TLC Program Background

The TLC Program was designed to support key strategies in the TPB's Regional Mobility and Accessibility Scenario Study and promote implementation of TPB Vision goals:

- Promote development efforts that bring housing and jobs in closer proximity
- Focus mixed-use development around transit stations
- Foster better inter-jurisdictional coordination of transportation and land use planning



Program Components

The TLC Program began in November 2006 with two components:

Regional Clearinghouse

 Web-based source of information about local and national transportation and land-use coordination

Technical Assistance Program

 Focused consultant assistance available to local jurisdictions working on innovative, coordinated plans and projects integrating transportation and land-use

Regional Clearinghouse

The TLC Clearinghouse is an information resource for government agencies, community groups, and individuals


- National/Regional Strategies and Resources
 - Best practices for enhancing transportation and land-use from across the country, including region-wide examples
- Regional Peer Exchange Network
 - Share work from past TLC technical assistance projects

TLC Technical Assistance Summary

56 Technical Assistance Projects funded at \$1,700,000:

- 8 in the District
- 28 in Maryland
- 18 in Virginia
- 2 Regional



Projects address common challenges:

- Bike/Ped Issues
- Complete Streets
- Enhancements to Transit Access
- Freight



Past TLC Project Strengths

Key components of previously funded projects:

- Time Investment: Key jurisdiction staff are available and committed to participating in the project.
- Integrated Project: Collaboration within the jurisdiction from various departments, collaboration with outside partner agencies, and connection to other jurisdiction efforts.
- Simplicity/Clarity: Project has a clear scope of work, budget, and anticipated deliverables. The project scope is wellarticulated and defines the purpose of the project, including how the product will be used by the jurisdiction.

Prince George's Plaza – Complete Streets

The consultant identified \$1.9 million in improvements:

- Accommodations needed for bicyclists and pedestrians
- Gaps in the existing pedestrian bicycle network
- Potential retrofit opportunities
- Upgrades to an area built for the automobile, but experiencing increased bicycle and pedestrian use with the construction of new dense, mixed use development



City of Falls Church – Corridor Planning

The TLC study focused on South Washington Street

- The consultant recommended short- and long-term improvements to Washington Street.
- These recommendations include potential new traffic signal locations, intersection realignments, and other forms of traffic calming.
- As a result of recommendations from the TLC project, the City will be able to incorporate pedestrian improvements into a federal earmark for an intermodal plaza located within the TLC study area.

Charles County – Waldorf Vision and Goals

The TLC study focused on transforming Waldorf

- The goal of the study was to create a vision for a vibrant urban center in Waldorf:
 - Mixed-use, higher-density, walkable downtown
 - Supportive of a regional transit hub
 - Attractive multimodal streets and parks and open spaces
- The Waldorf Urban Transportation Improvement Plan:
 - Created an implementation plan for transportation infrastructure
 - Developed a priority & phasing plan for improvements
 - Developed costs estimates for improvements
 - Determined public investments vs. privately funded improvements
 - Investigated funding mechanisms for improvements

District of Columbia – NoMa Streetscaping

The NoMa BID (with DDOT) used TLC funding to develop a streetscaping plan for the Florida/New York Avenue intersection and along 1st Street, NE

- The BID leveraged the TLC study to receive an additional \$300,000 in grant funding for TE and public art
- The BID worked with DDOT, Capital Bikeshare, developers, and tenants to create a streetscape that is friendly to multimodal movement, innovative in low-impact development techniques, and full of public art

FY 2013 Project Solicitation

- March 6, 2012 Release call for projects
- March 23, 2012 Host Application Workshop
- March 29, 2012 Optional Abstracts due: 4:00 p.m.
- April 17, 2012 Abstract feedback provided
- May 16, 2012 Project applications due: 4:00 p.m.
- June 2012 Convene TLC selection panel to recommend projects for funding
- July 18, 2012 Anticipated TPB approval of projects

FY 2013 Available Funding

- Applicants may apply for \$20,000 \$60,000 in technical assistance.
- The TPB will provide \$220,000 for TLC technical assistance projects.
 - Up to \$80,000 will be available for a design pilot project
 - The remaining \$140,000 will used for planning projects
- The Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) is expected to commit \$160,000 in funding for projects in Maryland.
 - MDOT has expressed interest in funding projects that focus on Transit-Oriented Development, an ongoing goal within the state.
