#### NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION TRANSPORTATION PLANNING BOARD (TPB)

The TPB approved the 2015 Amendment to the Constrained Long-Range Transportation Plan, which includes all regionally significant transportation projects and programs that are planned in metropolitan Washington through 2040. The amendment featured a variety of updates, including a Virginia proposal to add express lanes and bus service on I-66 inside and outside of the Beltway.

#### CLIMATE, ENERGY, AND ENVIRONMENT POLICY COMMITTEE (CEEPC)

CEEPC received updates on the Climate and Energy Leadership Awards, the draft Climate and Energy Progress Report, as well as the work of the Multi-Sector Work Group focused on reducing greenhouse gas emissions. CEEPC was also briefed on COG's Cooperative Purchasing program, which generates significant discounts for member governments. CEEPC members asked COG staff to share with them information on the next Chief Purchasing Officers Committee meeting to discuss new contracts for environmentally friendly ice melt, lamps, and batteries and to explore other opportunities.

#### **REGION FORWARD COALITION**

The coalition met in Tysons and discussed the area's plans to transform from a suburban jobs center to a walkable, transit-oriented city. Topics included housing affordability, pedestrian mobility, and the speed and intensity of redevelopment. The coalition also discussed a draft outline for a COG economic competitiveness report and considered a range of economic indicators like transportation, poverty, and housing affordability.



# **DC Water Unveils Waste-to-Energy Project**

This month, DC Water unveiled a \$470 million waste-to-energy project, which will provide enough clean, renewable energy to help power the Blue Plains Advanced Wastewater Treatment Plant as well as to create nutrient-rich soil byproducts. The project uses innovative technologies and state of the art equipment -- including 32 sleek thermal hydrolysis vessels, four anaerobic digesters, and three turbines the size of jet engines. Chairman Euille called the meeting to order at 12:10PM and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### 3. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Executive Director announced that there were zero code red days in 2015 for the third summer in a row. Bean presented at a recent City of Frederick meeting and shared the benefits of membership in COG. Last month Bean met with Baltimore Metropolitan Council Executive Director Mike Kelly and signed an MOU to share a Cooperative Purchasing Manager to further expand and improve COG's cooperative purchasing program. Bean reviewed a letter from Congressman Connelly noting concerns with the imbalance between Dulles and National airports, and his support of COG's policy on airport balance. Bean briefed the Board on continued communication with the General Services Administration and planning for more dialogue with the Chief Administrative Officers Committee in January 2016. Bean announced that at the next three TPB meetings there will be briefings by WMATA. Bean briefed the Board on the status of the Metro Safety Commission and reviewed that legislative action needs to be taken in the District, Maryland and Virginia to establish the commission. Bean highlighted next steps on the 2015 Economic Competitiveness focus including the upcoming report, a joint trade mission, convening of business incubators, and the Global Cities Initiative. Jose Lemus in the Information Technology department was highlighted as the Heart of COG for his technology work over the past 12 years and his effort to recently migrate COG to Microsoft Office 365. DC Chairman Mendelson requested that a presentation on the Metro Safety Commission be put on the November Board of Directors agenda.

#### **SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS**

COG ended FY2015 with a surplus from operations of \$74,700, plus a net surplus from special revenue funds of \$18,200, for a total net surplus of \$92,900.

Accounts receivable is reduced by 12% and accounts payable is reduced by 35%, compared to June 30, 2014 balances, reflecting increased focus on timely collection and payment of funds. The reduction in accounts payable results in a corresponding reduction in cash assets at June 30, 2015. Since dues and regional fees are collected in the first quarter of the fiscal year, the operating cash balance typically is at a low point at the end of the fiscal year.

Audited financial statements will be presented to the Board of Directors by the Audit Committee Chair at the January 13, 2016 meeting.

# THE ROLE OF THE FTA, THE STATES, AND THE SUPPORT OF THE MWCOG TO CREATE A METRO SAFETY COMMISSION

## Therese W. McMillan: Acting Administrator

Therese McMillan is currently the Acting Administrator of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). She joined FTA as Deputy Administrator on July 2, 2009. As Deputy, McMillan assisted the Administrator in leading a staff of more than 500 in the Washington D.C. headquarters office and 10 regional offices throughout the United States, and implementing an annual budget approximating \$10 billion. With the passage of a new surface transportation authorization, MAP-21, she has assumed a key role in guiding FTA's implementation of transit-related provisions in the law and overseeing the development of critical guidance.

During her tenure, Ms. McMillan has also played an integral leadership role in advancing several critical FTA priorities to improve the quality and delivery of transit services to the American public, including:


- Leading a major reassessment and reform of FTA's Civil Rights responsibilities, including new guidance for transit grantees in Title VI and Environmental Justice.
- Overseeing the restructuring FTA's grant oversight and compliance programs.
- Assisting in the development of a new, streamlined process for the New and Small Starts program, and new funding opportunities for State of Good Repair of transit assets.
- Working closely with FTA's staff across the country to ensure the timely, accurate allocation of \$8.78 billion for 1,072 Recovery Act grants that created or retained over 12,500 jobs and strengthened and enhanced public transportation for working Americans and their communities.
- Representing federal transit interests on the Partnership for Sustainable Communities with fellow DOT colleagues, EPA and HUD.
- Launching a national conversation and research effort to help transit agencies adapt to changing weather patterns and natural disasters.

Prior to her appointment, Ms. McMillan was the Deputy Executive Director-Policy at the San Francisco Bay Area Region's Metropolitan Transportation Commission, where she was responsible for strategic financial planning and MTC's management of federal, state and regional fund sources for transit, highways, roadways and other modes; state and federal legislative advocacy, and public affairs and community outreach.

