- CEEPC's Legislative Committee is a small group of CEEPC members who periodically meet with staff to review legislative initiatives in D.C., Maryland, and Virginia
- COG staff track various bills during the legislative session that fall within COG's legislative priorities
- A series of ad hoc calls are held to determine specific bills to send comment letters on
- The committee primarily runs from January April



COG Board Legislative Priorities

The COG Board adopts <u>legislative priorities</u> every year in January covering:

- Transportation Funding
- Housing
- Environment: Water Quality, Climate Resiliency, Air Quality
- Human Services
- Public Health Preparedness
- Homeland Security
- Food Security
- Infrastructure Investment

- Expand Clean Energy Innovation, Technology and Finance
- Support Aggressive Energy Efficiency Goals
- Enhance Incentives and Financing Mechanisms for Resilient Infrastructure
- Support Policies that Preserve and Protect Regional Air Quality and Public Health

Virginia Legislation

State Air Pollution Control Board

 A series of bills seek to repeal the requirement that the State Air Pollution Control Board implement a low-emissions and zeroemissions vehicle program for motor vehicles.

Green Finance

 A few bills seek to establish sources or funding for GHG-reducing projects or clean energy technology deployment.

Data Centers

 Several bills seek to require data center operators to meet certain energy efficiency standards. Bills have also been introduced to require site assessments to examine the effect of data centers on water usage and carbon emissions, etc.



Maryland Legislation

Energy Efficiency / Building Performance Standards

 Legislation would require new buildings and significant improvements of buildings and structures to meet water and space heating demands without the use of fossil fuels, meet energy conservation requirements, and meet an electric- and solar-ready standard.

Green Finance

 Like Virginia, there are a handful of bills in Maryland seeking to establish funds for green infrastructure and clean energy technology deployment.



District of Columbia Legislation

EV Infrastructure

Legislation would expand the District's Electric Vehicle Charging Station Pilot Program to deploy EV charging stations in areas lacking EV infrastructure. It would also require DDOT to create an Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Deployment and Management Plan in 2024 to aid in assessing the electric grid's readiness and resiliency for EV charging.

EJ / Equity

 Legislation would establish a "cumulative impact statement" process that must be completed to obtain District permits and other relief for environmentally harmful actions in overburdened communities.
