




Racial Disparities in Who Experiences Homelessness in our Region






Ending Veteran Homelessness

Conclusions and Recommendations

- **Prevention programs, shelter diversion, and strong tenant protections** reduce the number of people who experience homelessness.
- Sustained and increased regional investments in permanent housing resources are necessary to allow people to exit homelessness within their existing communities and support networks.
- Increased federal funds provides an opportunity for innovation in crossjurisdictional collaboration.
- **Racial equity should center our response** to reduce the disproportionate representation of people of color experiencing homelessness.
- Need to share data within and across the region's CoCs to strengthen local programs and improve outcomes for people experiencing homelessness.
