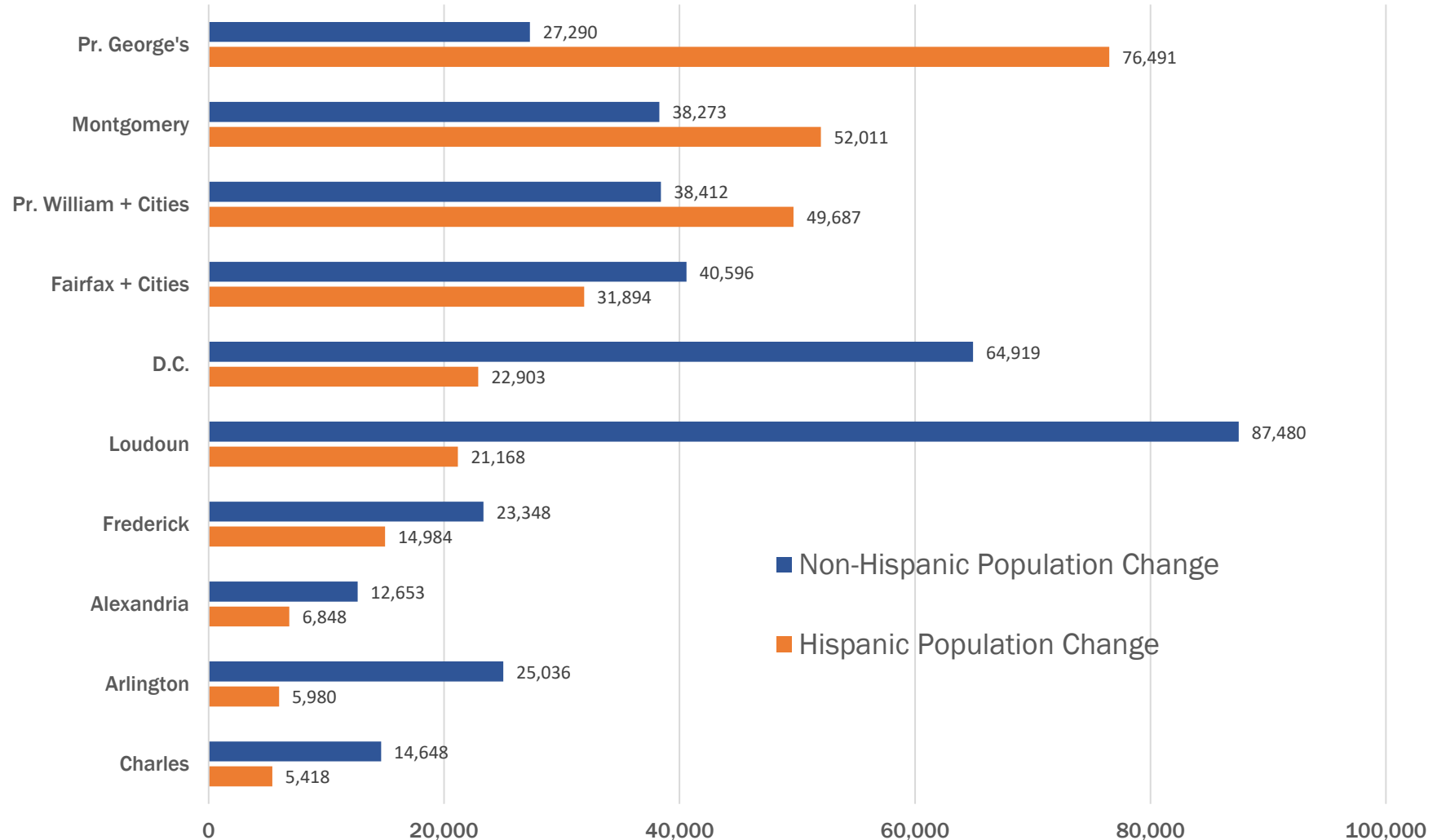
Nearly 80 Percent of the Region's Hispanic or Latino Population Reside in 5 Jurisdictions



