

Unauthorized Trends


- Reversal of Long-Term Growth
 - -- '90-'07—Net Growth 500K per year
 - -- '07-'09—Loss of 1 million
 - -- Losses in S. Atlantic & Mountain Div.
- Components of Change
 - -- HUGE Drop in New Unauthorized
 - -- Legal Immigration Levels High
 - -- Out-Flows to Mexico Fixed; Others ↑
- Key Characteristics of Unauthorized
 - -- Families with Children
 - -- DC Metro has Distinctive Origins




Foreign-Born Growth Stagnated 4-07 to 5-10 but Growth May Have Restarted



Unauthorized Trend Reversed in '07 from +500K per year to -500K per year




Downward Trend Established in '09






Inflow of Unauthorized Drops Steadily & Dramatically After '05

Average Annual Inflow of Unauthorized Immigrants (000s)




Mexico is Largest Source of Unauthorized, by Far


Mexico is Largest Country for Legal Immigrants, Too





Unauthorized Spread Away From Big 6 States Beginning in Late '90s




Unauthorized Immigrants in 3 States Grow Rapidly through 2005





Mexico is NOT Largest in DC Metro Area



DC Metro vs. Nation

- Trends in Numbers are Similar
 - -- Steady Growth through 2007
 - -- Decrease since (esp. VA)
- Make-up of Population
 - -- % Foreign-Born 22% vs 13%
 - -- % Unauthorized 7-8% vs 5.5%
 - -- % Undoc of F-B 33% vs 28%
- Origins of Unauthorized
 - -- El Salvador, NOT Mexico is Largest
 - -- Asian share higher 20+% vs 11%
 - -- Almost none from Caribbean


Unauthorized & Other Immigrants

- Young, Working <u>Families</u>
- Generally Low Education
 - -- Relative to U.S. (but not to home)
- Jobs Reflect Skills
 - -- Lack of Health Insurance
 - -- Low Welfare Use
- Low Incomes
 - -- Large Households
 - -- Low Per Capita Income

Percent in Labor Force, 2009






Adult Men (18-64)



Unauthorized Immigrants More Likely To Be Couples with Children




A Majority of Unauthorized (Men) Are Married or Have Children

Unauthorized Families Have Mixed Composition



Key Demographic Factors

- Flows Have Slowed Overall
- Drop Due to Unauthorized
- Responsive to Origin & Destination
 - -- Economic Factors in U.S.
 - -- Conditions in Mexico & Elsewhere
- Role of Enforcement Uncertain
- Families Not Just Individuals
- Scale Remains Large (10–11 million)
- Dispersed Throughout Country

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
