BACKGROUND and EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bike to Work Day has been held annually in the Washington metropolitan region for more than 15 years and was originally started by the Washington Area Bicyclist Association with a main rallying point or pit stop in downtown DC. In September 2000, The National Capital Region Transportation Board (TPB's) Commuter Connections program, housed at the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, partnered with WABA to form a regional Bike to Work Day Steering Committee to examine the feasibility of adding additional Bike to Work Day pit stops or rallying points throughout the region in 2001, thus creating a larger awareness of using cycling to work as a viable commuting alternative. Since that first involvement with Bike to Work Day in 2001, registration for the event has grown exponentially with more participants signing up every year.

Bike to Work Day planning began in September 2015 for the May 20, 2016 event. The Steering Committee's 6 percent increase goal for the 2016 event was 18,500. Though the amount of registrants, 17,544 was lower than the goal, the number represents less than a 1 percent increase over 2015.

Bicyclists enjoyed free T-shirts, snacks, participated in prize drawings, music, and engaged with elected officials. Commuter Connections secured \$43,100 in cash sponsorship donations that went towards the overall regional marketing efforts. Including the in-kind sponsorship donations the support for the event was \$57,000.

The success of the marketing promotion campaign relied upon targeting of employer and commuter audiences, identification of cost-effective mediums, crafting key messages, and procuring giveaway items such as t-shirts and water bottles designed to attract commuters to try bicycling to work.

The Steering Committee's resources to reach its registrant goal for Bike to Work Day 2016, included:

- Web site designed and maintained by Commuter Connections.
- > Posters and rack cards developed and printed by Commuter Connections.
- Promoting the event through WABA's membership.
- ➤ Providing links from the local Transportation Management Associations' (TMA web sites to WABA's site).
- ➤ A radio campaign produced and placed by Commuter Connections.
- Outreach to employers through a direct mail marketing and email campaign by Commuter Connections.
- > An article geared towards employers in the Commuter Connections newsletter.
- Local marketing efforts by the various pit stop managers.
- > An e-mail blast to previous year's participants.
- Vinyl banners designed and printed by Commuter Connections.
- A public affairs outreach effort through the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Office of Communications and WABA.
- ➤ The design and distribution of free t-shirts by Commuter Connections
- Donated giveaway prizes obtained through REI, bikes@vienna, and BicycleSPACE.


In addition, 21 confirmed bicycling convoy routes were identified by WABA along with route leaders who assisted novice and experienced cyclists through the routes. Each convoy traveled to a pit stop where cyclists received free refreshments, t-shirts and other giveaways. Many pit stops had additional activities for bicyclists and are described later in this report.

Since 2000, the COG/TPB's Commuter Connections program has worked to increase awareness of bicycling to work as a viable option by joining with the WABA in their

efforts to promote and coordinate the region's annual Bike to Work Day event. Commuter Connections created and maintains a regional marketing effort that helped to increase the number of cyclists participating in the yearly event. Although bicycling accounts for a small percentage of the overall regional commute mode split, it helps reduce traffic congestion, improves air quality, and provides a healthy commute alternative for those commuters who choose to use it as a sustainable means of transportation to and from work.

Since 2006, the Bike to Work Day Event has a budget line item for the Commuter Connections Work Program. Commuter Connections is funded by the District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia, and U.S. Departments of Transportation.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM AREA PIT-STOPS

Adams Morgan: Thanks to the gorgeous weather and the participation of our community partners, the Adams Morgan pit stop was a huge success. City Bikes and BicycleSPACE sent crews out to help the commuters with repairs and both shops donated items to be raffled (including a new bike from City Bikes) allowing us to give away prizes every 15 minutes. Tryst donated coffee, bagels and fruit, and the WABA Bike Ambassadors helped us keep everything organized and flowing smoothly. With 521 registered riders, the Adams Morgan pit stop was the third most popular in DC. As per usual, we donated our remaining BTWD t-shirts to the Columbia Heights pit stop for their evening riders.