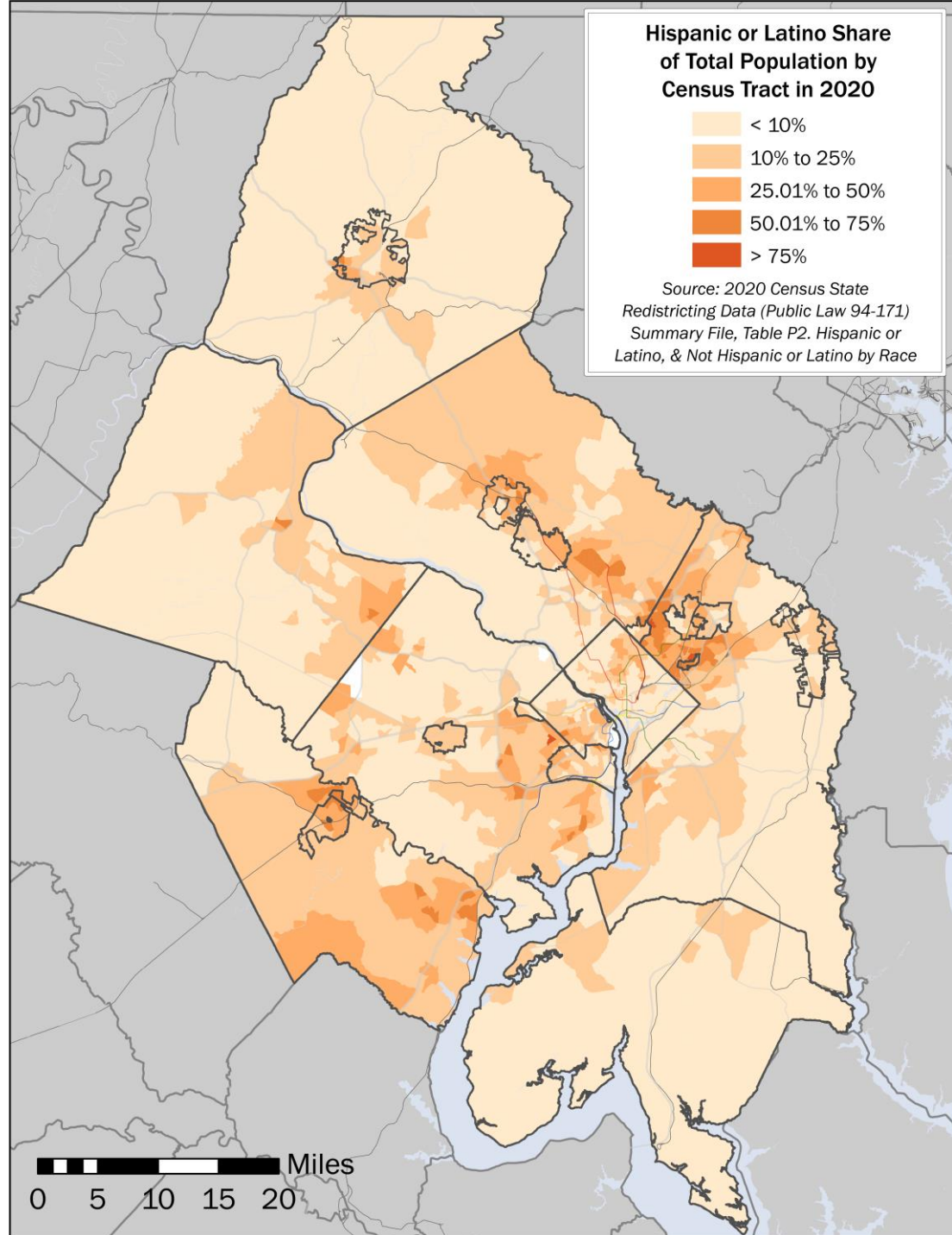
Hispanic or Latino Population Change 2020 -2010



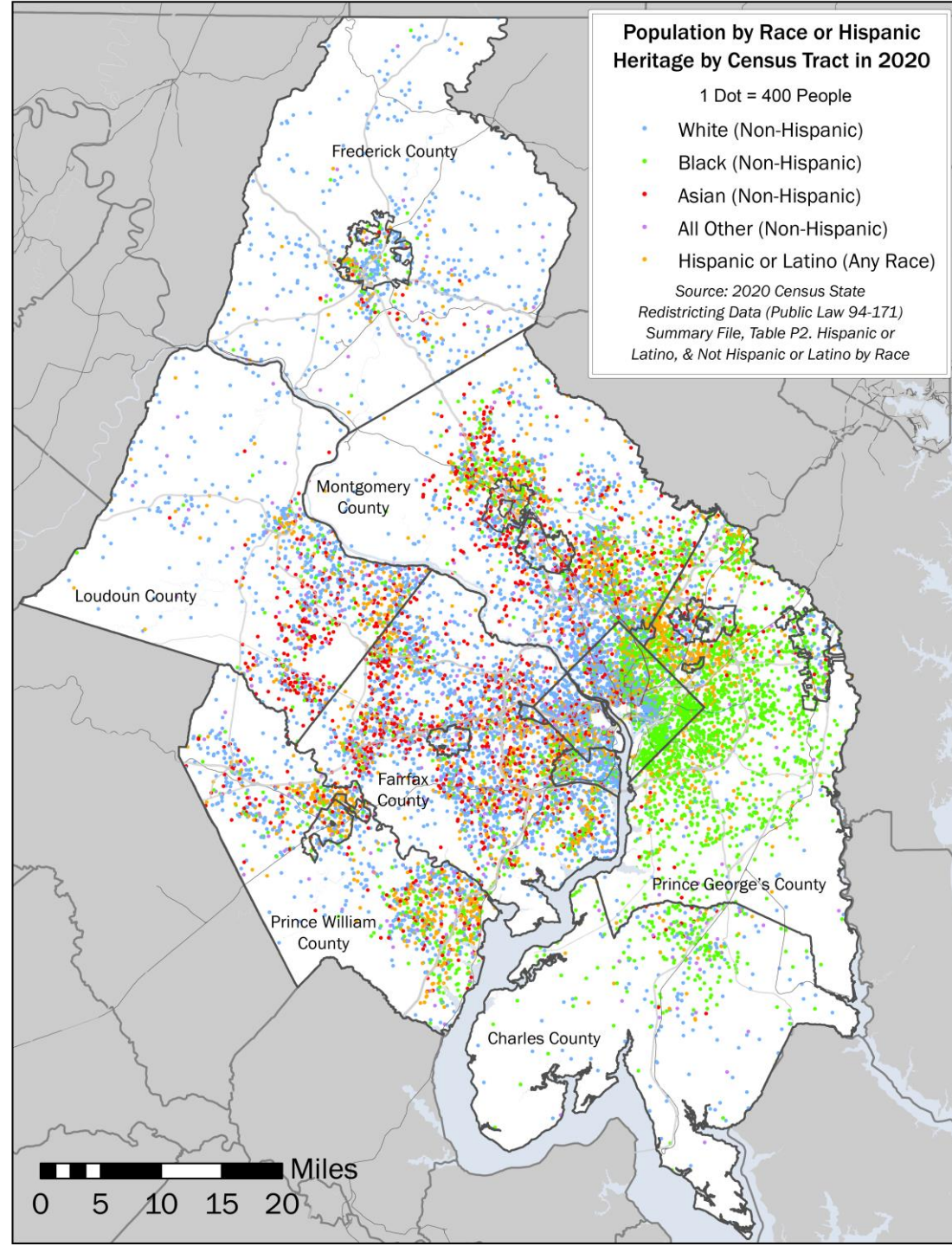
Hispanic or Latino Population Change 2020 -2010



