




# **COG Organization**






### **COG Water Committee Structure**

# Chesapeake Bay and Water Resources Policy Committee Overview

#### Mission:

- Represents the region's interests within the Chesapeake Bay
   Program and provides a voice for local perspectives
- Conducts outreach about Bay restoration progress and water quality benefits
- Takes water policy positions and actions and makes recommendations to the COG Board
- Evaluates water quality, wastewater, stormwater, drinking water, and climate resiliency issues, and their evolving science and policy

#### Membership:

 Members include elected officials and senior management from regional governments and water and wastewater utilities

- Bay TMDL
- Partnership EPA & states, with local participation
- COG's role in Chesapeake Bay Program
- Watershed Implementation Plans & looking beyond 2025





#### Wastewater

- Major investments in wastewater treatment plant upgrades have significantly improved Potomac River water quality
- State-of-the-Art All wastewater treatment plants in the region already have or are upgrading nitrogen removal capacity

Upgrades will ensure the capacity to treat waste from future

population growth in the region

#### **Stormwater**

- Local challenges & innovations in meeting stringent MS4 permits
- Need for more research about best management practices (BMPs) and climate resilient practices
- How to build/fund new infrastructure

# **Drinking Water**

- Source water protection & public health (e.g., coal tar sealants and road salts)
- Water supply: Drought management, emergency response & resiliency planning
- Water security
