

Targets households with multiple barriers

Supportive housing is designed for individuals who BUT FOR HOUSING cannot access and make effective use of treatment and supportive services in the community, and **BUT FOR SUPPORTIVE SERVICES** cannot access and sustain stable housing in the community.





Supportive Housing Target Populations

Inappropriately institutionalized or at risk of institutionalization

Involved with the child welfare system

Includes individuals, families, young and older adults

with housing needs

Exiting jail or prison with chronic health conditions (esp. mental health)


Mental health, substance use and/or physical health disabling conditions

Total Estimated Need Across Sectors




- → Virginia ranks #10 in total estimated SH need, MD #20
- → DC has highest per capita need in the country




Supportive Housing Need By System

Supportive Housing and Behavioral Health: The Evidence

Reduces

- Homelessness
- Inpatient psychiatric hospitalizations
- Psychiatric symptoms
- Expensive crisis care
- Substance Use
- Reincarceration

Improves

- Mental health
- Overall quality of life
- Access and utilization of noncrisis mental health and substance use treatment services
- Social networks and supports
- Financial security
