BACKGROUND and EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bike to Work Day has been held annually in the Washington metropolitan region with a main rallying point or Pit Stop in downtown DC. This event has been coordinated by the Washington Area Bicyclists Association (WABA) for over a decade. In September 2000, the Commuter Connections program as a part of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments partnered with WABA to form a regional Bike To Work Day 2001 Steering Committee to examine the feasibility of adding additional Bike To Work Day Pit Stops or rallying points throughout the region, thus creating a larger awareness of using cycling to work as a viable commuting alternative. Since that first involvement with Bike to Work Day in 2001, registration for the event has grown with more participants signing up every year.

For the ninth year in a row, Bike to Work Day planning began in the fall of 2009 for the 2010 May 21st event. The Steering Committee's goal for the event was set at 8,415, a 10% increase above the total registration mark set in 2009 of 7,640 registrants.

Overall the May 21, 2010 event generated over 9,000* registrants. The approximate breakdown of registrants by pit stop was:

Bicyclists enjoyed free T-shirts, snacks, participated in prize drawings, heard live bands as well as music spun by DJs, and listened and talked to elected officials. Commuter Connections was able to secure \$47,500 in sponsorship fees that went towards the overall regional marketing efforts.

The Steering Committee's resources to reach its goal of 8,415 cyclists on Bike To Work Day (BTWD) 2010, included:

- > Web site designed and maintained by WABA
- > Posters and rack cards developed and printed by Commuter Connections.
- > Promoting the event through WABA's membership.
- Providing links from the local Transportation Management Associations' (TMA) web sites to WABA's site.
- Donated ad space by downtown Circulator buses
- > A radio media campaign by Commuter Connections.
- Outreach to employers through a direct mail marketing and email campaign by Commuter Connections.
- > An article geared towards employers in the Commuter Connections newsletter.
- Local marketing efforts by the various pit stop managers.
- A direct e-mail solicitation and reminder to the previous year's participants to register and have others register as well.
- > Banners designed and printed by Commuter Connections.
- A public affairs outreach effort through the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Public Affairs Office, Commuter Connections and WABA
- > The design and distribution of free t-shirts by Commuter Connections
- > Donated giveaway prizes obtained through City Bikes.
- GSA deployed table tent cards through its food services division and also donated water bottles for the event

In addition, 28 bicycling convoy routes were identified by WABA along with route leaders who assisted novice and experienced cyclists through the routes. Each route traveled to a Pit Stop where cyclists received free refreshments, snacks, t-shirts and water bottles. Many Pit Stops had other activities for bicyclists and are described later in this report. The routes were also posted on the WABA web site and allowed individuals to refer to the routes even if they could not join the convoys at the specified departure times. Cue sheets for the Bike to Work Day convoy route remain accessible through WABA's web site.

In 2000, the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Commuter Connections program chose to increase awareness of bicycling to work as a viable option by joining the Washington Area Bicyclist Association (WABA) in their efforts to promote and coordinate the annual Bike to Work Day event. Commuter Connections created a regional marketing effort that increased the number of cyclists participating in the yearly event nearly 30% from 2001 to 2008. Although it accounts for a small percentage of the overall regional

commute mode split, bicycling helps reduce traffic congestion, improves air quality, and provides a healthy commute alternative for those commuters who choose to use it as a viable means of transportation to and from work.

In the Fiscal Year 2006 Commuter Connections Work Program, the Bike to Work Day Event was given a line item for the Commuter Connections budget. Commuter Connections is funded by the District of Columbia Department of Transportation and the Maryland and Virginia Departments of Transportation as well as the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The marketing materials used for the 2010 BTWD campaign were targeted to employers and cyclists in chosen target markets through the region. The rack cards and poster materials were distributed to employers and building sites through concierge services to a majority of the region's bicycle shops through WABA, and through a direct e-mail campaign that led to a customized web site. The direct e-mail was sent to the 2009 registrants as a reminder. The radio campaign highlighted personal and tangible benefits a commuter would realize by bicycling to work. WABA staff designed and maintained the event web site to market the program and allow participants to register for the event. Commuter Connections and also designed and maintained a web site for information and registration links to the WABA site. Partner organizations included links from their websites to the registration page for the event.

