

# **Food Council Legislation**

- Established by <u>House Bill</u>
  <u>831/Senate Bill 723</u> Maryland
  Food System Resiliency Council
  - Sponsors: Senator Katie Fry Hester (D - 9: Carroll, Howard Counties), Delegate Lorig Charkoudian (D -20: Montgomery County)
- Added to the Public Safety Article, <u>Title 14</u> (Emergency Management)
- Effective June 1, 2021

# Legislatively Defined Goals

- 1. Address the **food insecurity crisis** in the State resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting economic crisis
- 2. Develop **equity and sustainability policy recommendations** to increase the long-term resiliency of the food system

- 3. Expand the impact of existing food council organizations
- 4. Develop a strategic plan to increase the production and procurement of Maryland certified food



# **Statutory Requirements**

**November 1, 2021**: Interim Report to the Maryland General Assembly on key findings and activities

**November 1, 2022**: Report to Maryland General Assembly with recommendations for long term structure for a statewide food policy council

**November 1, 2023**: Report to the Maryland General Assembly on key findings and activities undertaken by the Council.



### November 2021 Report

- 16 recommendations across all four goals
- Acknowledged complex challenges like food equity and climate change need additional dialogue
- Unanimously passed among voting members

# **Additional FSRC Milestones**

- Launched Lunch and Learn webinar series
  - Past topics include: Supply Chain Resiliency, Resilience Hubs, Local Food Councils Theory and Practice, and the MDTHINK Platform
  - Upcoming topics include: Giant Food's Food Justice and Equity mission (June), MDEM capabilities and application for food resilience (July), and Integrating Food into rural health care (TBD)

- Hired a Food Resiliency Specialist to support Council and MDEM food resiliency planning activities
- Supported active legislative session with a number of food system related bills

# **Budget Highlights**

#### <u>SB290 - FY23 Budget</u>

#### Agriculture

- Seafood Processors Pandemic Response and Safety Block Grant \$222,673 in federal funding
- Specialty Crop Grant Program \$642,545 in federal funding
- <u>Joint Chairmen's Report</u> requirement to study the feasibility of returning State Meat Processing Inspection (Report due 12/1/22)

#### Commerce

• \$100,000 for the Office of Policy and Research to support statewide economic development and resiliency planning projects such as broadband planning, economic cluster analysis, and supply chain mapping

#### Education

- Child Nutrition Technology Innovation Grant \$1M (Federal Funding; Supplemental Budget #4)
- Food Services Program \$220M (Federal Funding, Supplemental Budget #4)

#### **Emergency Management**

• FSRC Funding - \$100,000 in consulting services

# **Budget Highlights (cont)**

#### **Human Services**

• Increase Monthly Temporary Cash Assistance and Temporary Disability Assistance Grants by \$45 Per Individual (Including in Supplemental Budget #5).

#### MARBIDCO

- Livestock Processing Equipment Grant Program \$500,000 in new funding for meat processing capacity enhancement at the smaller USDA-inspected facilities in Maryland.
- Maryland Watermen's Microloan Program new funding for small loans to help generational watermen (and eventually beginner watermen) to purchase needed equipment.
- \$500,000 in new funding for the Maryland Wood Products Industry Equity Investment Program as part of an effort to jumpstart the Maryland Forestry Economic Adjustment Strategy.

#### **University of Maryland**

• \$500,000 for the Harry Hughes Agro-Ecology Center's two-year climate vulnerability assessment project to facilitate the identification and resolution of climate change impacts on agriculture in Maryland.

  - Continue to focus on recommendations related to the legislatively-defined goals for the FSRC
  - Make recommendations related to the future of the FSRC including structure, organization, and possible sunset terms
