


Single Adults Experiencing Chronic Homelessness





Racial Disparities in Who Experiences Homelessness in our Region


Regional All Adults Literally Homeless: Race & Ethnicity






Ending Veteran Homelessness

More Seniors Are Experiencing Homelessness


Age Distribution of Single Adults Experiencing Homelessness

Beyond Point-in-Time: Built for Zero


Point-in-Time provides data on one day only, but who experiences homelessness changes daily

 Built for Zero is a methodology and a framework

Goal: Functional Zero

 Threshold where housing placements keep pace with people newly experiencing homelessness at any given time

Bakersfield/Kern County, CA reaches functional zero for chronic homelessness





Partnership with Community Solutions

- COG serves as Regional "Backbone Organization"
 - Coordinates implementation of Built for Zero methodology for entire region
 - 3 years of technical assistance to COG staff and jurisdictions through dedicated Community Solutions staff coaching
 - Has the potential to transform the work of COG's Homeless Services Committee and regional collaboration to prevent and end homelessness




Built for Zero in Metropolitan Washington

- 4 long-term partners with Community Solutions:
 - Arlington County (since 2015)
 - District of Columbia (since 2015)
 - Fairfax County (since 2018)
 - Montgomery County (since 2015)
- 4 jurisdictions new to Built for Zero in 2024:
 - City of Alexandria
 - Loudoun County
 - Prince George's County
 - Prince William County



Looking Ahead: Built for Zero

- New jurisdictions work to achieve Quality By-Name Data
- Engage partners at the Veterans Administration
- October: Review progress from first
 6 months and draft new 6-month
 action plan





Key Takeaways

- Homelessness (as measured on one day in January) is rising and now exceeds prepandemic levels. This points to larger systemic impacts from the end of COVID-era protections, federally-funded housing assistance programs, and steeply rising housing costs.
- More people are being housed than at any time in the past, but a greater number of people are losing their housing and entering the homeless services system.
- Working at the regional level in a coordinated, shared approach through Built For Zero has the potential to drive down homelessness at the community level.
- More deeply affordable housing (and services as needed) is the solution to preventing and ending homelessness in metropolitan Washington.



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
