

Purple Line Corridor – Regional Overview

- •16-mile east-west corridor extending from Bethesda in Montgomery County to New Carrollton in Prince George's County
- Just north of Washington, D.C. and inside the Capital Beltway (I-495)
- Illustrates emerging underserved travel market




Purple Line – Project Overview

- 21 stations planned
- 2 yard and shops (one in each county)
- LRV:
 - 70% low-floor/ 30 m. car; limited to 2-cars
 - 55 vehicles
- Trains every 6 minutes peak hours
 - 10-12 minutes off peak
- Ridership
 - Over 69,000 daily riders
 - 1/3 will use Metro for part of their trip
 - 17,000 cars off the road
- Cost in Year of Expenditure \$2.2B



Intermodal Connectivity Overview

- Links 4 branches of the Metro
 - Red Line at Bethesda
 - Red Line at Silver spring
 - Green Line at College Park
 - Orange Line at New Carrollton
- Connects to all three MARC lines
 - Brunswick at Silver Spring
 - Camden Line at College Park
 - Penn Line at New Carrollton
- Connects to Amtrak Northeast Corridor at New Carrollton




Purple Line – Corridor Overview




Project Goals and Benefits

- Increase potential for Transit Oriented Development at existing and proposed stations in the corridor as identified in local land use plans


Reinforcing Existing & Planned Development at Metrorail Stations




Integrating with Development Around Purple Line Stations
