1. Why are you interested in serving on the TPB's Citizen Advisory Committee?

For the past three years I have been an active advocate for the Purple Line light rail system, which will come through our immediate neighborhood on Wayne Avenue in Silver Spring. I've participated in our civic association meetings and have also attended the MTA presentations. In addition, I've attended the monthly MPAG (Master Plan Advisory Group – of the MNCPPC) meetings where the pros and cons of the Purple Line are debated. Besides letters to the County Council and Planning Board, I have testified at multiple public hearings on this issue.

On another issue, I organized people in my neighborhood to support a county plan to buy a nearby apartment house for the purpose of housing formerly homeless individuals. While many in the neighborhood were fearful of such a move, my next door neighbor and I were able to get a Letter to the Editor published in the Washington Post, collect signatures in support of the apartment project, and testify at a public hearing. In the end, the Housing Opportunities Commission approved the project, people moved in over a year ago, and all has been quiet. We are pleased that we were able to offer a safe haven of affordable housing within our middle-class neighborhood.

I think the CAC will provide a broader forum for discussing issues of relevance to the Metropolitan region. This will help me see how individual, local projects connect with the broader goals of transportation and land-use for the capital region, and how these projects compete for wider support and funding. While I hope to be able to share my views and passions on these issues, I also see this as an opportunity to learn more about planning and governance issues in our diverse community.

Affordable Housing – I advocated/organized in support of Housing Opportunities Coalition decision to buy an apt house in our neighborhood to house the formerly homeless

Bicycle Advocacy – I am a member of Washington Area Bicyclists Association & frequently ride my bike in Sligo Creek Park and on errands to downtown Silver Spring

Smart Growth – I believe that this is how we will reduce congestion, make transit more accessible, work towards saving the environment, and accommodate the 200,000 new residents projected to move to Montgomery County by 2030

Land-Use Issues – I have attended some MNCPPC meetings on the plan to rewrite the zoning code for Montgomery County

Low-Income Issues – We need affordable housing near transit (right now people have to move to Howard or Frederick Counties to find affordable housing, thus generating even more traffic congestion)

Environmental Concerns – I am a member of Friends of Sligo Creek

Neighborhood-Scale issues – We live only a few block from the urban heart of downtown Silver Spring, yet ours is still a single-family neighborhood --- how this will change over the coming years is of great concern to our neighborhood

Parks/Trails – We live two blocks from Sligo Creek Park, a 10-mile hiker-biker trail that connects Takoma Park to Wheaton, MD

Pedestrian Advocacy – Our family walks to the Metro to commute to work and to downtown Silver Spring to shop; sidewalks in many places are narrow or obstructed by utility poles; to get more people out of cars and walking we need to make walking more hospitable

Transit-Oriented Development – We live one block from a proposed future Purple Line station (Wayne and Dale Dr in Silver Spring); many neighbors wonder what kind of development might take place at that intersection once the Purple Line is built

Transportation Funding – We have continual funding for highways, but we don't have funding for WMATA; this is something we discuss in Action Committee for Transit (I'm an ACT board member)

Persons with Disabilities – We are members of NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) and my husband serves on the Maryland state board of NAMI; stigma and discrimination against people with mental illness can prevent them from living in decent and affordable group homes in neighborhoods

Transit Rider/Transit Advocacy – Our family uses Ride-on and Metro daily; I am also a board member of Action Committee for Transit; I have testified numerous times re support of the Purple Line and against cuts to service for Metro & Ride-On buses

Senior Citizen Issues – At age 62 and as a member of AARP, I am becoming more aware of senior issues

Alternative Commuting - As a single car household, we use Zip Cars with some regularity

I have been a resident of the City of Alexandria for the past 6 years, and I work in Washington, D.C. I have never owned a car, or had a driver's license, so I bring a detailed knowledge of our region's public transportation network, and fellow transit riders, that can only be gained through experience. My educational background includes coursework in urban planning and environmental studies. I am a graduate of both the TPB's Community Leadership Institute and the City of Alexandria's Citizen's Academy. As such, I have developed an understanding of the challenges and opportunities inherent to regional transportation planning. I have participated extensively in the City of Alexandria's neighborhood planning process, advocating for smart growth development around the Braddock Road Metro Station. I have served as Chair of the City of Alexandria's Consumer Affairs Commission since November 2007. When the City launched a new financial education campaign last winter, I was involved in leading a group of City staff members, representatives of local non-profits and financial institutions, and citizens to plan a kickoff event and develop educational programs for citizens.

4. Is there any other information related to your serving as a member of the TPB Citizens Advisory Committee that you'd like to tell us about?

This spring, I became involved in organizing transit riders in the City of Alexandria to advocate for funding for mass transit, particularly funding for Metrobus and DASH subsidies, as part of the City's budget process. By reaching out to neighborhood associations, talking with riders directly at major transfer points, posting literature on community bulletin boards, and by creating a Facebook page, I was ultimately able to get the message out to riders. I continue to use the Facebook page to share information about the budget process and opportunities for public comment with transit riders. One of the major challenges in transportation planning is reaching out to transit users. I feel that I can bring valuable experience and perspective on this issue to the Advisory Committee.

Pedestrian Advocacy- I live in a community where it is possible to walk to destinations, but we still have considerable pedestrian safety issues in which I am actively involved.