The success of the marketing promotion campaign relied upon the analysis of the employer and commuter markets, identification of cost-effective mediums, and key messages and giveaway items such as t-shirts and water bottles designed to attract commuters to try bicycling to work.

The National Capitol Region Transportation Planning Board at COG issued a regional proclamation on April 21st, 2010 designating May 21st as the Regional Bike To Work Day. The proclamation discussed the benefits of bicycling for the region, individual communities and commuters. It also acknowledged that the month of May is Clean Air Month and National Bike Month. Additional proclamations were made by the Commonwealth of Virginia, District of Columbia, the State of Maryland as well as the individual jurisdictions that hosted pit stops.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM AREA "PIT-STOPS"

Alexandria: A strong registration number of 602 ensured that attendees would number over 500 and such was the case for the City Hall pit stop on King Street. Hundreds of bicycle commuters converged to Market Square on the morning of Friday, May 21, for the City of Alexandria's Bike to Work Day. Better weather could not have been asked for as the City's "pit stop" saw a record number of bikers show up to celebrate the most efficient and healthiest way to commute. Overall, the region saw 9,000 people register for this great event. At Market Square volunteers and City Staff coordinated free bicycle parking and helped work the busy registration table. Whole Foods provided riders free breakfast fare of fruit and juice. A Messenger Bag by Louis Garneau was raffled off in addition to a two day stay at the Monaco Hotel and a Jamis 3 commuter bike from Wheel Nuts. Other local sponsoring groups included; Le Pain Quotidien, Cosi, Bread and Chocolate, Brueggers Bagels, St. Elmo's Coffee and Pub, Snack Shak, Big Wheel Bikes, REI, and Bicycle Pro Shop. Among the riders were City of Alexandria Mayor William D. Euille, who greeted commuters and took time to address everyone and City Manager James K. Hartman.

Arlington Ballston: The Ballston pit stop was hosted by Conte's Bike Shop and the Ballston Partnership. DJ Neekola entertained the crowd while volunteers handed out t-shirts at registration. Various raffle prizes were also given out at Ballston and there were a number of partner organizations on hand including, Team In Training, Ebikes+, MS Ride, Tour De Cure, Arlington County PD, Arlingtonians for a Clean Environment, and Arlington Transportation Partners. Refreshments included bananas and power bars from Whole Foods and coffee and fresh bagels from Brueggers Bagels. County Board Member Walter Tejada stopped by to check out things and an old fashioned Penny Farthing bicycle from the 1800s attracted a lot of attention. The weather was great, so almost all of the registered attendees showed up, including many day-of registrants as well. A special thanks goes out to all the partnering organizations as well as all the wonderful volunteers, without which such a successful event could not have come to fruition.

Arlington Rosslyn: Bike to Work Day 2010 was a great success. For the first time in recent memory, the weather was beautiful and there was a great turn out for the Rosslyn and Ballston pit stops. There were 700 registered riders for Rosslyn and 314 registered riders for the brand new stop at Ballston. In the past, Rosslyn has received up to 800 registered riders, so we were very pleased to garner more than 1,000 registrants overall.

The Rosslyn pit stop was again held at Gateway Park. DJ Kirk Rubley played a good set of upbeat music to keep the crowd pumped up as t-shirts were handed out at registration. More than 30 raffle prizes were given out, ranging from water bottle cages and socks, to new helmets and tire pumps. Refreshments included bananas and energy bars from Whole Foods, muffins and coffee from the Java Shack, as well as tea, water, and various other snacks. The turnout was so great a mid-event run to Safeway to pick up additional granola bars was required. BikeArlington swag such as water bottles, bags, pant straps, bells, buttons were all a big hit. Partner organizations on hand included, Honest Tea, Pedego, REI, BikeDC, ACCOR, ZipCar, MS Ride, Tour de Cure, Revolution Cycles, YMCA, Phoenix Bikes, Arlington County PD, the ACCS Events Team, and Arlington Transportation Partners.

The Car Free Diet campaign announced the winner of their 30 Day Car Free Diet Skeptics and Chairman of the Arlington County Board, Jay Fisette announced the news that a large scale regional bike-sharing program will be coming to Virginia and Washington, DC. this fall. Media from Washington Post, WAMU Radio, Arlington NOW, and AVN were on hand for this groundbreaking announcement.

