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About MATOC

- Established in 2008, MATOC is a joint program of the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia DOTs and the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA)
 - Mission: regional situational awareness of transportation conditions and incidents
 - Goals: improve traveler safety and reduce transportation delays
- MATOC activities include:
 - Monitoring and communicating reliable information during major incidents
 - Enabling operating agencies and the traveling public to make effective, coordinated and timely decisions
 - Maintaining a web-based transportation information system
 - Facilitating standard operating procedures among transportation agencies











MATOC's Inaugural Period

- Original \$1.6 Million Federal grant secured by Congressman Moran funded MATOC's inaugural period
- Initiated operations in Fall 2008
 - Cultivated relationships with regional partners
 - Hired facilitator and operations staff
 - Developed standard operating procedures for MATOC staff
 - Opened MATOC Operations Center at CapWIN
 - Established process to provide notifications
- Developed and maintained committees
 - Steering Committee
 - Information Systems Subcommittee
 - Operations Subcommittee











Current Operations

- University of Maryland will be the organizational home of MATOC as of October 1, 2010
- On-going interaction between MATOC operations staff and agency operators throughout the region
- RITIS software tool
 - RITIS = Regional Integrated Transportation Information System
 - Sharing significant incident information across the region
- Continuous support for:
 - Operations
 - Maintenance & systems engineering
 - Enhancements
 - Program management











Major Activities to Report

- MATOC Operations Staff
 - Hired new MATOC Facilitator (June 28, 2010)
 - Hired new operator in August, second operator anticipated in October
 - Providing coverage 5 days/16 hours
- MATOC Website
 - Developing a website for key stakeholders including local, regional, and state transportation agencies
- Funding
 - \$1.19 million committed for FY2011 (sufficient to maintain MATOC core work program)
 - MD SHA \$400,000
 - DDOT \$400,000
 - VDOT/NVTA \$100,000
 - FTA Earmark \$200,000
 - COG/TPB \$90,000











MATOC Involvement in Regional Coordination – Example Major Incidents

- Thursday, July 8
 - I-495 SB south of Georgetown Pike: Overturned tractor trailer accident. 2-3 right lanes were blocked for the afternoon through evening rush.
- Friday, August 13 Two major incidents during morning rush
 - I-270 NB at Democracy Blvd: Jackknifed tractor trailer accident. Closed both northbound travel lanes and forced traffic to left shoulder.
 - I-95 SB at MM 156.0: Multi-vehicle accident. Closed all southbound mainline lanes and service road. Medevac landing required temporary closure of northbound HOV lanes.
- Wednesday, September 1
 - Standoff situation at Discovery Communications in Silver Spring. Public safety perimeter affected a number of major roads and bus lines, necessitating detours
- In all cases, MATOC:
 - Sent out notifications to transportation agencies as soon as confirmed information was available regarding the incidents; monitored situations as they evolved
 - Provided ongoing incident update notifications regarding road closures, detours, transit impacts, and incident close-outs
 - Through its notifications, aided agency decision making on transportation management
