THIRA FACTS

What is it?

- The THIRA is a tool that allows a jurisdiction to understand its threats and hazards and how the impacts may vary according to time of occurrence, season, location, and other community factors.
- This knowledge helps a jurisdiction establish informed and defensible capability targets (FEMA, 2012).

Who is required and Why?

- FEMA requires all UASI grant recipients to submit a THIRA.
- The THIRA is used to identify the capability targets that a community needs to support a host of activities, such as: capability estimation and required resource planning; mutual aid planning; identifying opportunities to lessen the impact of potential emergencies or disasters; and informing resource allocation within a community.
- The information can be shared with neighboring jurisdictions, and may present opportunities to share best practices or resources (FEMA, 2012).

Why are we speaking today?

- The group tasked with drafting this year's THIRA for the NCR is asking subject-matter experts to review and provide comments on last year's capability targets, desired outcomes, and impacts so that they can be updated for the 2014 edition.
- The THIRA will be used with the strategic planning process in the future to help address emergency management needs in the NOT.