Bethesda: The Bethesda Pit Stop had 717 registered cyclists, and 484 of those were onsite, a nearly 40% increase over 2009.

Delegate Bill Frick served as the official Bike to Work Day emcee, and a DJ entertained the crowd between all of the dignitary speeches and presentations. Proclamations from Montgomery County and the State of Maryland were read by County and State officials. Dignitaries present were:

Food and refreshments were donated from many different Bethesda businesses. Prize winners were announced every few minutes – close to 50 prizes were donated and raffled off through free random drawings of tickets. Prizes included various gift certificates, bike accessories, and a bicycle donated by Griffin Cycle. Several businesses were provided tables with representatives at the event, informing attendees of their services and products.

Delegate Frick also helped present Bethesda's 6th Annual Bicycle Commuter Spirit Awards. This year's *Most Committed Bicycle Commuter* went to Brian Barnes of CoStar Group, who has been biking competitively since moving to the DC area 12 years ago. He has been commuting by bicycle for the better part of 5 years and says that it's definitely a great way to start his day. His commute is about 30 minutes total, about the same amount of time it takes by car and he enjoys every minute of it! After work, he is on the road for more training miles. *Longest Distance Commuted By Bike* went to Christoph Mueller, of OPNET Technologies, for biking about 16 miles each way to and from his home in Montgomery County.

Bike to Work Day event partners and sponsors included: Calvert Group, Griffin Cycle, REI - College Park, City Bikes - Chevy Chase, American Diabetes Association, Bikes for the World, The Montgomery County Police Department, Zipcar, Equinox Fitness Clubs, Caribou Coffee, Whole Foods, Honest Tea, Spring Mill Bread Company, Bethesda Bagels, The Palisades of Bethesda, A&E Day Spa, Unity Woods Yoga Center, Hard Times Café, Ben & Jerry's, and Gifford's.

Bethesda Naval Medical Center: Morale Welfare and Recreation hosted the event in which 110 picked up their t-shirts at the pit stop. A light breakfast was served with

fresh fruit. Giveaways included gear from MWR that included towels, thermoses and bicycle wear.

Bowie Town Center and Bowie Old Town: Over 75 registered for the pit stops in Bowie.

Burke: New this year was the Burke pit stop held at the Burke VRE (Virginia Railway Express Station/Park and Ride lot. The pit stop was sponsored by the Fairfax County Department of Transportation, Virginia Railway Express, and the Bike Lane. There was a good turn-out considering that this was Burke's first year. A big thank you goes out to all the volunteers and local sponsors including: The Bike Lane (providing bike tune ups and safety checks, VRE, Wegman's, City Bikes, and Honest Tea.

Buzzards Point: The US Coast Guard (USCG) Headquarters hosted its first official Pit Stop on Buzzards Point with 114 registered riders and an additional 20+ walk-ups. USCG provided one of a kind USCG Bicycling Socks designed specifically for BTWD as well as food, refreshments, and music to all participants. Over 40 of the participants joined Rear Admiral John Korn, the USCG's Director of Acquisition Programs in a convoy to the Freedom Plaza Pit Stop where Rear Admiral Korn spoke at the National Rally about USCG efforts to promote bicycling as a viable commuting option. In addition the USCG raffled off two USCG bike jerseys.

Prior to the official Pit Stop, the USCG hosted week long lunch time clinics on bike repair and maintained, stretching techniques, and a power challenge. The USCG also took the opportunity to unveil its newly established professional bicycle repair locker and 20 free rental bikes available for USCG personnel.

College Park: With 151 registrants expected the event drew great crowds and was buoyed by the bicycle routes that passed by the pit stop. The City of College Park had a great turn out for Bike to Work Day with 113 riders passing through the pit stop. City employees and members of the City's Committee for a Better Environment (CBE) helped staff the event and CBE sponsored the purchase of coffee. The Bagel Place donated bagels, My Organic Market donated fresh fruit, Honest Tea donated tea, and an REI bike tech was on hand for tune-ups.

The Prince George's County Department of Public Works and Transportation, the University of Maryland University Police, the University of Maryland Department of Transportation Services, and the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission provided bike safety tools, tips and registration, as well as information on new trails in the planning process. Distinguished guests included College Park City Council Member Patrick Wojahn.

