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




## CBP Organization Aligned with Strategic Goals








### E.O. 13508: Chesapeake Bay **Protection and Restoration**

- Signed by **President Obama** May 12, 2009
- Creates Federal Leadership Committee (FLC) to oversee development and coordination of agencies' reporting, data management and other programs and activities to restore the Bay
- Federal agencies must submit 7 reports to FLC (draft by September 2009; final by November 2009) detailing recommendations and next steps
- FLC must develop strategy (draft by November 2009; final by May 2010) for coordinated implementation of existing programs and projects to guide efforts to protect and restore the Chesapeake Bay
- Federal agencies must consult with 7 Bay jurisdictions, stakeholders and public
- FLC will publish annual Chesapeake Action Plan describing how Federal funding will be used for Bay restoration in the coming year as well as annual progress report
- To strengthen accountability, **independent evaluator** will periodically report to FLC on progress toward E.O. goals




#### **Purposes of Implementation Plans**

- Provide <u>demonstration of reasonable assurance</u> that jurisdictions will achieve waste load and load allocations specified in the Chesapeake Bay TMDL
- Roll up into TMDL allocations
- Provide <u>greater detail</u> than the Bay TMDL report and remain <u>more flexible</u>, supporting <u>adaptive</u> <u>management</u> framework
- Implement <u>Executive Order</u> recommendations and strategies

### Implementation Plans Will Contain:

- Necessary controls to achieve Bay TMDL loads from all sources, by county and CBP segment-shed
- Documentation of existing program capacity
- Schedule and commitment to fill gaps:
  - Stage 1: Detailed description of implementation mechanisms
  - Stage 2: Identify implementation mechanisms that jurisdictions will pursue
- Mechanisms to ensure implementation: inspections, enforcement, etc.
- System for tracking, reporting and quantifying progress
- Either WLAs and LAs for future growth or process for offsetting future growth in loads
- Contingencies for slow or failed implementation
