


STEER Stop, Triage, Engage Educate, Rehabilitate

- Established as a part of the Crisis Intervention Team
- Grant funded joint initiative with DHHS and Maryland Treatment Centers
- Deflection model vs. LEAD
- Originally intended as a real time, street outreach model
- Adapted to pair with our overdose response enforcement efforts
- Assessments and on demand services at critical period after near death overdose experience



STEER Stop, Triage, Engage Educate, Rehabilitate

- 200 referrals
- 79 completed the STEER screening
- 48 engaged in treatment
- 45 compliant after 30 days
- 33 compliant after 60 days



Speak Up Save a Life

- Partnership with the State's Attorneys Office
- Presented in MCPS and community groups
- Over 20,000 students have received the presentation



PERF Conferences

Blue Angel Model Gloucester, Massachusetts PD

- Encourages addicts and their loved ones to come to the police station to seek treatment assistance
- Paired with a volunteer "Angel" to help them through the process of getting into treatment

Arlington Opioid Outreach Initiative Arlington, Massachusetts PD

- Takes public available data from 9-1-1 CAD information to identify victims of overdose, arrest data, and community outreach
- Pairs with a clinician to use the data to conduct outreach to the addicts and family members

- Encourage opioid drug users to seek recovery
- •Help distribute life saving opioid blocking drugs to prevent and treat overdoses
- •Connect addicts with treatment programs and facilities