Alexandria – Carlyle Carlyle had an exceptional year for its 5th anniversary Pit Stop including a record number of exhibitors and sponsors, dedicated volunteers and many motivated cyclists who stopped by. For the first time, we had a featured sponsor - Grant Thornton - and thanks to their donation were able to giveaway bike lights and fold-up reusable tote bags. The talented Alan MacEwen played guitar, trumpet and sang. Registrations were up nearly 10% over 2015. A new feature was a Snapchat Geofilters contest. Alexandria – Del Ray: The Del Ray pit stop had 225 registrants. The event was held from 6am to 9am at Colasanto Park.

Alexandria – Mark Center: The event was held from 7:00 am to 9:00 a.m. Of the 93 registrants, 64 bicyclists attended the Mark Center pit stop and picked up their t-shirts. Refreshments such as granola bars, fresh fruit, and water were provided.

Alexandria - Old Town: There were 527 registrants. The event was held from 6:30am to 8:30am at the Market Square at Alexandria City hall.

Anacostia: There were 73 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7am to 8:30am across from the Anacostia Arts Center.

Arlington – East Falls Church: There were 158 registrants for the pit stop. The pit stop also had an event from 4pm to 7pm for commuters heading home from their worksites.

Arlington – Rosslyn, Columbia Pike, Shirlington, and Ballston: Bike to Work Day 2016 was a huge success! Arlington had a total of 7 pit stops, 5 of which were coordinated by BikeArlington. Rosslyn and Ballston were directly run by BikeArlington, Shirlington and Columbia Pike had the assistance of Phoenix Bikes and the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization, respectively. The brand new afternoon Happy Hour was assisted by MORE (Mid-Atlantic Off-Road Enthusiasts) and New District Brewing. BikeArlington also helped to provide marketing for the East Falls Church and the Crystal City stops. In total there

were more than 2,700 registrations in Arlington. Rosslyn had 972 registrations, Ballston had 567, Crystal City had 547, Columbia Pike had 173, East Falls Church had 158, Shirlington had 245 and New District Happy Hour had 75.

The Rosslyn pit stop was again held at Gateway Park and the Ballston pit stop was held at Freshbikes bike shop. The Columbia Pike location was held at Penrose Square and the Shirlington was located just outside the public library. DJs played a good set of upbeat music to keep the crowd pumped up as t-shirts were handed out at registration. An instant winner raffle/giveaway was implemented again this year with prizes for each cyclist. In

addition to small prizes for everyone, more than 470 medium prizes valued at \$10-\$30 and more than 125 large prizes valued at \$30-\$100 were given out between all pit stops. The brand new afternoon stop was held at New District Brewery's location in Shirlington, with temporary bike racks brought in and well-utilized throughout the evening by the 250 attendees. 220 co-branded pint glasses were distributed to attendees.

Refreshments included bagels, granola bars, bananas and coffee from Java Shack/Commonwealth Joe's. Rosslyn was joined by District Taco and KIND Snacks, providing free breakfast tacos and breakfast bars. In Shirlington Best Buns provided the refreshments and at Columbia Pike there was pie from the Acme Pie Company and donuts from Sugar Shack. The Rosslyn BID brought special sock giveaways for all participants at Rosslyn and also provided a photo booth for riders. A unicyclist delighted folks at Ballston dressed as a car and giant games were available to play at all morning stops. Sign spinners directed cyclists to the pit stops. In attendance at Rosslyn was

Congressman Don Beyer who rode his bike from Alexandria as well as Arlington County Board member Jay Fisette, both of whom spoke about the importance of biking as a fun and reliable transportation option. Shirlington's Happy Hour pit stop was attended by Arlington County Board Member Katie Cristol.

The weather was great, so almost all of the registered attendees showed up, including many day-of registrants as well. A special thanks goes out to all the partnering organizations as well as all the wonderful volunteers, without which such a successful event could not have come to fruition again.

Arlington – New District Brewing: The pit stop had 75 registrants. The afternoon event was held from 4:30pm to 6:30pm at the District Brewery near the W &OD Trail.

Bethesda: The Bethesda Pit Stop had 477 participants check in on-site and over 700 bicyclists pre-register.

MD State Delegate Ariana Kelly once again served as the official Bike to Work Day emcee. This year's program included Proclamations from the State Comptroller, Montgomery County, the State of Maryland, as well as from the Maryland State Legislature and Montgomery County Council. Food and refreshments were donated from many different Bethesda businesses. Attendees had their choice of dozens of prizes including various gift certificates, bike accessories, and a bicycle donated by Griffin Cycle. Raffle prizes were awarded several times an hour. There were also prizes awarded via a photo contest, and BTS gave out a special prize to an employer group attending the event together. Employees from Bethesda's SS Papadopolus biked to the event and each received a reflective belted sport bag.

