Please allow enough time before and no later than 11:59 p.m. EDT, April 19, 2010 to complete the IJ in the GRT and submit the required application materials using www.grants.gov.

The National Capital Region (NCR) strategic plan initiative 4.2.3 is to develop and implement an enhanced architecture, infrastructure, and concept of operations for secure regional interoperable communications. The NCR has already made significant progress toward this goalWith UASI 2010 funding, the NCR seeks to (1) preserve these capabilities and (2) evolve the information security on its current pipeline.

#### Preserving Existing Capabilities

- Radio cache The NCR has a cache of 800MHz radios in three locations in the District
  of Columbia, Virginia, and Maryland which can supplement first responders'
  communication needs in major emergency responses. The NCR will need to continue
  training personnel on radio usage, provide programming updates, and replace parts as
  necessary.
- EOC/ECC conferencing The NCR maintains 19 video conferencing nodes for emergencies requiring inter-agency collaboration. These capabilities will need to have continuous operations support, including maintenance and hosting costs.
- RICCS This incident communication system provides rapid dissemination of information to regional officials and leaders via email and text messaging. The NCR will need to sustain the system through maintenance contracts. Additionally, redundancy will be added through a third backup server.
- DEH and GIS sustainment DEH currently hosts several applications which permit
  jurisdictions to have a common picture. These include CAD2CAD, regional GIS, data
  exchanges between D.C. and Prince George's County, and Maryland data share. In
  order to keep the information pipeline open, the NCR will need to support fiber,
  operations, applications, and infrastructure costs.

#### Enhancement

- Cyber security In order to secure emergency communications across the NCRNet backbone, the NCR will engage in a vulnerability assessment. The results of the assessment will be used to design and deploy a security structure. A pilot will first be deployed, followed by a regional rollout.
- Public safety radio system upgrades and enhancements Several jurisdictions in the NCR are in the process of upgrading their public safety radio systems. The NCR will utilize FY2010 UASI funds to supplement the build-out of these radio system upgrades and purchase additional radios for ensure that first responders have access to high quality voice communications capabilities.