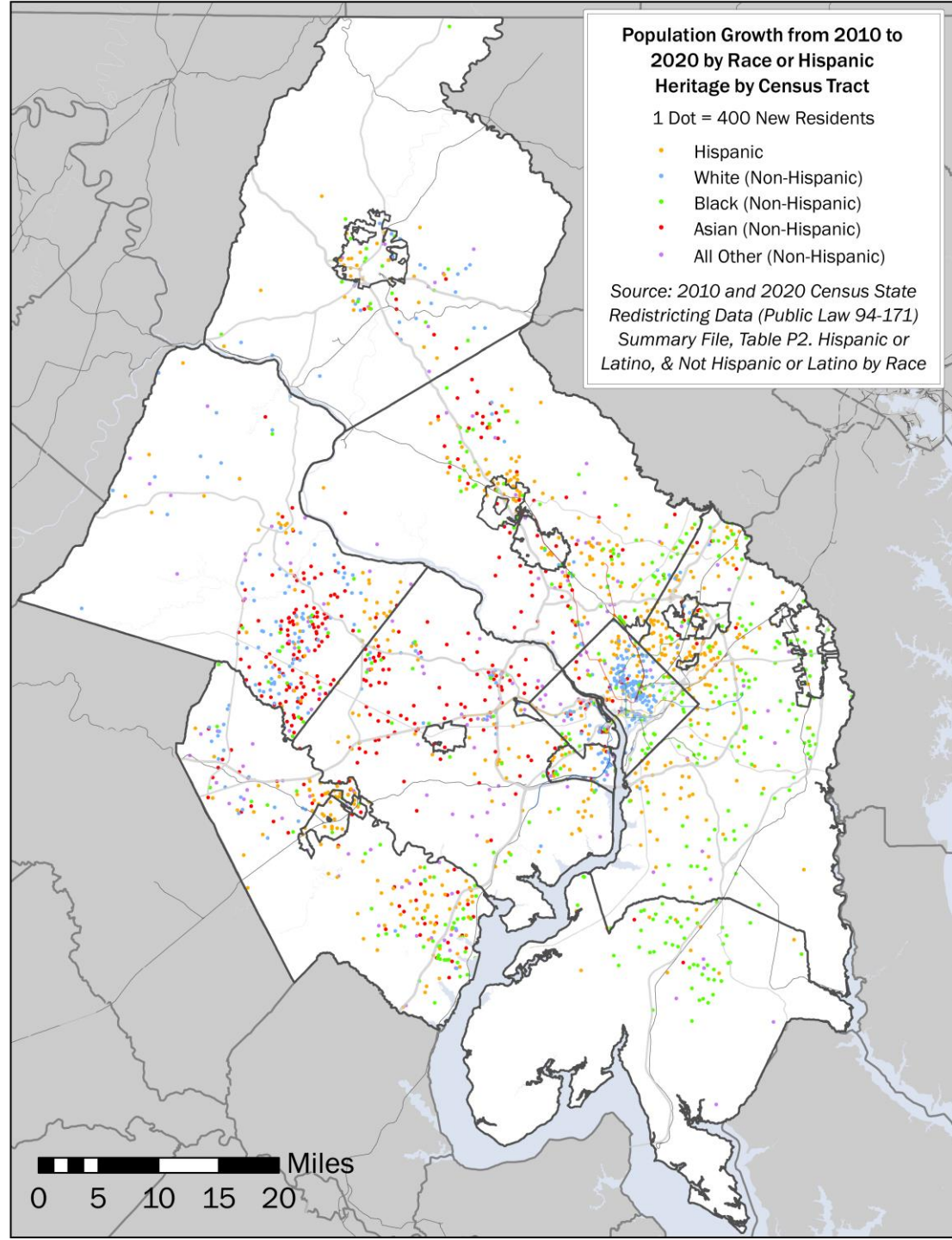
- The Latino population is evenly distributed around the region, compared to other demographic groups.
- Large Latino communities include:
 - Along U.S. 1 in Northern Virginia
 - Manassas and Manassas Park
 - Western Prince George's
 - Glenmont in Montgomery
- Latinos are the fastest growing demographic group, accounting for 44% of growth since 2010, with a population increase of 287,384.



