2014 Point-in-Time Enumeration

- □ COG's 14th annual enumeration
- Conducted on January 29, 2014
- Provides a one-day "snapshot" of the region's homeless population
- Updates data on the number of unsheltered persons and persons utilizing Winter Shelters, Year-round Emergency Shelters, Transitional Housing Facilities, Safe Havens and Permanent Supportive Housing within nine metropolitan Washington area jurisdictions

How is Homelessness Defined?


- Literally Homeless People who reside in some form of emergency or transitional shelters, domestic violence shelters, runaway youth shelters, and places not meant for human habitation, which include streets, parks, alleys, camp sites, abandoned buildings, and stairways.
- □ Formerly Homeless People presently living in permanent supportive housing, rapid re-housing or other permanent housing following a period of living on the street or in emergency or transitional shelter.


[•] Children represent 60% of all people in homeless families and account for nearly a third (28%) of the region's literally homeless population.

Homelessness and the Working Poor

- 34% of all homeless adults in families are employed
 (2 percentage point decrease from 2013)
- 19% of all homeless single adults have jobs (1 point decrease from 2013)
- 44% of all adults who have income reported that employment wages and salaries were their primary source of income (4 point decrease from 2013, but 6 point increase from 38% in 2012)

Note: The data for employed homeless single adults and homeless adults in families includes 3% who did not respond to this question.

Permanent Supportive Housing



NOTE: The number of formerly homeless persons in Permanent Supportive Housing increased by 35% from 2010-2014.

Rapid Re-Housing

- 115 single Homeless Adults were in Rapid Re-Housing on January 29, 2014
- 2,501 persons in Homeless Families were in Rapid Re-Housing on January 29, 2014
- 22% of the formerly homeless population was in Rapid Re-Housing on the night of the Point-in-Time count.
 - Most formerly homeless are housed in PSH (95% of single adults and 61% of families)

What Works in Our Region?

- Housing First model;
- Rental subsidies for low-income households;
- Shelter diversion programs and prevention strategies that identify households at risk of homelessness;
- Outreach to unsheltered homeless people living in the woods and on the street;
- Creating more affordable housing opportunities across all income levels throughout the metropolitan Washington area.

Challenges to Ending Homelessness

- Federal budget uncertainty, cuts in grant funding and limited availability of Housing Choice Vouchers may limit progress on providing Temporary and Permanent Supportive Housing
- Increasing housing prices in the region further constrain affordable housing options