Several businesses were provided tables with representatives at the event, including: CFF Ride to Victory, The American Diabetes Association, Griffin Cycle, Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, WABA, Carr Workplaces, Capital Crescent Trail Coalition, Bethesda Sport and Health, Bethesda Green. Smoothie King came out with staff to provide samples and fresh fruit was provided by Whole Foods. Baked goods were donated by Bethesda Bagels and Spring Mill Bread Company, and Silver provided coffee and yogurt parfaits. DrinkMore Water donated jugs of water and lent out water dispensers, so participants could fill water bottles instead of picking up bottled water.

Delegate Kelly and BTS Director Kristen Blackmon presented Bethesda's 13th Annual Bicycle Commuter Spirit Awards. This year's winners were Walter Gonzalez and Dave Dabney. Both winners showed tenacious spirit and dedication in their long years of bike commuting in all types of weather.

Bowie Old Town: There were 30 registrants for the Old Town pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 8:30am at the Fire Station.

Capitol Heights: There were 17 riders who came to the Pitstop. Of that number, 11 actually showed up. We gave out all of the BTWD t-shirts as well as the t-shirts, bike lights, hand sanitizers, and leg and arm bands that were donated by MNCPPC.

Shawntea and Marisol from DPW&T were on hand to help with the Pit Stop. Also on-hand was Kenniss Henry of the Ride for Natasha Pettigrew cycling event.

Capitol Riverfront: The pit stop had 266 registrants. The event was held from 7am to 9am at Canal Park.

Coast Guard Headquarters: There were 47 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6am to 9am at the U.S. Coast Guard Headquarters.

College Park City Hall: The pit stop had 118 registrants. The event was held from 6:30am to 8:30am at the City Hall.

College Park Metro: There were 37 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 4pm to 7pm.

Columbia Heights: A fine, warm clear day (amid a cool rainy season) encouraged many riders to gather at the plaza in Columbia Heights for the sixth *Bike to Work Day* afternoon pit stop. Eighty-nine cyclists who had signed up for earlier stops joined over one hundred fifty of us, sharing camaraderie and savoring the pleasant evening.

Thanks to our ten volunteers, fruits and beverages were distributed, along with T-shirts (thanks *WABA* and *MWCoG*!), swag (thanks *goDCgo*!), and water bottles (thanks *Bicycle Space*!) beneath our banner (fluttering from a central *Park Triangle* balcony). Congrats to Chelsea, Elena, Jorge, Kobi, Landon, and Monica – our prize-winners: the continuous individual drawing method spread the winners throughout the afternoon and eliminated the need to wait or be contacted, and kept the participants' interest piqued. Thanks to *Bicycle Space* for sponsoring the tune-up station (which was packed throughout the entire event!) and the Third District Police and *WABA* for spending the afternoon with us, once again!

Crystal City: There were 547 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7am to 9am at the Water Park.

Dumfries: There were 16 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7:30 to 9:30am at City Hall.

Edgewood Met Branch (DC): The Edgewood Metropolitan Branch Trail pit stop had another outstanding year. It is the only pit stop located on the Met Branch Trail highlighting that physical infrastructure is an important element in increasing bicycling especially for new riders. This year, 463 riders passed by the pit stop while 1,313 used the trail on Bike to Work Day. This is the highest trail use to date, surpassing 1,278 on the day Metro shut down and 1,178 on Bike to Work Day in 2015, based on data from our new trail counter. The Edgewood Met Branch Trail pit stop is organized by the adjacent community with support from Bicycle Space, Gearin' Up Bicycles, WABA, the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy and our newest member Menkiti Group. The stop's volunteers enthusiastically cheer on passing cyclists and offer free repairs.

Fairfax Government Center: The pit stop had 136 registrants. The event was held from 6:30am to 9am at the Government Center.

Fairfax City: The pit stop had 125 registrants. The event was held from 6am to 9am at the Old Town Square.

Fair Lakes: There were 79 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6am to 9am at the Fair Lakes Shopping Center.