Ms. McMillan received her B.S. degree in Environmental Policy and Planning Analysis from the University of California, Davis (1981) and a joint M.C.P./M.S. in city planning/civil engineering science (1984) from U.C. Berkeley.

Safety Oversight for the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority Metrorail System

#### UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

[Safety Directive No. 16-1, Notice No. 1]

Safety Directive under 49 U.S.C. § 5329 Safety Oversight for the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority Metrorail System

AGENCY: Federal Transit Administration (FTA), U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT).

**SUMMARY:** FTA Safety Directive 16-1 outlines how the FTA will exercise leadership over the Tri-State Oversight Committee (TOC) as part of the FTA's direct oversight of the safety of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) rail system. It realigns the work that the TOC will perform under the direction of FTA and identifies responsibilities FTA will assume to accomplish the existing State Safety Oversight Program requirements under current federal law and regulations. This action is temporary until such time as Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia replace the TOC with a new State Safety Oversight Agency that is fully compliant with 49 U.S.C. §5329(e).

The Tri-State Oversight Committee (TOC) conducts safety oversight of the WMATA rail system, as required by the Federal regulations at 49 C.F.R. Part 659, and under the terms of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) among the District of Columbia, State of Maryland, and Commonwealth of Virginia. TOC will continue to conduct a baseline level of safety oversight of the WMATA rail system until the three jurisdictions establish a State Safety Oversight Program certified by the FTA as compliant with the standards for State Safety Oversight under 49 U.S.C. § 5329(e).

TOC has no legal authority for enforcement of its findings and recommendations for the safety of WMATA's rail system. TOC has no enabling legislation, administrative code, or regulations, nor is it a creature of law of any of the three jurisdictions. However, in accordance with the

MOU among the three jurisdictions, TOC has issued approximately 225 findings and recommendations for the safety of the WMATA rail system that are unresolved.

On October 9, 2015, the Secretary of Transportation announced that FTA will immediately take lead responsibility for safety oversight of the WMATA rail system, in accordance with the agency's authority under 49 U.S.C. §§ 5329(f) and (g), until the three jurisdictions have replaced the TOC with a State Safety Oversight Program administered by a new State Safety Oversight Agency that is fully compliant with 49 U.S.C. §5329(e). The Secretary's announcement followed a comprehensive Safety Management Inspection ("SMI") of the WMATA rail and bus systems that FTA conducted earlier this year, following a number of accidents, incidents, and a demonstrated pattern of safety lapses and concerns with WMATA's operations. On June 17, 2015, FTA issued both a Final Report on its SMI and Safety Directive 15-1, outlining 91 actions that WMATA must take to improve the safety of its public transportation operations; 78 of those 91 actions pertain to WMATA's rail system. On September 24, 2015, FTA approved WMATA's Corrective Action Plan ("CAP") to accomplish the required actions set forth in Safety Directive 15-1. FTA meets with WMATA on a monthly basis to track and oversee WMATA's progress in completing the required actions under the CAP.

This Directive outlines the respective roles and responsibilities of the TOC and FTA.

#### Actions

- 1. In exercising its lead responsibility for safety oversight of the WMATA rail system, FTA will conduct inspections, investigations, audits, examinations, and testing of WMATA's equipment, facilities, rolling stock, and operations; make reports and issue directives; impose reporting requirements; exercise other FTA oversight authorities; and withhold or direct the use of Federal financial assistance to WMATA, as necessary and appropriate.
- 2. At all times, FTA will retain lead responsibility for ensuring WMATA's completion of the CAP, but from time to time, FTA may task TOC to track and monitor WMATA's performance in completion of any required action under the CAP or any matter related to an FTA Safety Directive to WMATA. As available and appropriate, TOC will make its staff and consulting resources available for overseeing WMATA's completion of the required actions under the CAP.
- 3. In the immediate future, FTA will conduct an assessment of all findings and recommendations by TOC that remain unresolved. FTA will then address the findings and recommendations by TOC, as appropriate, to ensure that corrective actions are pursued under FTA oversight.
- 4. TOC remains responsible for compliance with the State Safety Oversight regulations at 49 C.F.R. Part 659. Until the District of Columbia, State of Maryland, and Commonwealth of Virginia establish a State Safety Oversight program that FTA has certified in accordance with 49 U.S.C. § 5329(e), FTA will provide leadership and

- general direction to the TOC for purposes of ensuring that all current 49 C.F.R. Part 659 regulations are met.
- 5. FTA will oversee the safety of the WMATA rail system, and specifically, WMATA's implementation of the required actions under the CAP.
- 6. Under 49 U.S.C. § 5329(e)(6), FTA awards Federal financial assistance to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments ("MWCOG") for the purpose of safety oversight of the WMATA rail system. MWCOG acts as the recipient of this Federal funding for administrative purposes, only; the District of Columbia, the State of Maryland, and the Commonwealth of Virginia each provide one-third of the local match to this Federal funding, and the three jurisdictions direct the activities of the TOC, through the staff and the consulting resources they provide the TOC. A certain portion of this Federal financial assistance will continue to be allocated for developing a State Safety Oversight Program compliant with 49 U.S.C. § 5329(e). The remainder of this Federal financial assistance will be made available for the purpose of overseeing the safety of the WMATA rail system, and WMATA's completion of the required actions under the CAP; FTA may impose or modify terms and conditions in the grants of Federal financial assistance for that purpose.


