

Strategies addressed in this Assessment:

- Ensure Maintenance of the Transit System
- Ensure Maintenance of Roadways and Bridge

Strengthen Public Confidence and Ensure Fairness

Pursue Greater Accountability, Efficiency, and Accessibility Strategies addressed in this Assessment:

Strategies under Priority 2 reflected in the CLRP/TIP process:

Priority 3: Move More People and Goods More Efficiently

Strategies addressed in this Assessment:

- Expand capacity on the existing transit system
- Concentrate growth in Activity Centers
- Enhance circulation within Activity Centers
- Implement BRT and other cost-effective transit
- Use tolling
- Alleviate roadway bottlenecks

Priority 3 (continued)

Other strategies reflected in the CLRP/TIP:

- Improve Access to Transit Stops and Stations
- Promote Commute Alternatives
- Expand Pedestrian Infrastructure
- Expand Bicycle Infrastructure
- Apply Priority Bus Treatments

Take-Aways

- *Maintenance:* Our commitment to maintenance is strong and the 2014 CLRP reflects this.
- *Activity Centers:* The region is effectively using its Activity Centers to focus growth, enhance non-motorized circulation, and improve regional connections.
- *New Transit:* The region is diversifying its public transit systems by developing new, cost-efficient options like BRT and streetcars.

Take-Aways (continued)

- *Capacity on existing transit:* We have unfinished business when it comes to maximizing use of our existing transit systems.
- *East-West Divide:* Regional economic disparities continue to affect transportation patterns.
- Driving: We expect individuals, on average, will drive less in the future than they do today. Nonetheless, we know that driving will remain the dominant form of transportation in our region.

- Promote integration with other planning activities
- Conduct outreach on the Priorities Plan
