Drinking Water

Drought Report

The COG region received an above average amount of rain in the past 30 days and continues to be drought free. Since the start of the calendar year, dry conditions have improved significantly and only a small portion of abnormal dryness remains in southern Maryland. Local reservoirs are full, regional groundwater and streamflows are currently near median levels, and drought status conditions in Maryland and Virginia are improving.

In <u>Maryland</u>, the Central region has improved to drought Watch and the Eastern region has moved from Watch to Normal. In <u>Virginia</u>, the Drought Watch Advisory previously issued for the Northern Virginia drought evaluation region has been lifted.

<u>Record setting heat</u> continues for our region. COG will continue monitor conditions and provide additional updates if drought conditions should change throughout the month.

Risk Communication Workshop: Cyanotoxin Contamination

On July 10, 2017, COG held a Risk Communication Workshop at Alexandria Renew Enterprises. Participants included regional health officials, water utilities, and other stakeholders. The workshop focused on discussing regional notification and communication procedures for a health emergency using a Cyanotoxin contamination incident response scenario. The workshop was intended to increase familiarity among health officials, water utilities, and coordinating agencies, as well as improve internal and external communications processes when responding to a water contamination event or other health incident.

Medical Facilities and Water Supply Emergency Planning Workshop

On July 25, 2017, COG will be holding an emergency water supply planning workshop, primarily focused on medical facilities and water utilities. Medical facilities require a safe and reliable water supply for all aspects of operations. During a water supply emergency, this interdependency may result in significant consequences and severely affect operations or result in evacuation. This workshop will review regional efforts to mitigate water supply emergencies for medical facilities. Case studies will be presented to illustrate outcomes. Planning and response tools and strategies will be presented. Finally, participants will understand roles, responsibilities and capabilities for responding to an emergency water supply incident.

Regional Tree Canopy Management Strategy Report (draft)

The Regional Tree Canopy Workgroup has drafted a Regional Tree Canopy Management Strategy document in cooperation with local forestry staff in the region. This document is a guideline for local government staff to assist in the management and enhancement of forest cover at the community level. Furthermore, recommendations in the report are designed to support Region Forward Sustainability Goals for regional forest cover management, state and local initiatives to continue to improve air quality, and the Chesapeake Bay Program's targets and indicators to protect water quality and support a healthy regional green infrastructure. The draft Report is out for public comment, and comments are due to Brian LeCouteur by August 25th.