Falls Church: There were 370 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 9am on the W & OD Trail by Little Falls Street.

Fort Totten: There were 49 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 9:30am at the Fort Totten Metro station.

Fort Belvoir: There were 21 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7am to 9am and 11:30am to 1pm at the Mt. Vernon Highway gate to the base.

Franklin Square (DC): There were over 300 registrants for this new pit stop open from 7:30 am to 9:30 am at 1225 Eye Street NW across from Franklin Square Park – exceeding the registration goal by 100 riders! The site host, International Republican Institute, provided 15 volunteers to give out food and drink from area businesses including Atrium Café, Bolt Catering, Franklin Grill, P&R Enterprises and Panera Bread. In addition, there were also raffle items donated by &pizza, Blue Ridge Revolutions, Bobby Van's, Buredo, goDCgo, and Yoga District.

Freedom Plaza (DC): The pit stop had 847 registrants. The event was held from 7am to 9am.

Frederick: Frederick's pit stop had almost 370 registered riders with nearly 200 participants at the event. Registration was a bit lower for 2016 than for 2015's event due to unpredictable spring weather.

Enthusiasm was high at the pit stop where riders enjoyed food and drinks donated by The Fractured Prune, Wegmans, The Common Market, Gravel & Grind, and more. The crowd was welcomed by Senator Ben Cardin's representative Robin Summerfield, Frederick County Executive Jan Gardner, Frederick City Mayor Randy McClement, Frederick City Alderwoman Kelly Russell, and Major General Brian Lein, Commanding General for the U.S. Army Medical Research and Material Command and Fort Detrick. The emcee was John Fieseler from the Tourism Council of Frederick County. The Frederick County Parks & Rec department provided tables and chairs for food suppliers and vendors, which included The Bicycle Escape (who also donated a bike for the raffle) and KEY103. Riders were also entered into a raffle to receive bike accessories, gift certificates from Glory Doughnuts and The Common Market, and bike lights from TransIT.

The annual pre-event Registration Celebration was held at Clemson Corner Shopping Center on Friday, May 13th. The Bicycle Escape allowed us to set up a registration table at their store. Retailers provided free massages (Massage Envy), the Frederick Wine House had wine and cheese tastings at their storefront and pizza was donated from Coal Fire Pizza. About 50 people participated in the event.

Friendship Heights: There were 143 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 9am at Wisconsin Place Plaza.

Gaithersburg: There were 164 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7am to 9am along Orchard Ridge Drive at Great Seneca Highway.

Georgetown – Meigs Park and Waterfront Park (DC): The Georgetown BID hosted a pit stop for the fourth year in a row at the Georgetown Waterfront Park (DC) - and it was even bigger than last year! With over 600 bicyclists stopping by throughout the morning, we had great and enthusiastic crowds starting at 7:00 AM. Many of our Georgetown businesses and partners offered delicious treats, hot coffee and fun giveaways, including:

In addition to the above items, the Georgetown BID distributed the BTWD t-shirts, seat covers, light sets, donations from marquis sponsors, and did a raffle for the Dios Thronous saddle, one-year Capital Bikeshare membership, and bicycle accessories - plus added some Georgetown gift cards and swag into the pot of prizes. All were exceedingly grateful to win. With the large attendance, the giveaways ran out by 9:00, but nearly everyone who registered for a t-shirt got one, and all attendees got something to eat, drink, or take home. The great weather helped everyone attending and working the event stay enthusiastic, and this turned out to be the best bike to work day yet for Georgetown.

Glover Park: There were 91 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 8:30am in front of the Savoy Suites Hotel.

Golden Triangle – Farragut Square: This year, 342 people registered and 146 people came out for Bike to Work day. Our pit stop was open from 7am through 9:30 am, and throughout the morning, there was a very constant stream of folks coming through. Most who visited our stop were from the Farragut Square neighborhood, and many were folks who worked in the different Tower Companies office buildings. We had a raffle that took place for those who attended bike to work day, and there was some office competition taking place among some building clients to see who could have the most people come out for the event. We had a lot of fun with the day's events, and we're looking forward to next year's bike to work day and hope to have even more people in attendance.

Golden Triangle – L Street (DC): There were 257 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7:30am to 9am.

