- Universal endorsement by local superintendents in support of our federal requests for funding.





Area education systems have a set of unique challenges:

- Low-income students in the region's low-performing schools are graduating with the minimum literacy and numeracy skills.
- Low performing schools as well as poor and immigrant children are particularly behind in realizing the benefits of educational technology.
- COG school systems face higher building costs, higher salaries, and higher transportation costs than other schools in Maryland and Virginia.
- The National Capital region is a primary target area for terrorism and that imposes enormous new costs on school systems



COG Regional Office for Education

- This COG education office will coordinate regional school system and universities in their response to our unique regional educational challenges
- Technology solutions were identified by COG's school districts identified as the primary issue for coordination and cooperation.
- Projects and activities to be undertaken by the COG regional education office will include:
 - Professional development in technology for teachers
 - Out of school programs utilizing computer labs for students
 - Group technology purchases for PREP partners
 - Training IT support personnel for schools
 - Online school to career programs with PREP partners
 - Online advanced placement courses with PREP partners
 - Online Regional School to Careers Program
 - Online homeland security programs with PREP partners
 - Research partnership with higher education institutions
 - Federal government relations for the PREP partnership
 - PREP revenue-producing services, i.e., technical assistance and evaluation



Disease Surveillance Annex: Adding **ESSENCE**




- Electronic Surveillance System for the Early Notification of Community-based Epidemics

Previous Information Flow Did Not Provide a Clear Regional View




NCR Disease Surveillance Network


Initial Deployment


