Key Vote on Long-Range Plan Postponed to May

In a rare weighted vote, the TPB decided on April 18 to put off its decision on whether to approve this year's project submissions for the region's Constrained Long-Range Transportation Plan (CLRP). The board will take up the item again at its meeting on May 16.

The TPB meeting was dominated by lively discussion of two proposed projects in Virginia—I-66 spot improvements and HOT lanes on I-95/395. While some board members

expressed outright support or opposition to certain aspects of the Virginia projects, others said they wanted more time to

fully review the material presented by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT).

The approval of the CLRP project submissions is a pivotal step in the annual CLRP update. Once



the TPB approves the submissions, staff includes the new projects in a regional network containing all significant transportation improvements anticipated between now and 2030.

This network is then analyzed for air quality impacts. According to federal Clean Air requirements, the TPB must show that forecasted emissions from the future transportation system will be in conformity with the region's air quality improvement goals.

The TPB's final approval of this year's CLRP is now scheduled for December.

TPB Approves Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan

The TPB on April 18 approved the region's first Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan.

The plan will guide funding priorities for three FTA programs: 1) Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Program; 2) Job Access and Reverse Commute Program (JARC); and 3) New Freedom Program, a new initiative for projects that go "above and beyond" the

our new major projects were submitted for this year's update to the region's Constrained Long-Range Transportation Plan (CLRP). On May 16, the TPB is scheduled to vote on the inclusion of the submitted projects in the air quality conformity analysis that is an essential part of the CLRP/TIP development process.

Projects Proposed for Construction

1. US 340-Jefferson National Pike

Interchange at Jefferson Technology Park, Frederick, Maryland Length: half-mile radius. Cost: \$11 million. Completion: 2009.

2. I-66 Spot Improvements

Three "spots" westbound, inside the Beltway Length: 4 miles (total). Cost: \$75.6 million. Completion: 2013.

3. I-95/395 High Occupancy/Toll (HOT) Lanes Project

From Eads St. in Arlington to Garrisonville Rd. in Stafford Co. Length: 36 miles. Cost: \$882 million. Completion: 2010.

4. Potomac Yard Transitway


Four Mile Run to Braddock Road Metro Station

Length: 2.5 miles. Cost: \$18.1 million. Completion: 2011.

Proposed New Studies

A. US 301 Waldorf Bypass

Washington Ave./Turkey Hill Rd. to north of the MD 5 Interchange at T.B. Study alternatives for upgrading and widening US 301 through Waldorf and/or constructing an access-controlled bypass.



B. Manassas National Battlefield Bypass

Close Routes 29 and 234 through the Manassas National Battlefield Park to through traffic.

C. VRE Expansion

City of Manassas to Gainesville and Haymarket

Preliminary engineering and environmental work to extend VRE
commuter rail service from Manassas to Gainesville and Haymarket.

Americans with Disabilities Act's (ADA's) transportation requirements.

As the designated recipient of federal funding for the Job Access Reverse Commute (JARC) and New Freedom programs, the TPB will work with member jurisdictions, transportation providers, human service agencies and consumers to improve coordination and service delivery for people with disabilities, individuals with lower incomes, and older adults.

TPB's JARC and New Freedom programs will provide approximately \$1 million each and require a 50/50 match for operating projects and a 80/20 match for capital projects. The funding

for these two programs is available for any service that operates within the Washington, DC-MD-VA Urbanized Area. The TPB will oversee the review and selection of project proposals in accordance with the competitive selection process, and approve the selected projects for inclusion in the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