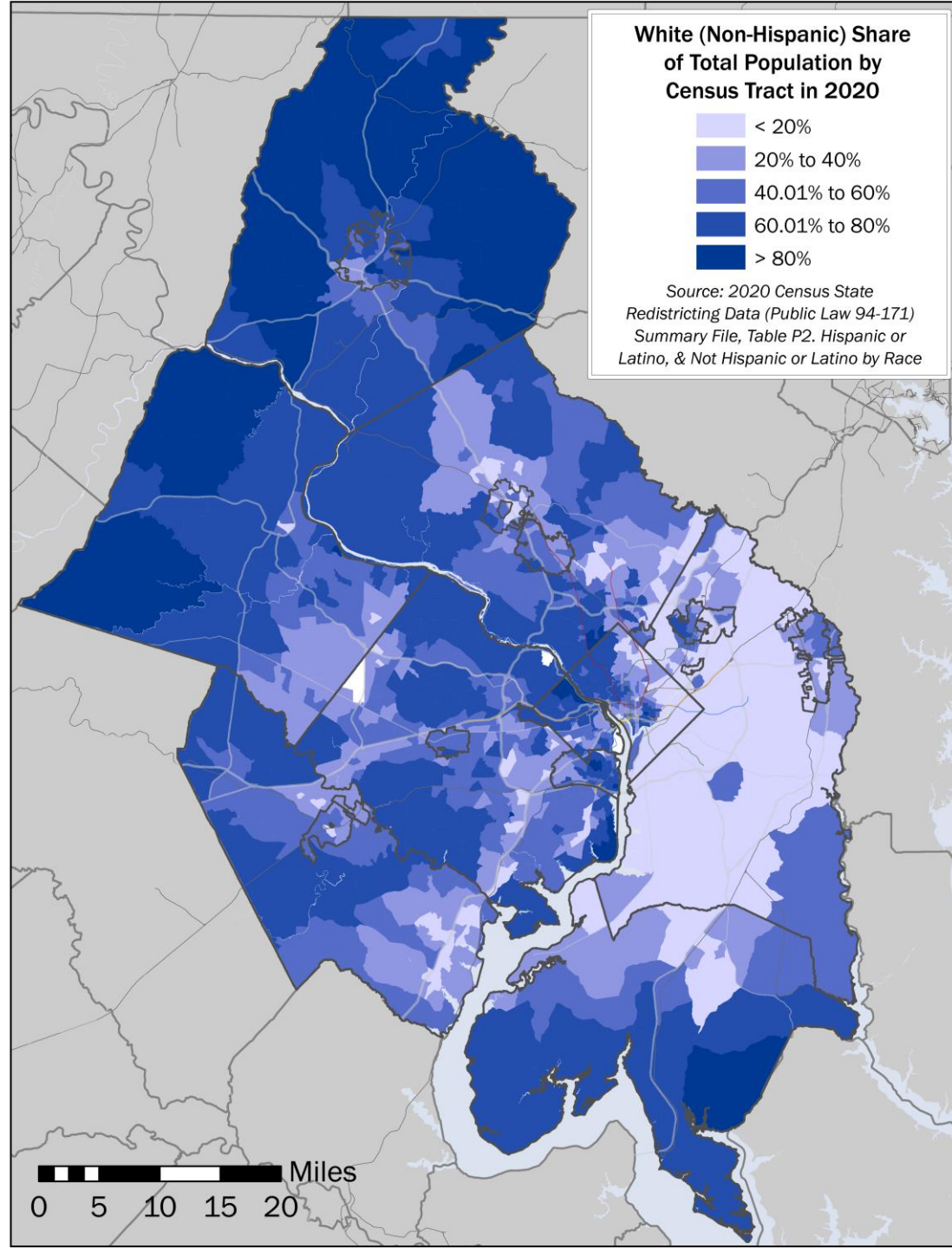
- Our region is diverse, but many of the region's neighborhoods are not.
- Racial and ethnic geographic clustering include concentrations of African-American communities in the eastern portion of the region and Asian communities in the western portion.
- Neighborhoods in Northwest DC, East Alexandria and North Arlington have high concentration of White residents



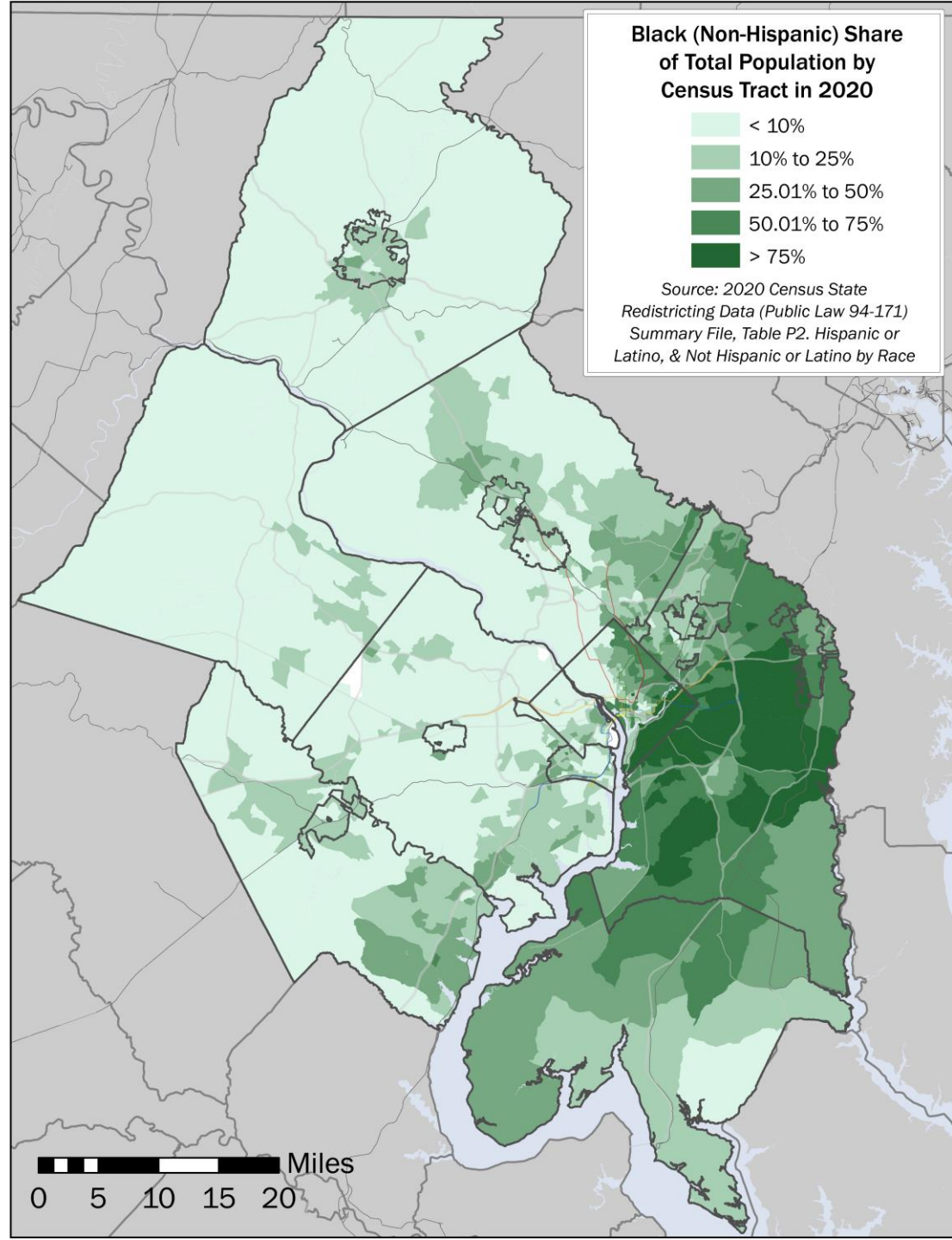
- Population change from 2010 to 2020 mostly increased diversity around the region.
- However, racial and ethnic groups grew fastest in parts of the regions that had significant populations of their own cohort.
- One exception was the District of Columbia, which saw large increases in the White population of neighborhoods that had lower shares in 2010.