Crystal City: With over 300 registrants and over 250 participants the pit stop in Crystal City enjoyed a large success.

DC Freedom Plaza: Good weather and the expected 1,800 registrants provided a strong showing at Freedom Plaza.

Fairfax County Government Center-Fairfax Corner: This pit stop is co-sponsored by the Fairfax County's Department of Transportation and LiveWell program, REI, and Fairfax

Corner. This year's good weather brought out a record number of participants. Bike mechanical support was again provided by the folks at REI. Fairfax Connector Staff was on hand to demonstrate the front mount bicycle racks on the system bus fleet. Refreshments and gifts were generously provided by Caribou Coffee, REI, Wegmans, the Peterson Management Company, Great American Restaurants, Honest Tea, and the American Diabetes Association.

Fairfax: The City of Fairfax pit stop had over 80 registrants with over 70 in attendance on the day of the event.

Frederick: Nearly 130 cyclists visited the Frederick pit stop at the Frederick Transit Center (MARC train station) for this yearly celebration of bicycle commuting—a 28% increase in attendance! Among the participants were County Commissioners, Frederick City Mayor, Alderman, Frederick Police, and employees from local businesses such as Bechtel, Wells Fargo, Fairchild, and others. Several Frederick City employees rode the special conference bike pictured below! All participants enjoyed free food, beverages, and giveaway items, as well as were entered into a drawing for a chance to win a bicycle. Ms. T. Ervin was this year's winner of the Breezer Greenway donated by The Bicycle Escape.

Herndon: For its first year as a Pit Stop, Herndon was excited to have just over 200 registered riders. With great riding weather, the team from A-1 Cycling, the Town of Herndon Pedestrian and Bicycle Advisory committee, and Parks and Recreation staff set up the pit stop featuring a variety of healthy snacks, including Einstein Bagels and cold drinks from sponsor Honest Tea. The location adjacent to the W&OD trail on the town hall green worked effectively for visibility to riders heading east and west. 120 riders checked in and many others passed through the check point on their way to Reston or points beyond. Registered riders could sign up for a raffle of dozens of prizes donated by A-1 Cycling as well as the grand prize, a bike provided by Giant Bicycles. Mechanical support and safety checks were available from A-1 Cycling as well as Fairfax County information and resource materials for folks to take home.

Hyattsville: 100 riders registered for the pit stop and many more passed by en route to the Freedom Plaza pit stop.

Indian Head: On Friday, May 21st, the Tri-County Council for Southern Maryland in cooperation with Charles County Government, The Town of Indian Head, and the Naval Support Activity South Potomac held a pit stop event with 19 cyclists who registered. Over 100 participants came to the event. T-Bone provided entertainment and interviewed several of the attendees. The USO gave away several bicycles to school children from the neighboring school. Charles County Sheriff's Office gave demo on bike safety. There were several proclamations read on bicycling in Southern Maryland. Promotional materials were given out to school children in attendance.

Leesburg: With picture perfect weather, generous local sponsors and enthusiastic riders contributed to the success at the Leesburg Pit Stop. With 231 individuals registered, and a total of 172 participants visited the stop and picked up their t-shirts on Bike to Work Day. Staff from Loudoun County distributed two specialty items this year—sun block sticks and reflective safety bands. A light breakfast was served featuring fresh fruit, pastries, beverages and grab and go snacks. (Clif Bars were especially popular). A tech crew from

Bicycle Outfitters was on-hand to assist with repairs and conduct bike safety checks. A representative from BikeLoudoun helped welcome riders. Several raffle prizes were distributed, including a "grand prize" bicycle. All local sponsors were recognized with thank you letters, a photo collage and post-event print ads in local papers.

Manassas GMU: This was the first time pit stop not only in Manassas but in Prince William County as a whole. The B2WD Banner was displayed at the Freedom Aquatic & Fitness Center. There 63 cyclists registered and 45 cyclists participated by biking to work and stopping at the pit stop. There was technical support from A-1 Cycling in Manassas and Haymarket Bicycles. Supervisor Covington, Prince William County Board of County Supervisors, was on hand to talk to participants. Andy Harrover, Vice-Mayor of the City of Manassas, rode his bike to the pit stop and talked to participants. Caribou Coffee donated 5 gallons of coffee for the event and Freedom Aquatic & Fitness Center donated water bottles for all registered participants and passes to the fitness center for random drawing prizes. Prince William County Transportation Department purchased bike light sets at cost from Haymarket Bicycles for random drawing prizes. An article was published in the News Messenger @ InsideNoVa.com.

