This memo provides an overview of the Transportation Planning Board's (TPB) 2019 solicitation for applications for the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Enhanced Mobility grant program. The fourth TPB solicitation for Enhanced Mobility dollars was conducted from August 1 through November 4, 2019. The available funding, totaling almost \$7.3M, includes:

- \$878,914 in reallocated Enhanced Mobility dollars from prior solicitations that must be reprogrammed for similar projects;
- \$694,648 in old 5310 dollars deobligated by DDOT and being made available to COG by FTA for vehicle procurement only; and
- \$5,698,696 in FY 2018 and FY 2019 Enhanced Mobility dollars.

Attachment A contains the list of all applications and Attachment B describes the background, solicitation and selection process.

FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS AND NEXT STEPS

TPB Officers are reviewing the funding recommendations of the selection committee and, following their concurrence, next steps are:

- TPB action to approve the TIP amendment and funding recommendations at the January 22 meeting.
- Notify applicants of TPB action. Applicants with a project not recommended for funding will
 receive a letter with suggestions for strengthening the application and will be offered an
 opportunity for a debriefing.
- Following TPB approval, staff will work with the applicants to meet Federal requirements and develop the submittal materials for FTA approval.
- Upon FTA approval, staff will work with the applicants to administer grant implementation.

ATTACHMENT B - 2019 ENHANCED MOBILITY PROGRAM

Overview

The Federal Transit Administration's (FTA's) Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310) is for improving mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options. Approximately \$2.8 million per year is provided to the region under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG), as the administrative agent for the National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board (TPB), is the Designated Recipient for this program for the Washington DC-VA-MD Urbanized Area. The TPB is tasked with the management of the program, including the approval of grant awards. The TPB solicits and selects grant applications for funding every other year. The applicants must match the federal funds: 20 percent for capital or mobility management projects and 50 percent for operating projects.

Coordinated Human Service Transportation Plan

As a Metropolitan Planning Organization, the TPB develops a Coordinated Human Service Transportation Plan ("Coordinated Plan") for the planning area. An updated to the Coordinated Plan was approved by the TPB on December 19, 2018. The Coordinated Plan outlines priority projects for Enhanced Mobility funding and the selection process, including the criteria below.

Selection Process and Criteria for Enhanced Mobility Funding

The Coordinated Plan outlines a quantitative scoring process designed to provide a comprehensive consideration of the applicant's ability to serve the transportation needs of the region's older adults and individuals with disabilities. The six factors and the scoring are listed below.

The TPB ensures that the Enhanced Mobility program includes a broad spectrum of programs and services for residents in the Washington DC-VA-MD Urbanized Area and is utilized by grant recipients who can effectively deliver services. As there are numerous federal requirements that must be met, the TPB's Coordinated Plan outlines selection criteria that places a strong emphasis on the institutional capacity of an applicant to manage and administer an FTA grant.

2019 Solicitation for Enhanced Mobility Projects

The fourth TPB solicitation for Enhanced Mobility funds was conducted from August 1 through November 4, 2019. More than 3,000 individuals received an email announcing the availability of grant funds. The grant opportunity was also promoted through *TPB News*, the Transportation Planning Board's weekly e-newsletter, and COG and TPB social media accounts.

TPB staff conducted six pre-application conferences for interested organizations discussing the application process, federal requirements, and project eligibility. Conferences were held in Fairfax, Virginia on August 15, Silver Spring, Maryland on August 20, and at COG on August 1, September 4, September 10, and October 1.

Selection Committee

TPB member Kacy Kostiuk chaired the Selection Committee, which was comprised of five people representing aging, disability, transit and human service transportation coordination. The Selection Committee members inlouded:

After the solicitation period closed, TPB staff thoroughly reviewed all the applications received and when necessary, asked for clarifications or revised budgets from the applicants. TPB staff developed summaries of the applications and scored each application based on the selection criteria listed above.

Each Selection Committee member received the staff summaries and applications for review prior to the December 5, 2019 meeting. The Selection Committee collectively reviewed the applications, preliminary scores, and funding recommendations with TPB staff at the meeting. After a thoughtful and deliberative process, the Selection Committee confirmed the recommendations for funding. The Committee directed staff to share the recommendations with the Officers of the Board and respond to any questions they may have on the recommendations.