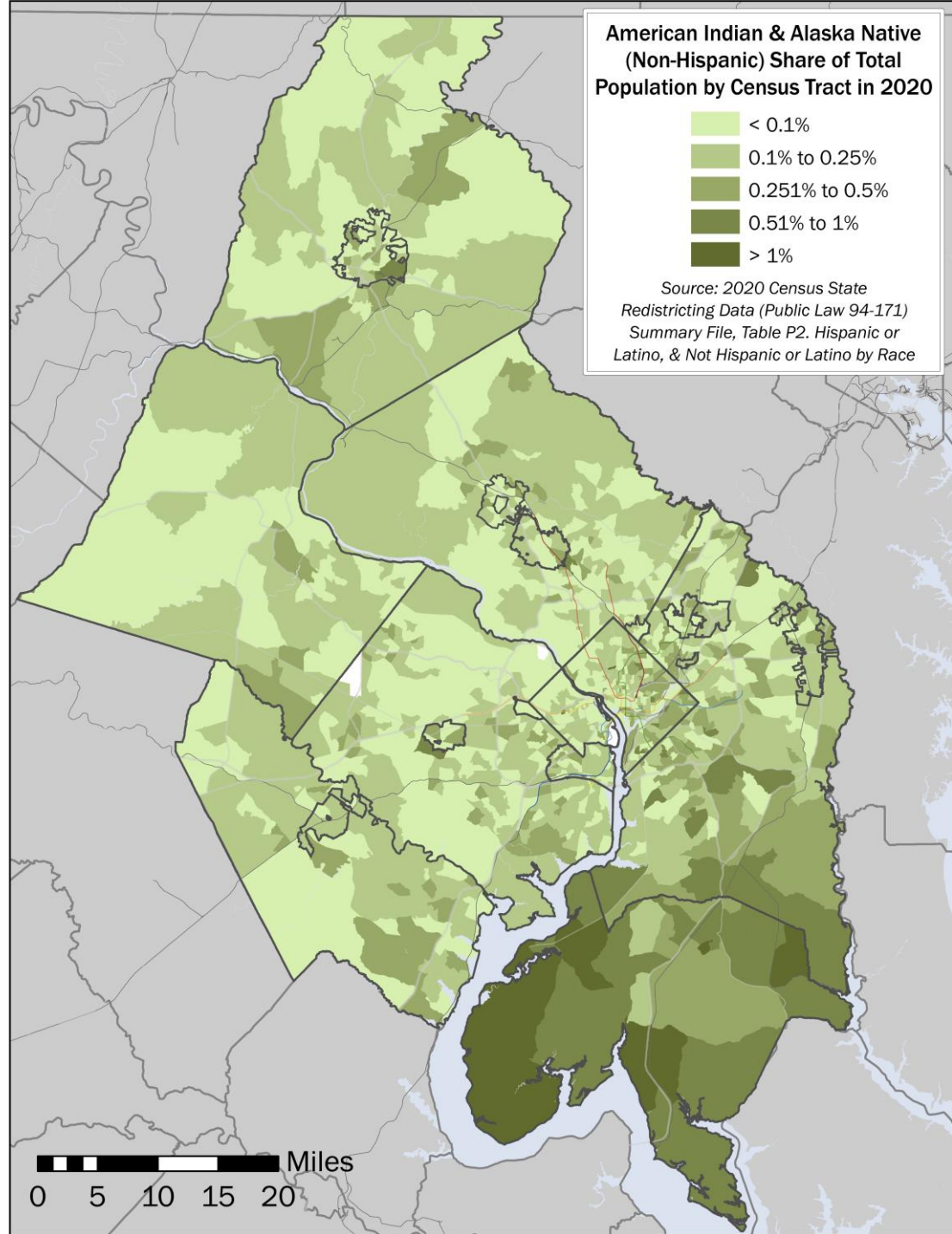
- The population of Non-Hispanic Whites was the only racial or ethnic group with a decline (-3%) from 2010 to 2020.
- Non-Hispanic Whites remain the largest demographic group in the COG region, with a population of 2,246,753.
- Whites are less numerous in Prince George's County and the eastern portions of Prince William and Montgomery Counties and the District of Columbia.



