The RFC provides cross-cutting regional policy capacity and long-range regional planning recommendations to the COG Board of Directors. The coalition includes members from public, private and nonprofit sectors which all have a role in helping the region meet its goals.

The *Region Forward Vision* maps out ambitious goals and targets to guide future decisions and measure progress. In 2018, the RFC measured progress toward meeting these goals and targets. This progress is summarized in the subsequent pages.
