

USING THIS RESOURCE DIRECTORY

The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments is pleased to present the COG Regional Latino Health and Community Resources Directory. This directory is designed to provide an easy to use reference of agencies and organizations that offer assistance and health services to members of the Latino communities within the District of Columbia, Northern Virginia, and Suburban Maryland.

The directory is aimed for service providers and public health professionals and offers a list of agencies, nonprofit organizations, health centers, and faith-based organizations that provide assistance to members of the Latino community.

The directory is categorized by state, and then by type of service, including advocacy, education, health, housing, and mental health and substance abuse counseling. Although listings are divided by state, many agencies serve residents from multiple jurisdictions. For example, you may find a low-cost health clinic listed under the District of Columbia that would be an appropriate referral site for Montgomery County, Maryland.

Each agency has an icon that represents costs for services, bilingual/Spanish services, and public transportation:

- No Costs for Services: although there may be certain costs involved, like one-time membership fees, most services are free for clients.
- Costs for Services: costs vary, and may be income-based or determined on a sliding scale.
- Bilingual Services/Spanish speaking employees.
- Bus: Lists bus(es) that pass closest to location
- Metro: Lists Metro station(s) closest to location

THE AFFORDABLE CARE ACT AND HEALTH INSURANCE INFORMATION

In March 2010, President Obama signed comprehensive health reform, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), into law. The law makes preventive care—including family planning and related services—more accessible and affordable for many Americans.

The Health Insurance Marketplace is a way to find health coverage that fits different budgets and needs.

Insurance plans in the Marketplace are offered by private companies, and they cover essential health benefits. No plan can turn away or charge an applicant because of an existing illness or medical condition. They must cover treatments for these conditions. Plans can't charge women more than men for the same plan.

The Marketplace simplifies the plan search for health coverage by gathering the options available in the applicant's area in one place. At the Marketplace, an applicant can compare plans based on price, benefits, quality, and other features important to the applicant before making a selection. Information about prices and benefits are written in simple language to provide a clear picture of premium payments and the benefits and protections provided. The applicant can choose the combination of price and coverage that fits the needs and budget of the applicant. While all insurance plans are offered by private companies, the Marketplace is run by the state in the District of Columbia and Maryland and by the federal government in Virginia.

There are three ways to apply for Marketplace coverage: online, by mail, or in-person with the help of the navigator or other qualified helper.