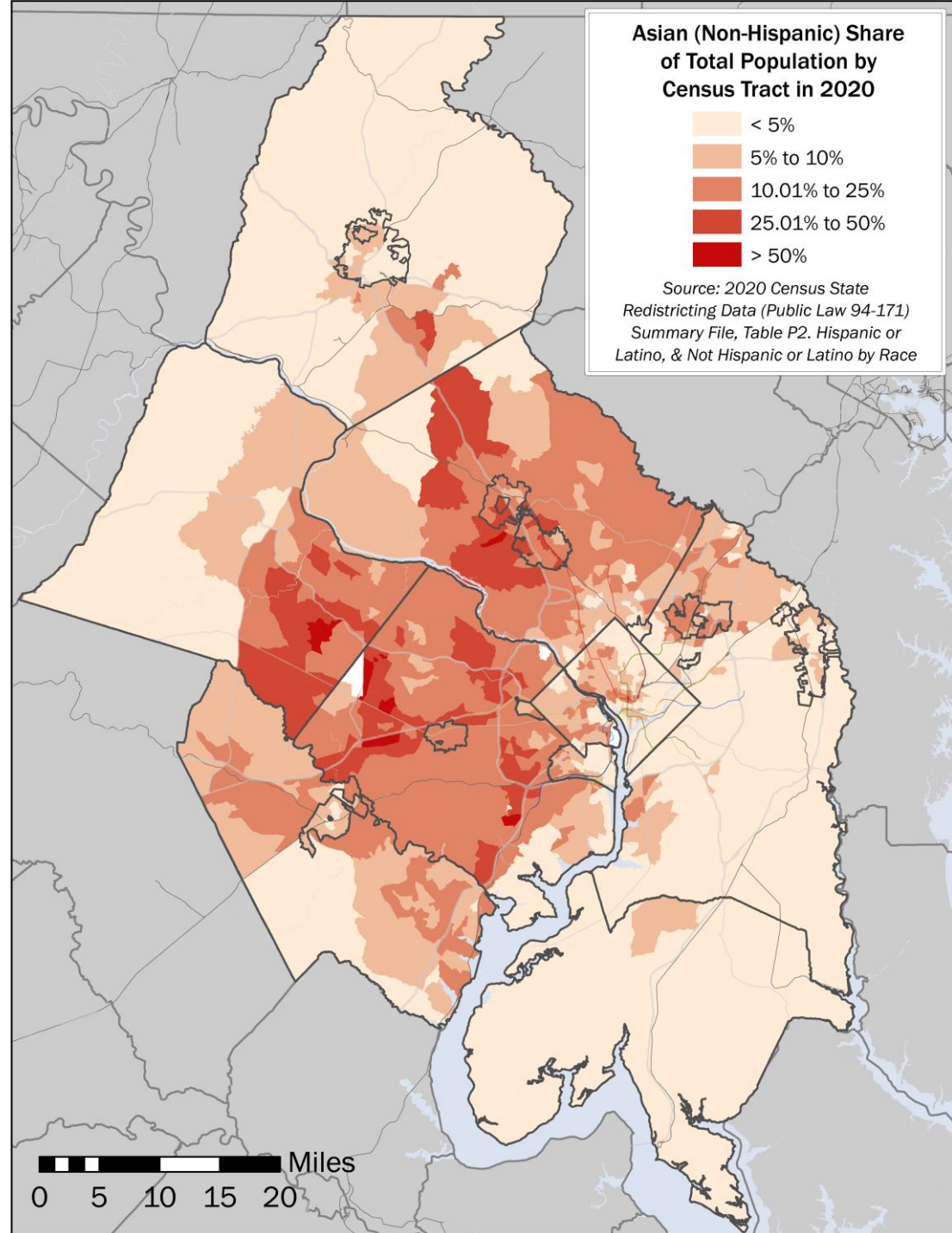
- The Non-Hispanic Black population is more segregated and concentrated than any other in the COG region.
- About 2/3 of the Non-Hispanic Black population of the region lives in either Prince George's County, the District of Columbia or Charles County.
- From 2010 to 2020, the Black population increased in every jurisdiction, except for the District of Columbia.
- However, Non-Hispanic Blacks remain the largest demographic group in the District of Columbia, with a population of 282,066.
- Overall, the population grew by 7% (106,141) since 2010.



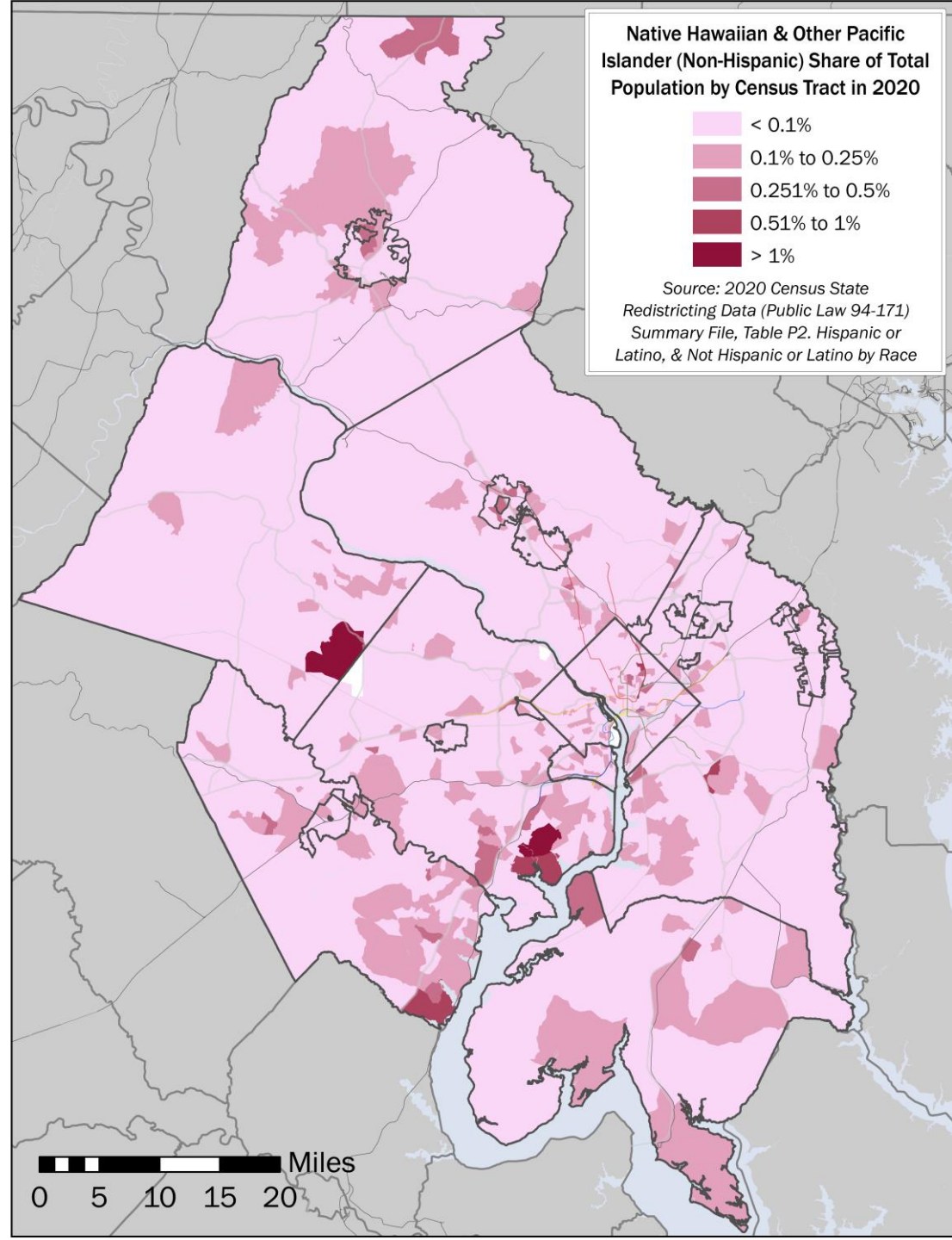
- Non-Hispanic Native Americans make up less than 1% of the region's population (9,278).
- Prince George's, Prince William and Charles County have the largest share of Non-Hispanic Native Americans.
- While the overall share of Charles County is below that on Prince George's County, in sparsely populated parts of Charles County, Non-Hispanic Native Americans make up more than 1% of the population.



