Overview of DC Vision Zero

- The goal of Vision Zero is straight-forward: zero fatalities and serious injuries to users of the roadway system, while increasing safe, healthy, and equitable mobility for all.
- Vision Zero starts with the ethical belief that all users have the right to move safely within the transportation system – no loss of life is acceptable – and that designers and policy-makers share the responsibility of ensuring safe systems.







Overview of DC Vision Zero

- While the District has always prioritized safety, Vision Zero marked a new approach to transportation challenges and a renewed sense of urgency.
- The Vision Zero Action Plan, which was released in December 2015, includes strategies to better educate stakeholders and grow a safety culture; more effectively enforce life-saving laws; enhance the design of our complete streets; and collect, leverage, and share crucial safety data.
- The District's Vision Zero Action Plan focuses on four themes: 1) Create Safe Streets; 2) Protect Vulnerable Users; 3) Prevent Dangerous Driving; and 4) Be Transparent and Responsive.







Strategic Highway Safety Plan

"To enhance the quality of life for District residents and visitors by ensuring that people, goods, and information move efficiently and safely, with minimal adverse impact on residents and the environment."

Vision:

"The District of Columbia will achieve a safe and efficient transportation system that has zero traffic-related deaths."







District Highway Safety Office

- FY2018 Program Funding directed to areas identified to change driver behavior and reduce vehicle crashes and crash severity.
- Funds supported programs focused on:
 - Impaired driving
 - Occupant protection
 - Aggressive driving/police traffic service
 - Pedestrian/bicycle safety
 - Traffic records
 - Planning and administration
 - Roadway safety
 - Safe communities







District Highway Safety Office

District Highway Safety Office

- Regional partners included:
 - Washington Regional Alcohol Program (WRAP) focus on communications and outreach related to impaired driving, coordination of region's SoberRide program
 - MWCOG Street Smart Campaign focus on protecting vulnerable users by raising awareness and promoting enforcement of pedestrian and bicycle safety laws
 - Washington Area Bicyclists Association (WABA) focus on outreach in Wards 4, 7, and 8 to increase knowledge of and commitment to safer roadway culture; coordinated regional Vision Zero Summit
- McAndrew Company LLC provided additional regional advertising campaigns that included radio spots, Metrobus wraps, digital and social media, and grassroots outreach in area bars and restaurants.
