Built **by and for** Local Governments

- In 2008, ICLEI-Local Governments for Sustainability, the U.S. Green Building Council, National League of Cities, and the Center for American Progress announced formal partnership
- Established a diverse, consensus-based stakeholder engagement process
- More than 200 volunteers representing cities and counties, state and federal agencies, non-profit organizations, national associations, universities, utilities, and private corporations



The Need for a Sustainability Rating System

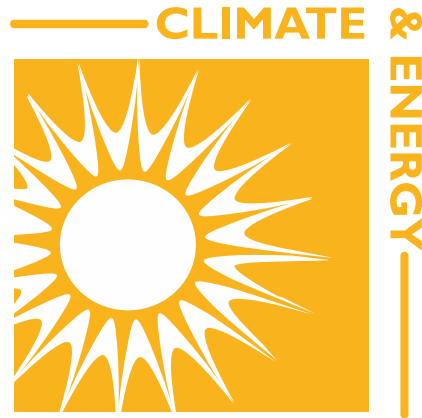
- New and dynamic field

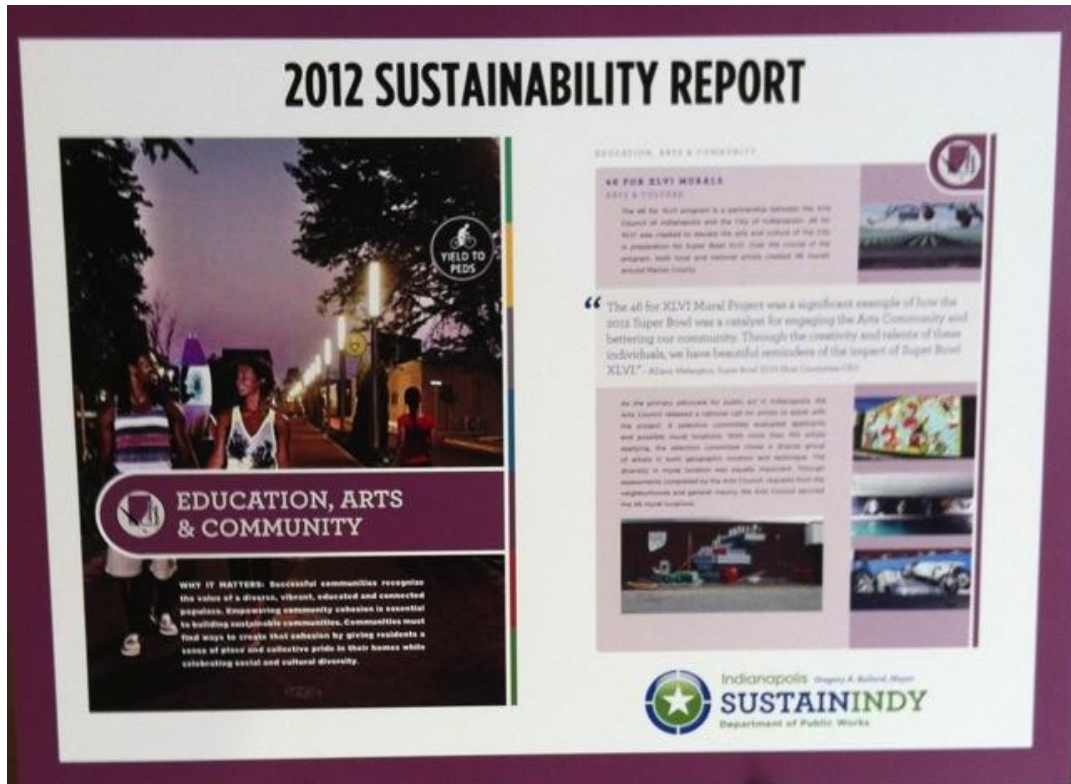

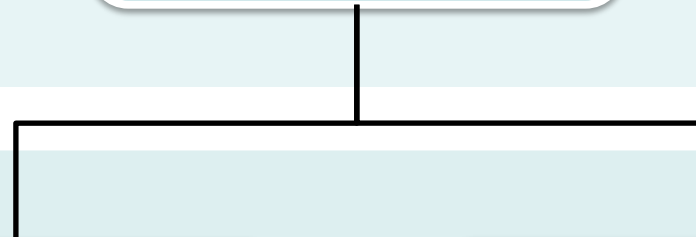

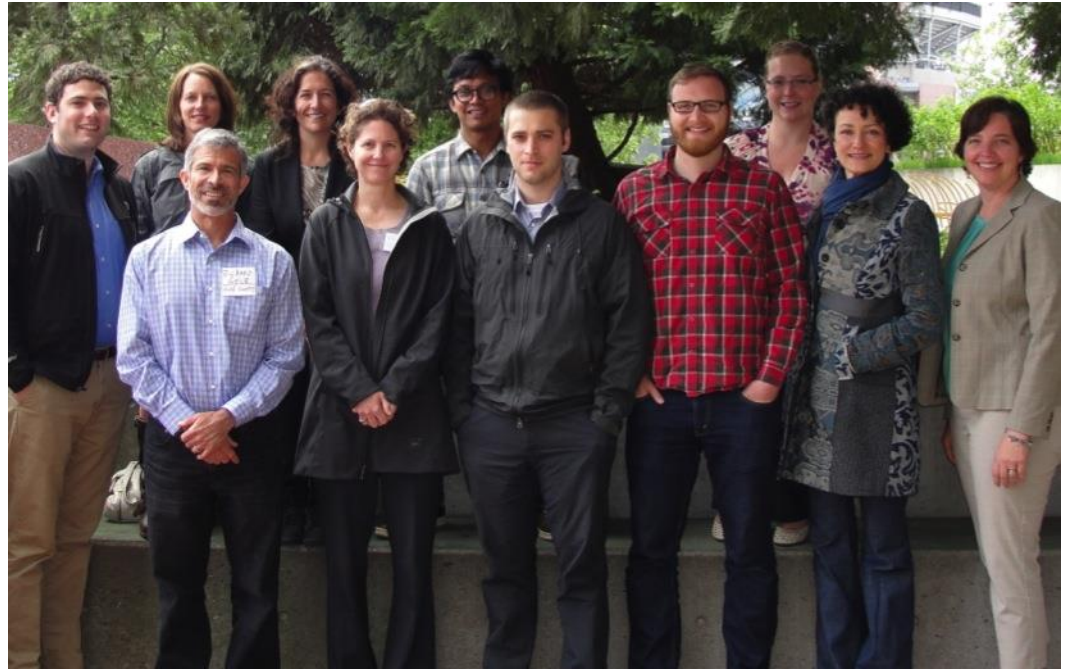

Leadership Program Overview

The Leadership STAR Community Program **convenes a diverse mix of cities and counties** dedicated to achieving a certified STAR Community Rating.



The program **provides extensive support and training** to help jurisdictions get organized, collect, and report data for certification.

Leadership Program Benefits

- 2-day in-person kickoff training for two team members
- 1-hour “Intro to STAR” web training
- A dedicated STAR staffer for check-in calls and tech questions
- Access to the Technical Guide
- Access to the Self Assessment Checklist and Online Reporting Tool
- Monthly webinars and education programming
- STAR PR to assist in local storytelling
- E-communications, including newsletters and an internal listserv
- Verification of the community’s application for official STAR certification (\$1,500 value)

Term: January 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014

January Kickoff Training

Location: Broward County, FL

Program fee covers 2 attendees – one manager or elected official and one program staff

- Introduction to all STAR tools and support
- Learn from pilot communities about different ways to use the Rating System in your community
- Tips for getting organized and collecting data
- Session on internal and external messaging
- Tours, networking, and fun activities

Financial Assistance

Assistance provided via the Funders' Network for Smart Growth and Livable Communities for:

- **Scholarships** to offset program fees

--OR--

- **Capacity support** to assist the local government in collecting the data required to complete the application for STAR certification (e.g. staff time, interns, consultants)

Financial Assistance Requirements

- Applicants **must** identify a local philanthropic partner to support the community's participation in the Leadership Program
- Additional selection criteria include:
 - Demonstrated need by the jurisdiction
 - In-kind resources committed by the local government
 - Secured funding match from local philanthropic organization
 - Amount of the request relative to leveraged resources
