2ND ANNUAL YOUTH EMERGING SUCCESSFULLY (Y.E.S) CONFERENCE



The 2nd Annual Youth Emerging Successfully (Y.E.S) Conference was held at George Mason University on July 20, 2015. COG partnered with the National Conference of State Societies (NCSS) Cherry Blossom Princess Alumnae Organization to recognize 13 young women who have graduated from high school despite many

hurdles while in foster care and on the verge of aging out. The participants of the conference were heading towards college, vocational studies, or trade school.

The Y.E.S conference encompassed a tour of George Mason University's campus and workshops that provided the young women with soft-skills and financial literacy. Capital One representatives gave the graduates tips during the *Me*, *Myself, and Money* workshop on how to prepare for unexpected costs, budgeting, and avoiding credit pitfalls. During *College Life 101*, the young women received advice from panelists for preparing to have a successful first year in higher education. Fed Cap's Washingtonians for Children led the *Developing YOUR Personal Brand* workshop to teach the graduates how to best create their personal brand, market themselves to employers, and practice workplace and social media etiquette. The young women also had the opportunity to have professional headshots taken and a session on how to use those headshots for networking profiles such as LinkedIn. Furthermore, the *Rising Stars* workshop focused on personal leadership and developing career goals and aspirations based on strengths, personality characteristics, and opportunities.

After a refreshing lunch, the participants received an empowering keynote address, encouraging them to be their best selves despite the cards they have been dealt and to make a positive impact on communities through their future endeavors. The afternoon concluded with raffles for dorm room essentials such as shower caddies, comforter sets, and more. Each graduate received a gift bag including a laptop or tablet in honor of their newest accomplishment of graduating from high school and continuing on to a higher education.

KINSHIP AWARENESS IN NORTHERN VIRGINIA

Kinship care consists of a family member or fictive kin caring for a child who has been removed from their biological parents. Unfortunately, in the state of Virginia, funds are not allocated to using Kinship as a placement option for youth in foster care. According to a recent law in the state of Virginia, youth will now age out of the foster care system at the age of eighteen rather than twenty-one. Jurisdictions of Northern Virginia are using the month of September to bring awareness to kinship and the difference it could make for many young people.

On September 24, 2015, the Northern Virginia Kinship Group hosted their First Annual Kinship Symposium titled "Celebrating Family: Moving Kinship Forward". This group includes: Arlington County, the City of Alexandria, Fairfax County, Loudoun County, and Prince William County. The Kinship Symposium was an opportunity for child welfare professionals to further understand the dynamics of kinship care and what it may look like in practice. Dr. Sharon McDaniel, founder and CEO of A Second Chance, Inc.-a kinship care agencyshared both her personal and professional experiences on the best practices of kinship care and in what ways they affect not only a child, but the foster care system as well. Heidi Redlich Epstein, Director of Kinship Policy for the American Bar Association Center on Children and the Law, presented from a legal standpoint how extended families can be used for kinship care based on federal and state laws. As a former relative caregiver and current kinship expert, Dr. Joseph Crumbley, LCSW engagingly presented ways in which child welfare professionals can engage relative caregivers and use strengths to manage the risk factors of kinship care. A kinship panel concluded the afternoon by answering lingering questions and concerns for moving kinship forward. Moving kinship forward not only means placing children with relatives or fictive kin, but also finding life long connections for youth, especially those on the verge of aging out.
