



I currently work as the Planning Associate for Casey Trees, the local non-profit organization with the mission to increase the urban tree canopy of the nation's capital. I have been living in DC since September 2012, and I travel predominantly by public transit, bicycle, or foot. I am an advocate for alternative transportation modes, but I believe that it is a region's responsibility to provide its residents with a range of transportation choices, allowing them the ability to travel by any mode (including the private automobile) both smoothly and efficiently.

Prior to living in DC, I worked in Santa Fe, New Mexico as a private planning and urban design consultant to public agencies in the research, analysis, and development of community, parks, trails, and open space master plans. While living in New Mexico, I also served as a citizen volunteer on the 'Citizen's Advisory Group' for the development and update of the Santa Fe Bicycle Master Plan. I worked as a planner in Arlington County's Planning Office between 2000 and 2008 and am a Certified Planner with the American Institute of Certified Planners. In Arlington, I led a team that tracked demographics and development data, and was a participant in several planning efforts within the County including the Clarendon and Crystal City public processes. I learned a great deal during that time about the interface between land use and transportation including transit oriented development and smart growth objectives.

I have been an avid cyclist for many years and frequently commute via bicycle through the region's parks, on street routes and bike paths. As a parent of a young child (my son is nearly five), I have gained an interest in pedestrian issues – the need for sidewalks and linkages on the neighborhood scale that is often frequented by youngsters as they go from home to parks and neighborhood retail. I am an advocate for alternative commuting options and telework one day a week myself. Having worked professionally with the numbers of commuters and modal splits of various communities in our region, I understand the important role that alternative commuting can play as we accommodate employment growth with a constrained transportation network.

I also believe that roads are an important part of our transportation system. I ride Metro (rail) to work most days, but use roads a great deal for short trips to daycare or shopping and on longer trips to visit family. I am interested in helping the region make the best use of this important and expensive resource. Lastly, environmental stewardship is a personal core value. I now serve as the chair of the Department of Transportation's "Green Team". In this capacity, I help to coordinate environmental efforts among the various Department Agencies (rail, transit, highways, etc.) and encourage staff to take the lead in making the best use of resources.

4. Is there any other information related to your serving as a member of the TPB Citizens Advisory Committee that you'd like to tell us about?

I served as an Alternate to the TPB CAC for the 2012 year (February 2012 through January 2013).

Between my work in Arlington and at FHWA, I spent two years as a staff member at the Maryland-National Park and Planning Commission in Montgomery County. While there I authored the *Highway Mobility Report* (HMR), participated in small area planning processes including the Wheaton Plan update, and also helped with a variety of projects including the update to the County Master Plan for Transportation. The HMR was a large project which included analysis of County and regional transportation congestion, bus and rail ridership, and pedestrian counts. During the course of the project, I collected data from COG, the University of Maryland, as well as the Interstate 95 Corridor Coalition and several other sources. This project led me to understand the interrelationships of development, transit and motor vehicle movement in our region.

Transportation is a necessary part of the conversation when we think about how we live, move and function as a region. Are we providing access to those in need, are our activity and employment centers properly served by transportation infrastructure, how does our region compare and compete with others? I would like to be a part of the TBP Citizens Advisory Committee, where transportation advocates help to seek answers to these questions.





I am active in transit issues in my neighborhood --- I live 5 houses from the future right of way of the Purple Line and have been involved in neighborhood meetings and testimony in favor of this LRT system.

I am currently president of Action Committee for Tranist, a 26 year old transit/safe-streets advocacy group in Montgomery County. Our monthly meetings feature speakers from WMATA, Amtrak, RideOn and well as elected officials --- these meetings help our membership keep up to date on transportation issues in the area.

About 18 months ago, I was selected to be on the County Executive's "Rapid Transit Task Force", which has delievered a plan for a countywide network of BRT routes that would alleviate some of the traffic congestion in our county. (I am also part of the transition team that has been convened to migrate from a full task force to a non-profit group that would educate and promote this BRT concept to the business & residential communities of the county.)

My community work vis a vis promoting the feasibility of the Purple Line coming right through our neighborhood has given me a closeup view of neighbors fears about change, as well as the benefits to our immediate community & areas further away (Bethesda, Langley Park, UMD) and their needs for the Purple Line. I've attended many Planning Board hearings on the Purple Line, where the issues range from what advantages/challenges it will contribute to Silver Spring, Chevy Chase or the Long Branch area (lower income, minority businesses) neighborhoods. It is interesting to hear such diverse (and passionate!)

Montgomery County is updating/streamlining its massive zoning code and, while not a member of the Advisory Group, I have been interested and attended many of the AG open meetings and briefings by the planning board staff. Streamlining the code and fostering easier approaches to attracting Transit-Oriented-Development, I believe, will make for more walkable communities --- something that both young people and people retiring-in-place are lobbying for. Hence I'd like to stay in touch with the regional issues in this regard, and the CAC/TPB is a wonderful vantage point to view what is happening to TOD throughout the region.

In my neighborhood, I am both a pedestrian and a bicyclist (I try to leave our one car in the garage as much as possible!). And I'm a member of WABA. Roads, we've been trained, are meant for cars. However, if we want more walkable communities, we're going to have to press hard to re-educate people that roads (and sidewalks) are for moving PEOPLE --- yes, cars use the roads, but so do buses and bicycles. Pedestrians need sidewalks and we need them wide enough for people pushing strollers and people in wheelchairs. This has been a "forgotten" aspect of road design, I believe, in our county and perhaps elsewhere as well. I'd like to continue on the CAC to press forward this idea that the road network is for ALL people, not just cars.

This past year I have had the honor to serve as CAC chair and have attended almost all the TPB meetings – I appreciate having had this opportunity to participate and view the region's transportation issues, as opposed to just the local/county issues.

