## **Rise in Homeless Population Garners Attention**

Initial results from the annual homeless enumeration, showing a slight increase in homelessness, were released at the April COG Board of Directors meeting. The release was covered in *The Washington Post*, WTOP, the *Washington Examiner*, the *Afro-American*, the *Alexandria Sun-Gazette*, Arlington Now, *StreetSense*, and the Georgetown Patch.

## **Metro Washington's Green Building Success**
