#### **Primary Interests**

#### 1. Environmental Concerns/Environmental Justice.

I have substantial educational and work experience in the environmental field. I believe that all residents have a right to a healthy environment and transportation choices. I earned a Bachelor's of Science in Biology with a Minor in Environmental Studies from James Madison University in 1997. Relevant coursework includes landscape ecology, cultural geography, ecosystems, and environmental politics. After graduating, I worked as an environmental educator and Park Naturalist for a decade before returning to school for a Master's (see question 1). I led environmental programs for the public on a range of natural and cultural history topics, with an emphasis on environmental stewardship.

Later, in the Master's program, spatial analysis revealed disparities in many urban areas in terms of access to basic services including transportation, which sparked my interest in environmental justice. Graduate coursework relevant to this area included Environmental Policy Instruments, American Environmental Policy, and Water Resources Planning. Accomplishments during internships included composing a Strategic Energy Plan for a small town in North Carolina which contained transportation elements, research assessing indicators that measure the integration of land use and transportation, and consulting with businesses to increase their sustainability, including addressing transportation and land use issues. I'm currently creating a State of the Environment report for a North Carolina county which includes elements on air quality, transportation, and greenhouse gases, as well as water issues, biodiversity, environmental health, and parks (working remotely from the District).

#### 2. Land Use Issues, Smart Growth, Transit-Oriented Development.

My specialization in my Master's program was Land Use, so I am quite familiar with these issues. It is essential for regional success and livability to coordinate land use and transportation with careful site design. Relevant coursework includes: Transportation Policy, Land Use/Environmental Planning, Urban Spatial Structure, and Development/Environmental Management. In 2006, I completed a local course from the USDA Graduate School entitled 'Land Use Principles,' in which we examined regional smart growth issues. I volunteered with the local Coalition for Smarter Growth, contributing to local transit-oriented development campaigns. The environment, public health, and the economy benefit from compact, mixed-use development concentrated around transportation centers.

#### Secondary Interests

#### 1. Affordable Housing, Low-Income Issues, Downtown D.C.

Access to affordable housing and essential goods and services are key components of transportation planning. Although I have less professional experience in these areas, I have personal experience with these issues as a resident of a diverse (and expensive) city.

#### 2. Economic Development, Transportation Funding, Transit Advocacy

Considering the interplay between transportation investments and economic development is important in ensuring that key goals of a transportation system are met. If the funding playing field is skewed, it is more difficult for individuals to make the best choices. Courses I have taken in these areas include Transportation Policy, Microeconomics, and Regional Economic Development.

I am a member of the National Academies Transportation Research Board, and attend their conferences regularly. During the summer of 2010, I volunteered for the DC Weatherization Project, a local environmental and workforce development non-profit, performing Geographic Information Systems analysis. I am also a member and active volunteer on the DC Chapter Sierra Club Energy Committee, helping to plan and execute local educational and outreach events.

Experience: In direct relation to land-use, I've been actively interested in transportation and public transit as it affects my community (Takoma and Upper Georgia Avenue) since 2001. I've suggested (no doubt, one of several), promoted and supported the Express bus that is now running on Georgia Avenue and on 16th Street, and raised questions about how to effectively address commuter needs of Marylanders. I've promoted restoring the Metrobus shuttle that runs through the Walter Reed campus again. I've been an active member of a group that prevailed upon WMATA to change unsafe aspects of its proposed joint development project at the Takoma Metro Station. WMATA did change the 2 most serious problems.

As part of the Takoma Transportation Improvements Project, I've discussed with DDOT ways to mitigate undesirable effects of commuter traffic through Takoma's East-West route along a collector street with some success. More has yet to be done. Discussions have been held and proposals made to improve the safety and traffic flow along the principal North-South commuter route through the center of Takoma DC.


I am participating in workgroup sessions about improving and possibly expanding the Downtown DC Circulator bus system.

4. Is there any other information related to your serving as a member of the TPB Citizens Advisory Committee that you'd like to tell us about?

