NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION TRANSPORTATION PLANNING BOARD (TPB)

At the March meeting, the TPB endorsed a new methodology for analyzing equity in the long-range transportation plan. The board also approved the mission and tasks of its Long-Range Plan Task Force, which will be working to identify a limited set of projects, programs, and policies not currently in the region's long-range plan that will help make significantly better progress toward achieving regional goals. The board also approved TPB and Commuter Connections work plans and budgets for FY 2018.

METROPOLITAN WASHINGTON AIR QUALITY COMMITTEE (MWAQC)

The committee discussed local actions to further reduce air pollution, including an opportunity to work with Volkswagen's Electrify America program to deploy electric vehicle charging infrastructure in the region as well as COG's ongoing work as part of the federal Fleets for the Future project to cooperatively purchase green vehicles and infrastructure.

CHESAPEAKE BAY POLICY AND WATER RESOURCES COMMITTEE (CBPC)

The committee was briefed on COG's recent water Resiliency Study findings and recommendations, as well as COG's other regional water supply plans and coordination efforts. Members also discussed the OMB Budget Blueprint's potential budget cuts and implications for EPA and the Chesapeake Bay Program. They encouraged advocacy and outreach for continued Chesapeake Bay Program support.

CLIMATE, ENERGY, AND ENVIRONMENT POLICY COMMITTEE (CEEPC)

The committee adopted the third edition of the Regional Climate and Energy Action Plan, which offers a variety of voluntary and flexible actions for local jurisdictions to implement between 2017-2020 to help reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA OVERSIGHT HEARING

In March, COG Executive Director Chuck Bean spoke at a D.C. Council performance oversight hearing to discuss COG's accomplishments in 2016 and priorities for 2017.

ZERO ENERGY BUILDINGS - FALLS CHURCH REDEVELOPMENT

On March 6, COG's Steve Walz and Maia Davis presented to the Falls Church Planning Commission on energy options to consider for the city's school campus redevelopment. They discussed advanced energy design and zero energy school buildings, the potential for using geothermal energy to heat and cool the proposed new George Mason High School and the existing Mary Ellen Henderson Middle School, and shared some examples of schools in the region using these technologies. COG is coordinating a study on the potential for using geothermal energy for the campus. On March 30, international expert Xiaobing Liu, who has been leading the geothermal study, participated in a site tour of the campus followed by a presentation on the feasibility results.

COMMUTER OUTREACH

Commuter Connections staff participated in an Employee Transportation Fair at the Navy Yard in the District of Columbia.

MARYLAND TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES SOLICITATION

The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) is accepting applications for projects to receive funding under the federal Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). The TPB will help SHA select projects for the metropolitan Washington region, giving priority to those that address established regional goals. TAP aims to support bicycle and pedestrian, Safe Routes to School, and Complete Streets projects. The application deadline is May 15. <u>MORE ABOUT TAP</u>.

GO RECYCLE
