When online, keep fraud front of mind! Over 75% of reported frauds come from a phone call, email, or the web.

Stay scam-smart.





Planning a home improvement project? Stay scam-smart.

- DO use contractors that are licensed and insured.
- DO check complaints through your local consumer protection agency.
- DON'T be pressured into immediate decisions & DON'T pay in full up front.

Pop-up blocked. Stay scam-smart.

Scammers will impersonate tech support to gain access to your computer and files. Be suspicious of urgent, unexpected pop-ups that claim to be fixing a problem. Reach out directly to a reputable company if you run into technical issues.