Greenbelt: Bike To Work Day 2016 was the fifth year for the Greenbelt Pit Stop. A committee of five City of Greenbelt employees organized the event at the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center. There were 127 bikers registered with 98 passing through. Jeff & Laurie Lemieux of Proteus Bicycles in College Park led 20 bikers on a convoy to downtown Washington DC. There was an express route directly to Freedom Plaza and a local route via College Park to Freedom Plaza. Our sponsors:

- A Proteus Bicycle mechanic provided light maintenance and safety checks on over 50 bikes.

Haymarket: There were 10 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6am to 9:30am at Haymarket Bicycles.

Herndon: There were 462 registrants for the pit stop, up 8% from 2015. The event was held from 5:30am to 10am with an afternoon stop from 4-6:30 p.m. Located between the Herndon Depot Train Museum and old Town Hall, just off the W&OD trail, the location is ideal for long and short range riders. The early opening appeals to many who are headed into the city. A-1 Cycling continues to sponsor the Town's pit stop, providing mechanical services, refreshments and give-aways. Participation by the Green Lizard bike shop, the town's police bike unit, Fairfax Alliance for Better Bicycling (FABB), Northwest Federal Credit Union and massage therapy from Quality Chiropractic made the event a success! As one of very few nice days this spring, riders were thrilled for the chance to be out on a beautiful morning and feel celebrated by the regional effort to promote Bike to Work Day.

Hyattsville Macgruder Park: There were 117 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 6:30am to 8:30am.

Indian Head: There were 62 registrants for the pit stop. Over 119 riders attended the event. There were 9 vendors with tables & displays promoting there services, event or programs. The Chick-fil-a cow and helped handout over 40 raffle prizes plus two 26" bikes, 1-for boys and 1-for girls. The pit stop received a Proclamation from the Charles County Commissioners. The pit stop also received a Maryland General Assembly Official Citation from the Southern Maryland Delegation. The Youngest Mayor in Maryland's 382 year old history and 3rd youngest in USA's history, rode his bike and worked with us all day.

Ivy City: There were 23 registrants for the pit stop. The event was held from 7am to 9am at the Historic Hecht Warehouse building.

Leesburg: - It was a beautiful morning for the 210 participants who visited the Leesburg Pit Stop on Bike to Work Day. Loudoun County Commuter Services' staff set up tents and tables for its festive event held adjacent to the W&OD Trail in Leesburg's Raflo Park. The event was held at Strawberry Park in Mosaic from 6:30-9:00 a.m. This year the pit stop had live acoustic music inviting riders to the pit stop along with Freshbikes providing bike tune-ups and safety checks for the riders. National Geographic Society: National Geographic Society played host to hundreds of cyclists for Washington DC's 2016 Bike to Work Day. Nearly 500 cyclists registered to the Nat Geo pit stop and enjoyed coffee (courtesy of Peet's), snacks, music, raffle prizes, chair massages, bike maintenance (courtesy of The Bike Rack), and more. Participants also learned about other ways to care for our planet and support cycling in the region thanks to representatives from WABA, goDCgo, DC Water, Climate Ride, the Anacostia Watershed Society, and Enterprise Carshare. An ecstatic Amy, who accepted the bike along with her husband and children, won a Sun Folding F7 bike! Members of the Woitach family have participated in Bike to Work Day since 2002!



Radio advertising targeted adults ages 25-49, with additional focus on women and minorities, with a household income above \$30,000. Hot 99.5, WPGC, 97.1 WASH, and DC101 ran :60 second radio ads. The radio stations also provided social media promotions to engage listeners and encourage Bike to Work Day registration. For the first time ever, a female announcer voice was used for the radio ad. 



Proclamation



WHEREAS, bicycle commuting is an effective means to improve air quality, reduce traffic congestion, and conserve energy; and

WHEREAS, Capital Bikeshare's regional bike sharing system has hundreds of stations within the District of Columbia, Alexandria, Arlington, and Montgomery County; and

WHEREAS, the National Capital Area Transportation Planning Board through its Commuter Connections program promotes bicycling and organizes Bike to Work Day along with the Washington Area Bicyclist Association; and

WHEREAS, the week of May 16th is National Bike to Work Week, which promotes bicycling as a viable means of transportation to and from work;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL **REGION TRANSPORTATION PLANNING BOARD:**