The CAC serves a vital role for citizen input into the broader planning process and I'd like to continue to be a part of that conversation and discussion.





1. Why are you interested in serving on the TPB's Citizen Advisory Committee?

Metropolitan Planning Organizations have a unique role in coordinating regional transportation investments, and TPB is no exception. The Washington metropolitan area, faced with significant population growth over the next several decades, will face significant mobility challenges. At the same time, the DC metro area is one of the leaders in alternative transportation mode share, and it will become increasingly more important to rely on growing our transit, bicycle, and pedestrian networks as road capacity becomes increasingly more constrained.

I live and own a home in an inner suburb in Prince George's County (Mount Rainier), where I have lived for the past few years. Mount Rainier, which is over a hundred years old, parallels both one of the earliest Baltimore and Ohio railroad branches, as well as one of the former major streetcar lines. Though the streetcar is no longer, the grid and density in the corridor still persists to this day and the city is wellserved by frequent bus transit and an adjacent metro line. However, being located in the eastern part of the region, there is still an opportunity for both population and economic redevelopment as much of our investment in this region has increasingly shifted westward. There is a lot of opportunity in our inner core and in historically dense corridors to rebuild and grow, and one of my interests in serving on the CAC, is providing a voice focused not just on in the historic core of DC or Arlington, but advocating for thoughtful development region-wide that can reduce VMT and encourage more livable communities.

The CAC provides a wonderful opportunity for citizen participation and input for these goals, and I would be pleased to have the opportunity to serve a term.

I have significant experience in public transportation, having worked in the transit industry for over five years at the Office of Research, Demonstration and Innovation at the Federal Transit Administration (United States Department of Transportation). One of my primary roles there is managing our two largest research programs – the Transit Cooperative Research Program (TCRP), a applied transit research program run in conjunction with the National Academy of Science, and our university research program. Due to the very small size of the agency, I've also played a role as a reviewer in many of our major discretionary capital grant investments and am one of the primary leads for bicycling and alternative transportation at FTA.

During my tenure at FTA, I also was detailed to the Environmental Protection Agency and the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA), where I worked for nearly a year in 2009, and became familiar with both the federal environmental review process and transit service planning.

In addition, I am also tasked with the overall coordination of FTA's implementation of the research, technical assistance, and workforce development sections of MAP-21 (the newest two year surface transportation bill and the successor to SAFETEA-LU). While this is just one piece of the overall surface transportation bill, it has given me a strong familiarity and understanding of all aspects of how federal funding flows to local jurisdictions.

More locally, I am also active in my city and region. I am also on Mount Rainier's Mixed Use Town Center Review Board, which is a city appointed committee of municipal representatives, residents, and business/property owners who review applications for, and make recommendations on, exterior renovations and new development in Mount Rainier's Mixed-Use Town Center Zone, in coordination with staff from Maryland Park and Planning (MNC-PPC). I have a Master degree from the University of Virginia in Environmental and Urban Planning. Also, below is a summarized explanation on some of the other areas I know I could contribute to the Citizens Advisory Committee.

Affordable housing – I have been in real estate for the last 15 years and I am well aware of the scarcity of affordable housing in our area. It is a challenge to make affordable housing available in current developments. Of course, there are more applicants than homes available. As a real estate brokers, I offer first time home owners workshops to purchase their first property.

Business/Chamber – I am the President and founder of the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce of Northern Virginia. Transportation options allow prospective employee to reach employment creating a healthier economy. We concentrate on the Latino community and communities wanting to do business with Latinos in the area.

Motor Vehicle Advocacy – I do not think waging a war against car is the way to accomplish a good transportation plan. I think one of the reasons this country is efficient is due to many people being able to drive their own cars. Cars should be part of a transportation plan; especially in those areas where having public transportation is not cost effective.

Telework – This is another good option that should be included in transportation plans. I think its benefits definitely outweigh its cost. I allow my agents to work from home as much as possible.

Smart Growth – Stopping growth could only be accomplished by modifying some of our civil liberties. Population continues to increase and they need infrastructure, homes, services, etc. That is why I get involved in zoning hearings, HOA's and keeping with local decisions as much as possible.

Land-Use Issues – This is another major area that causes many of our current problems in Virginia. Previous state, county and local officials, trying to apace their residents, approved/made land use decisions that placed a strain on the local infrastructure. Making sure that land use makes sense and promotes in some areas higher density and less commuting should another component of a good transportation plan. My academic background in Planning allows to see options that can work better when planning communities.



Since 2009, I have served on the Fairfax County Transportation Advisory Commission as a representative to the Providence District. The commission assists the Supervisors with various transportation issues that face the county, and takes various advocacy roles in improving transportation. I have been active in subcommittees including those for common sense initiatives, such as those aimed at low-cost improvements for bus stops targeted to the disadvantaged population.

I am also serving on the Bicycle Advisory Committee that is designing an integrated bicycle network for Fairfax County, the first phase being focused on Tysons corner.

My profession for the last 30 years has been focused on large scale transportation planning, and I am a principal in a firm focused on efficient design of air transportation networks. Early in my career, I was a planner assigned to the Los Angeles Metro Rail project, where I was involved in community outreach and public involvement to gain input into system design.

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4. Is there any other information related to your serving as a member of the TPB Citizens Advisory Committee that you'd like to tell us about?

I participated in TPB's Community Leadership Institute in 2008, and found the program a great means to gain insight into the complex transportation problems facing the region. The Institute also provided realistic hope that tough problems can be solved in a cooperative spirit and with hard work.

I would be anxious to apply these principles to current issues facing the COG as it leads the direction of regional plans.
