



176 square miles


- 83% of the land area is in Maryland-17% in Washington, DC
- One of the most developed in the Chesapeake: 70% developed
- 25% impervious
- Generally considered to be one of the most polluted rivers in the nation



Report on Progress




- •Long Term Control Plan: will reduce CSO volumes by 98% by the year 2018.
- •Trash is declining but a very big problem.
- Water quality not meeting indicators primarily due to stormwater
- Partners have retrofitted stormwater systems for over 2 square miles of the watershed, work is ongoing
- Over 10 miles of streams have been restored.
- Sediments still greatly exceed standards
- Fourteen additional miles have been opened to fish passage.
- The Partnership goal of 20 additional miles will be achieved by 2010.

Report on Progress



- 27 tidal acres have been created. The tidal wetland goal will be met.
- The goal for non-tidal wetlands has not been met and we are working to identify potential sites.
- 3.5 miles of riparian land have been reforested (22 acres).
- While progress has been steady, there are a decreasing number of publicly available sites and meeting this goal will be difficult.



• The number of groups increased from 2 to 10.