I am an Altermate member of the Walter Reed Local Redevelopment Authority Committee which has voted on a Final Draft Re-Use Plan for the 62.5 acres of the 113-acre Walter Reed Army Medical Center campus that the DC government is bidding on. Transportation issues are part of the Plan. Provided the US Army ultimately approves the LRA Re-Use Plan, these transportation plans will need to be fine-tuned. The redeveloped campus is expected to be a shoppers' and diners' destination. The Walter Reed campus is just a few blocks from the DC/Maryland line, and its southern boundary is along the East-West commuter route through Takoma DC.

Also, one of the four proposed Wal-Mart sites is a quarter of a block away from another E-W commuter route, Missouri Ave., as well as on a N-S commuter route, Georgia Ave. The proposed site is within ANC 4B, my Commission.

#### 1. Why are you interested in serving on the TPB's Citizen Advisory Committee?

For the past three years I have been an active advocate for the Purple Line light rail system, which will come through our immediate neighborhood on Wayne Avenue in Silver Spring. I've participated in our civic association meetings and have also attended the MTA presentations. In addition, I've attended the monthly MPAG (Master Plan Advisory Group – of the MNCPPC) meetings where the pros and cons of the Purple Line are debated. Besides letters to the County Council and Planning Board, I have testified at multiple public hearings on this issue.

On another issue, I organized people in my neighborhood to support a county plan to buy a nearby apartment house for the purpose of housing formerly homeless individuals. While many in the neighborhood were fearful of such a move, my next door neighbor and I were able to get a Letter to the Editor published in the Washington Post, collect signatures in support of the apartment project, and testify at a public hearing. In the end, the Housing Opportunities Commission approved the project, people moved in over a year ago, and all has been quiet. We are pleased that we were able to offer a safe haven of affordable housing within our middle-class neighborhood.

I think the CAC will provide a broader forum for discussing issues of relevance to the Metropolitan region. This will help me see how individual, local projects connect with the broader goals of transportation and land-use for the capital region, and how these projects compete for wider support and funding. While I hope to be able to share my views and passions on these issues, I also see this as an opportunity to learn more about planning and governance issues in our diverse community.



I have been a resident of the City of Alexandria for the past 6 years, and I work in Washington, D.C. I have never owned a car, or had a driver's license, so I bring a detailed knowledge of our region's public transportation network, and fellow transit riders, that can only be gained through experience. My educational background includes coursework in urban planning and environmental studies. I am a graduate of both the TPB's Community Leadership Institute and the City of Alexandria's Citizen's Academy. As such, I have developed an understanding of the challenges and opportunities inherent to regional transportation planning. I have participated extensively in the City of Alexandria's neighborhood planning process, advocating for smart growth development around the Braddock Road Metro Station. I have served as Chair of the City of Alexandria's Consumer Affairs Commission since November 2007. When the City launched a new financial education campaign last winter, I was involved in leading a group of City staff members, representatives of local non-profits and financial institutions, and citizens to plan a kickoff event and develop educational programs for citizens.

This spring, I became involved in organizing transit riders in the City of Alexandria to advocate for funding for mass transit, particularly funding for Metrobus and DASH subsidies, as part of the City's budget process. By reaching out to neighborhood associations, talking with riders directly at major transfer points, posting literature on community bulletin boards, and by creating a Facebook page, I was ultimately able to get the message out to riders. I continue to use the Facebook page to share information about the budget process and opportunities for public comment with transit riders. One of the major challenges in transportation planning is reaching out to transit users. I feel that I can bring valuable experience and perspective on this issue to the Advisory Committee.

Pedestrian Advocacy- I live in a community where it is possible to walk to destinations, but we still have considerable pedestrian safety issues in which I am actively involved.

Since 2009, I have served on the Fairfax County Transportation Advisory Commission as a representative to the Providence District. The commission assists the Supervisors with various transportation issues that face the county, and takes various advocacy roles in improving transportation.
