



# Why Plan? DC's population is growing


Between 2006 & 2016 the District added 110,000 people. Over the next 10 years we expect to add 115,000.

#### DC Population Growth: 1800 – 2015 & to 2045



# Household incomes vary widely across DC






# **Vulnerable Populations**



### Wards 7 & 8—

largest number of residents with higher vulnerability to climate change impacts

especially increase in extreme heat – due to economic and demographic factors (e.g. income, age, health issues, etc.)



# Why are we integrating Resilience into DC's Comp Plan?

- Not being resilient affects DC's current & future livability
   & equity for residents
- Comp Plan provides policy guidance for multiple citywide topics & neighborhoods affected by (lack of) resilience
- Want to leverage existing interagency plans & collaboration
- Opportunity to integrate resilience thinking into government operations & private development
- Opportunity to consider impacts across topics/systems (i.e., housing, infrastructure, facilities)

# What has DC already done to promote resilience?

DC Silver Jackets (*District & federal agency flood management coordination*)

National Disaster Resilience Competition (*HSEMA + others*)

Climate Change Adaptation Plan (*DDOT*)

- ✓ Held 2 Comp Plan Resilience
   Advisory Group workshops (June & Sept 2016)
- ✓ Conducted Resilience Advisory Group Survey & Interviews (June-Fall 2016)
- ✓ Completed Lit Review & Inventory of District & other plans/studies, best practices (summer-fall 2016)

- ✓ Talked with **residents** about resilience at 7 PlanDC Community meetings & other community meetings (fall 2016-spring 2017)
- ✓ Members of the public submitted proposed amendments on resilience (spring-summer 2017)
- Drafted & finalizing new Comp
   Plan resilience narrative, policies
   actions (2017-present)