- The Non-Hispanic Asian population is the 2nd fastest growing demographic group in the COG region, with significant Asian communities in Fairfax, Loudoun and Montgomery Counties.
- The Asian population is diverse and widely distributed around the region, except for large parts of Prince George's, Charles and Frederick Counties.
- The population grew by 26% (174,412) since 2010 and accounted for just over a ¼ of total growth during the period.

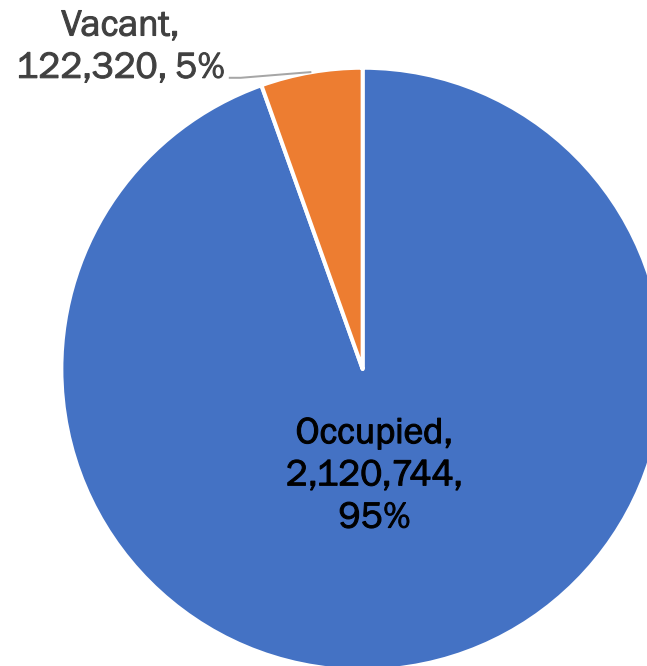


- At 3,177, the Non-Hispanic Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander population is the smallest demographic group in the COG region.
- The group is evenly, albeit thinly, distributed, with no readily apparent pattern of clustering.



