

STOP 'N' SWAP®







YES: fruit and vegetable scraps, non-greasy food scraps (rice, pasta, bread, cereal, etc.), coffee grounds and filters, tea bags, egg and nut shells, pits, cut or dried flowers, houseplants, potting soil.

NO: meat, fish, bones, greasy food scraps, fat oil, dairy, animal waste, litter or bedding, coal or charcoal, coconuts, diseased and/or insect-infested houseplants/soil, or biodegradable/compostable plastics.

Store items in your freezer or refrigerator to reduce odors.

7 Pilot Sites established in March 2011























Peninsula Compost Company/Wilmington Organic Recycling Center, Delaware



On December 3, 2011, GrowNYC stopped shipping to Delaware and started "keeping it all local" within the 5 boroughs

And evolved into this ...



Expanded from 7 to 21 sites in April 2012 in partnership with the NYC Department of Sanitation

TURN SPOILS INTO SOIL



GROWNYC & DSNY FOOD SCRAP COMPOST PROGRAM









































Expanded again in 2013 & 2014 Now collecting at 33 locations, 36 times/week



Lower East Side Ecology Center and BIG!Compost collecting at an additional 5 Greenmarket locations, 8 times/week











"GrowNYC continues to build a foundation for a citywide curbside organics program by demonstrating the popularity of the Greenmarket drop off programs," said Ron Gonen, Deputy Commissioner of Recycling and Sustainability at NYC Department of Sanitation.



"My family has been composting at Grand Army [Plaza] since GrowNYC began collecting there. My two sons, ages 3 and 6, enjoy coming along and helping scrape out our buckets while we catch up on the composting news. We think it's fantastic to turn our food waste into something useful, rather than carting it several states away to a landfill."



1 Million Pound Milestone on 12/23/12



3 Million Pound Milestone on 7/10/14



HOW ARE WE DOING (by the numbers)?

2 million pounds of food scraps diverted on 10/27/13 3 million pounds diverted on July 4, 2014

2011: 318,216 lbs. of food scraps diverted from disposal

2012: 698,925 lbs. of food scraps diverted from disposal

2013: 1,240,945 lbs. of food scraps diverted from disposal

2014 (thru 9/12/14): 1,100,120 lbs. of food scraps diverted

Projections for 2014 = 1,600,000 pounds!!

Current Program Total (as of 9/12/14) – 3,358,206 pounds and counting

Now averaging 70 tons/month 120,000 individual food scrap "donations" in 2013 190,000 food scrap "donations" projected for 2014

BOTTOM LINE: The program is growing! (and public/private partnerhips work!)



Your building is receiving organic waste collection. Organic waste includes food scraps, food-soiled paper, and plants (turn this flyer over for more detailed information). Sanitation recycles this waste by turning it into renewable energy or compost, a natural fertilizer.

Join your neighbors to halp NYC reduce waste sent to costly landfills and deter pests by keeping food waste in secure bins.

How to participate:



Collect organic waste separately from your trash and other recyclables.













First day of organics collection by DSNY






Since Morningside Gardens came on line in June 2013,

with dozens more coming on line by November.











What about Public Schools?