North Bethesda: Bike to Work Day 2010 at North Bethesda pit stop turned out to be sunny and warm for close to 200 people at White Flint Mall, the new location. All registered cyclists received a Bike to Work Day T-shirt, water bottle, pedometer, and various bike maps. Throughout the event we gave away prizes every 15 minutes and played "Name that Tune" for additional prizes. The raffles and games were conducted by the North Bethesda staff and the DJ hired for the event. The cyclists were treated to prizes and food donations by the following companies; Bertucci's, Bob's Bike, Great Harvest Bread Company, Honest Tea, Marriott International, MOM's Organic Market, Connect by Hertz, Columbia Bank and White Flint Mall. Food was also provided By North Bethesda TMD.

Roger Berliner, Montgomery County Councilman, presented Dr. Carolyn Hendricks, this year's "Super Hero Cyclist" award winner. Dr. Hendricks is committed to biking 5 days a week and only missed a few days riding to work during the blizzard in January! She takes this commitment seriously to reduce the carbon footprint and encourages all of her employees to do whatever they can to further the cause.

The grand prize, a brand new bike was donated by Bob's Bikes, and was awarded to Elise Heumann from U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission. She was one of the first cyclists to arrive at the event and has been cycling to the North Bethesda pit stop for many years.

NIH: Including those who registered and Obike-ins¹, we had 633 NIH bikers represented this year! 494 people actually attended the event - 117 more than last year. Total miles commuted (round trip): 4904! These were all records for NIH. A couple of highlights:

1. NIH director, Francis Collins, bicycled to work for the first time and attended the Building One pit stop with his wife, Diane, from North Bethesda.

2. The Building One pit stop was garbage-free (a first)! All of the refuse generated was either recycled or composted.

3. The three longest distance round trip bike commutes logged were: Jim Nagle (47 miles, Reston to Bldg 1), Jonathan Ivins (44 miles, Germantown to Rockledge), and James Schuttinga (44 miles, Annandale to Bldg 1). Way to go riders!

Reston: More than 400 cyclists celebrated Bike to Work Day on Friday, May 21 at the Reston Town Center. The U.S. Geological Survey had the most participants (42).

The winner of this year's Employer Challenge was the National Wildlife Federation located in Reston. Bike to Work Day registrants were asked to nominate their employers based on how well they encourage employees to bike to work. Employees of the National Wildlife Federation are able to use the \$20/month Bicycle Commuter benefit, have access to showers and changing facilities, and have access to a fleet of bicycles for short trips during the day. Whole Foods Market provided a free catered lunch to the winners.

Delegate Ken Plum, Hunter Mill District Supervisor Cathy Hudgins, and Reston Association President Kathleen Driscoll-McKee addressed the crowd. "Bicycling is recognized as an important part of the transportation infrastructure around the world. By coming out to support Bike to Work Day, you are in the forefront of a movement to use bicycles for transportation in our daily lives," said Driscoll-McKee.

Reston Bike to Work Day is organized by the Fairfax Advocates for Better Bicycling, Reston Bike Club, The Bike Lane, Reston Association, Reston Town Center Association, and Friends of the W&OD Trail, with the help of many local sponsors including Great Harvest Bread Co., Whole Foods Market, and Mon Ami Gabi/Community Canteen.

Rockville: Rockville Town Center Pit Stop registered 157 participants this year online. Music was provided by DJ Ultimate Entertainment. Bike checks were done by the Green Commuter and Silver Cycles; bike registrations were done by the Montgomery County Police. 

Bike to Work Day Sets New Record with Over 9,200 Registrants Commuters and Dignitaries Come Together to Support Annual Event

Washington, D.C.—Over 9,200 commuters took to the streets on two wheels today, celebrating Bike to Work Day 2010. - 3. Reminds all members of the importance of safety as illustrated by the Street Smart Campaign.