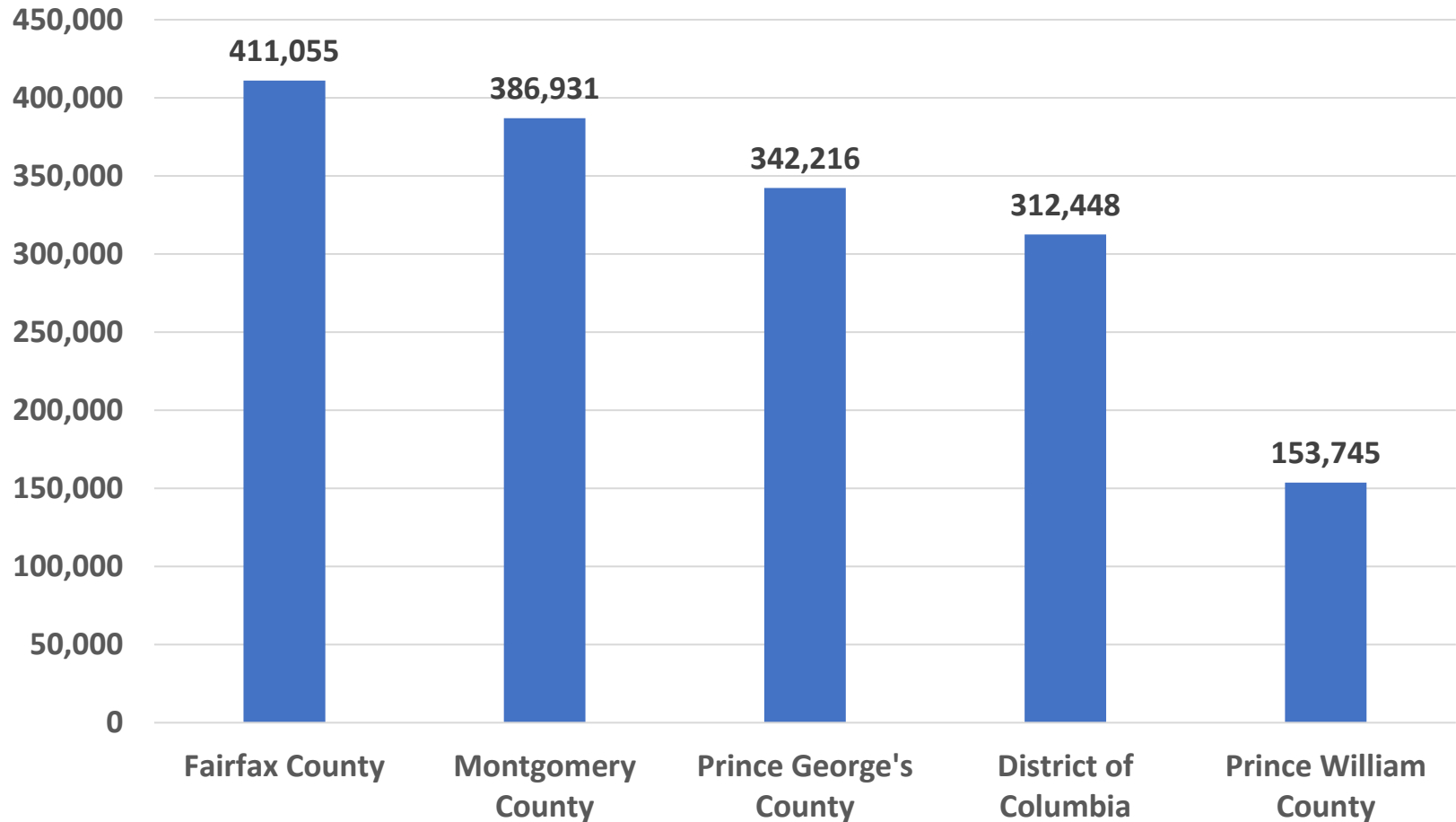
2020 Census Housing Occupancy Status

COG Region Total Housing Units



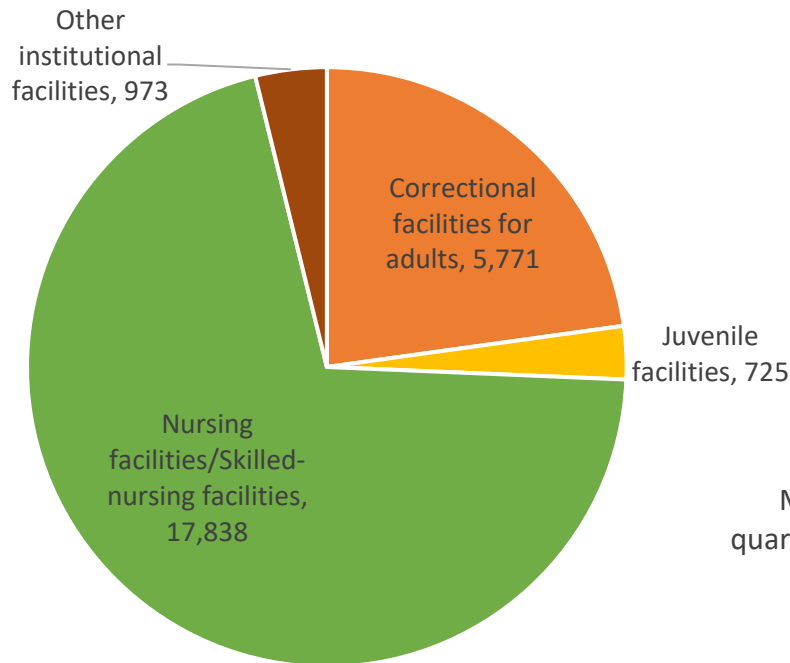
Occupied Housing Units = “Households”

Nearly 72 percent of the Region's Households are in these Jurisdictions

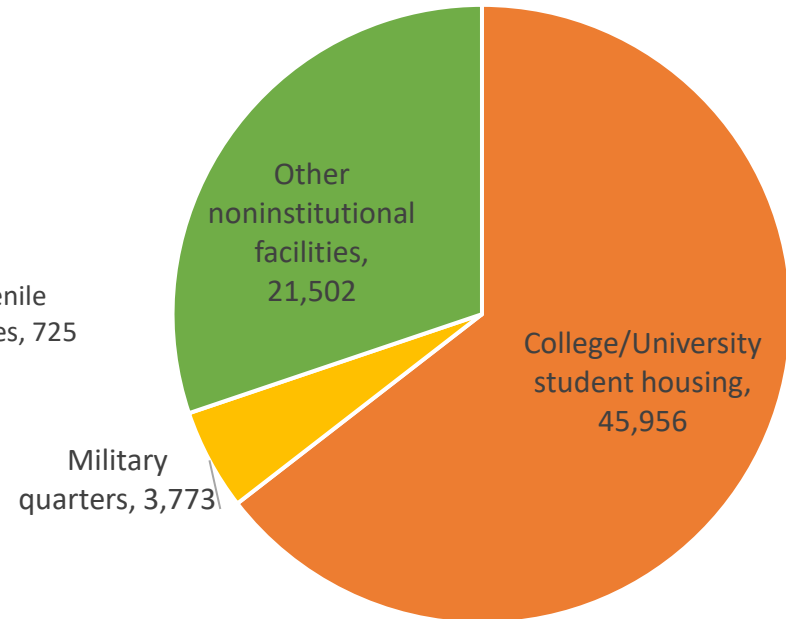


2020 Census Group Quarters Population
