

About the TPB


- Federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Washington region
- 3,500 square miles in area
- Home to more than 5 million people and 3 million jobs
- Members include:
 - State transportation agencies
 - 23 local jurisdictions
 - State and DC legislatures
 - WMATA
 - Others





Visualize 2045


- Long-range transportation plan financially constrained element
- Developed cooperatively by the region's Transportation and Transit agencies
- All regionally significant projects and programs
- Hundreds of road and transit projects
- Financially constrained: funds must be "reasonably expected to be available"
- Must meet air quality standards
- Must cover 20-year period.
 Horizon Year: 2045
- Major update every four years





The TIP

- Federal Requirements
 - Must cover at least a 4-year period and be updated every 4 years
 - Funding in the first two fiscal years must be "available and committed"
 - Project funding in the TIP should be based on a investment plan to attain a set of federally approved performance targets
- TPB's TIP covers 6 years to match state and District programming





The TIP

- Formally updated and approved by the TPB every two years
 - Amended monthly as needed
- Following TPB approval, the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia incorporate their respective portions of the TIP into their own Statewide Transportation Improvement Programs (STIPs)
 - Opportunities for public involvement at statewide level
- STIPs are submitted to Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration for approval
 - Must remain consistent with TPB's TIP



TPB Development of FY 2019-2024 TIP


Schedule

- October 2017: TPB approves Technical Inputs Solicitation for Visualize 2045 constrained element and the FY 2019-2024 TIP
- November 2017: projects submitted for air quality conformity analysis
- December 14, 2017 January 13, 2018: Public comment period
- May August: Programming data for TIP projects submitted
- Release for public comment on September 7, 2018 along with Visualize 2045, air quality conformity and performance analyses
- Approval October 17, 2018
- Currently amended FY 2017-2022 TIP rolled over into FY 2019-2024



Current FY 2017-2022 TIP Funding

- \$18.7 billion programmed between FY 2017 and FY 2022
 - \$7.3 billion from state, local, and regional sources (39%)
 - \$9 billion is federal funding (48%)
 - \$10.8 billion programmed in FY 2017-2018
 - More than 50 types of federal, state, regional, local and private funds





Current FY 2017-2022 TIP Funding

Over 450 Projects

- 210 Road & Bridge
- 61 Transit
- 30 Bicycle & Pedestrian*
- Other: ITS, Safety, Freight,
 Maintenance & Rehabilitation

*Does not include road or bridge projects that include bicycle or pedestrian accommodations







Current FY 2017-2022 TIP Funding

Project costs in the current TIP

- 3 projects over \$1 billion
- 28 projects over \$100 million
- 262 projects \$10 million or less





- Tier 1: Core
- **Tier 2:** Design complete; ready for construction
- Tier 3: Planning and preliminary design complete; ready for final design
- Tier 4: Earliest phase; need planning and/or design
- Also considered: moveDC, Vision Zero, best use of CMAQ




Consolidated Transportation Plan (CTP) Building Blocks

- 2040 Maryland Transportation Plan (MTP): 20-year mission document for a balanced, multimodal approach to transportation planning
 - Updated every 5 years, submitted with the State Report on Transportation, and will be adopted January 2019
- Transportation Business Units Needs Assessments
 - SHA, MTA, MPA, MVA, MAA, & MDTA
- County Priority Letters and Secretary's Annual Tour
- Chapter 30 New Maryland Law to add transparency to project selection process
 - Analytical tool to rank and evaluate major capacity projects based on 9 goals and 23 measures

- Currently Approved CTP: FY 2018-2023
 - Six-year capital budget document updated annually
 - Included in the current draft of the TPB's FY 2019-2024 TIP
 - CTP.Maryland.Gov
- Public Involvement: Priority Letters and Annual Tours
 - The Secretary and the Transportation Business Unit administrators visit the 23 counties and the City of Baltimore between September 15th and November 15th every year
 - Members of the public and local and elected officials provide feedback to the Draft CTP

- Draft FY 2019-2024 CTP will be:
 - Published September 4th, 2018
 - Submitted to the Maryland Legislature January 2019
 - Approved and signed by the Governor April 2019
 - Following approval, amend TPB's FY 2019-2024 TIP to update



- Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)
 - Four-year program
 - www.mdot.maryland.gov/newMDOT/Planning/STIP_TIP/STIPan dTIP 2017.html
 - Uses Fall Secretary's Tour for public engagement and feedback
- FY 2017 STIP approved August 2016
 - Currently includes TPB's FY 2017-2022 TIP, as amended in March 2017
 - Will be updated to the FY 2020 STIP following approval of the TPB's FY 2019-2024 TIP






Virginia Uses Performance Based Planning to Select Projects for Funding

- Plans / Funding Programs
 - VTRANS (State Plan) >>> Smart Scale, State and Federal Funds
 - TransAction (NVTA Regional Plan) >>> Six Year Plan
- Other Major Sources:
 - Local Government Capital Improvements Programs
 - Proffers: infrastructure funded by developers
 - CMAQ, RSTP, HSIP
 - Toll revenues
 - Private funds from HOT lanes concessionaires
 - WMATA agreement

- Commonwealth Six Year Improvement Program
 - Summarizes planned expenditures for VDOT and DRPT
 - Updated annually; two public meetings a year to get preliminary input on projects and to comment on final draft plan



- Smart Scale was established by Virginia General Assembly in 2014
- Process used to prioritize projects for Virginia's Six Year Program (SYIP)
- Number of applications evaluated (statewide):
 - FY 17 287 applications
 - FY 18 404 applications

Fiscal Year	Total Funding	NoVA Projects	NoVA Funding
FY 2017	\$1.42 billion	18	\$223 million
FY 2018	\$1.03 billion	21	\$367 million
FY 2020	\approx \$0.8 billion		

- Final application due date August 1, 2018
- New funding will be added to FY 24 and FY 25 in the FY 2020-2025 Six Year Program

- Smart Scale uses Objective Quantitative Performance Scoring to Allocate Transportation Funding
 - (Category A- Large Urban Districts)

Factor	Weight	
Congestion Mitigation	45%	
Land Use	20%	
Accessibility	15%	
Environmental Quality	10%	
Safety	5%	
Economic Development	5%



Project Selection & Funding for WMATA

FY 19 Capital Budget and FY 2019-2024 CIP

- Approved March 2018
- Included in TPB's FY 2017-2022 TIP as amended, and draft FY 2019-2024 TIP
- Virginia dedicated funding begins

FY 20 Capital Budget and FY 2020-2025 CIP

- General Manager's draft budget will be submitted to WMATA Board in December 2018
- Public hearing and outreach opportunities January February 2019
- Will be submitted to TPB as an amendment to the FY 2019-2024 TIP in Spring 2019
- District and Maryland dedicated funding begins

Performance-Based Planning & Programming

- Performance-Based Planning and Programming (PBPP)
 - Introduced as law for DOTs and MPOs under MAP-21 and continued under the FAST Act
 - Improved outcomes: investment decision making, return on investments, system performance, accountability and transparency
 - Demonstrates link between funding and performance
 - Cooperation/coordination between DOTs and MPOs
 - Documentation and feedback mechanisms
 - Public and stakeholder involvement

Performance-Based Planning & Programming

Performance Measures

- FY 2019-2024 TIP will serve as a baseline for the following performance measures:
 - Safety
 - Highway Traffic fatalities, serious injuries
 - Transit Fatalities and injuries, derailments, collisions, fires, evacuations
 - Infrastructure (Asset) Condition
 - Highway Pavement and bridges
 - Transit Revenue vehicles, non-revenue equipment, track infrastructure, and facilities/stations

Performance-Based Planning & Programming

Performance Measures (continued)

- Congestion Reduction
 - Highway Excessive delay per capita, percent non-SOV travel,
 Infrastructure (Asset) Condition
- System Reliability
 - Highway Reliable travel times
 - Transit Major/other mechanical system failures
- Freight Movement and Economic Vitality
 - Highway Reliable truck travel times
- Environmental Sustainability
 - Highway Percent change in tailpipe CO₂ emissions,
 CMAQ program emissions reduced



Next Steps for the FY 2019-2024 TIP

- Release for 30-day public comment period along with Visualize 2045 September 7 – October 7
- Approval by TPB on October 17, 2018
- Amended as requested by DDOT, MDOT, VDOT and WMATA
