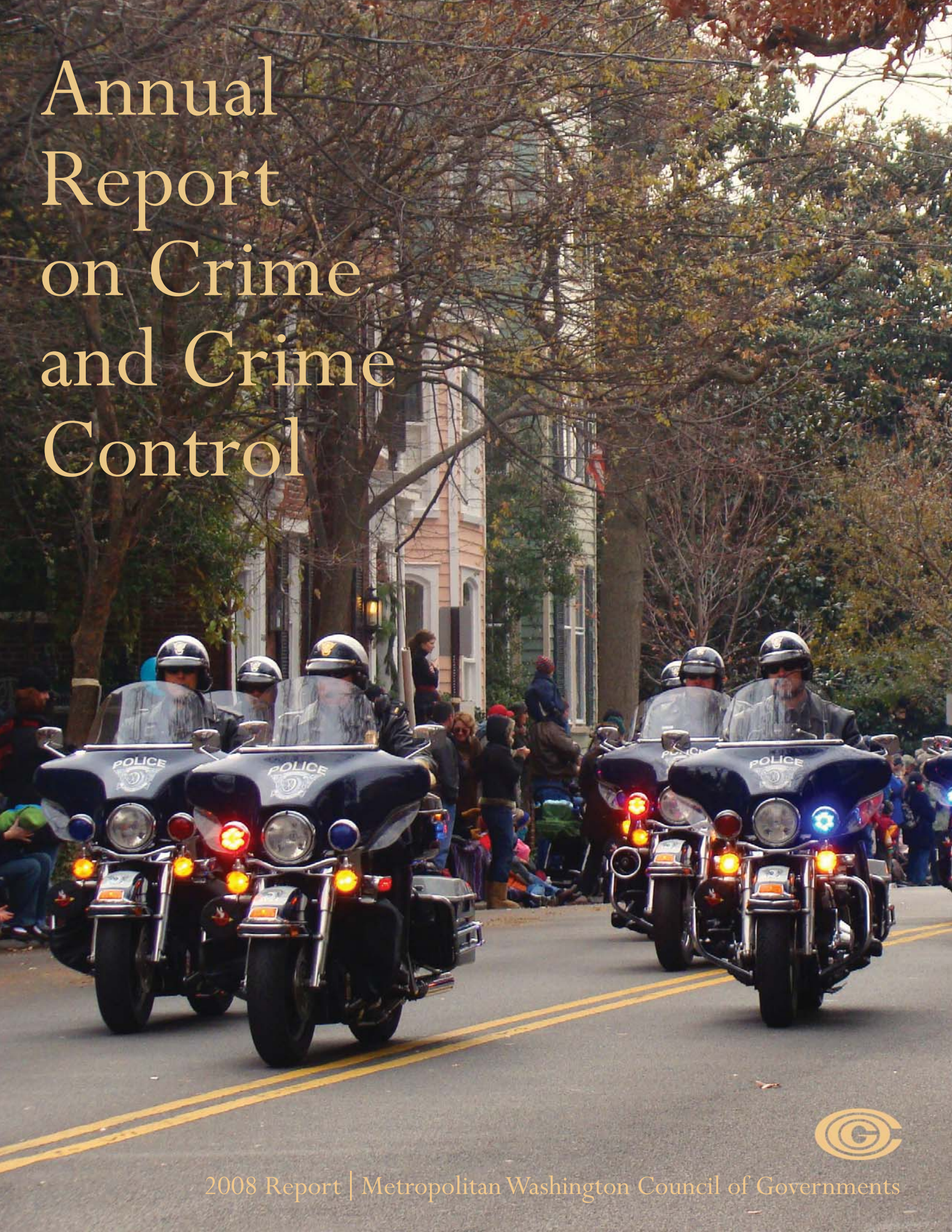


# Annual Report on Crime and Crime Control





# Overview


The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments' (MWCOCG) Annual Report on Crime is based on crime incidents reported by participating agencies in the National Capital Region (NCR). The 2008 COG Report on Crime and Crime Control focuses on Part I Offenses, including the more serious or violent crime categories: homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft.

Based on the crime statistics submitted by the participating agencies, there was an overall increase in Part I Offenses by 2.2% from 2007 to 2008, with 155,934 crimes reported in 2008 compared to 152,584 reported in 2007. Total offenses decreased in the majority of Part I categories including homicides (-2.1%), rapes (-4.1%), robberies (-1.3%), and aggravated assaults (->1%), with a significant decrease in motor vehicle thefts (-15.1%). A regional increase was seen

in burglaries (3.6%) and larcenies (7.4%). Property crimes make up 87.09% of all Part I crimes reported in the NCR.

Further analysis of Part 1 Offenses reveals an overall decrease of 1% in the total number of violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) reported in 2008, compared to the same categories reported in 2007. Property crimes, which include burglaries, larcenies, and motor vehicle thefts, increased slightly, 2.8% overall. In 2008, there was a 1.9% increase in calls for service, 3,543,034, up from 3,477,040 calls in 2007.

In evaluating NCR Part I crime data from 2004 to 2008, there continues to be an overall downward trend in homicides, rapes, aggravated assaults and motor vehicle thefts. However, the total number of reported burglaries and larcenies continue in an upward trend.



In summary, the total number of Part I offenses increased by 2.3% in 2008 compared with data reported in 2007. This can be attributed to the 3.6% increase in burglaries and the 7.4% increase in larcenies, noted earlier. While the overall decline in incidents related to the most serious violent crimes continues to be promising, over 87% of all crimes reported involve the loss of property, affecting thousands of area residents and business owners annually. In light of the economic downturn, elected officials and law enforcement agencies will continue to face significant challenges in the battle to reduce and deter property crime. New technology has led to the proliferation of very expensive, portable devices that are highly accessible to the criminal element. GPS units, iPhones, and iPods left in parked vehicles for instance, create rich opportunities for crime and victimization.

Crime is not isolated within or limited to specific jurisdictional boundaries and therefore, information-sharing among area law enforcement agencies will continue to serve a crucial role in the development of new strategies and initiatives needed to effectively reduce crimes of opportunity. Communities and business districts, in partnership with law enforcement agencies, must also become involved and take an active role in crime control by ensuring that even the most basic crime prevention strategies are employed. These strategies include contacting their local law enforcement agency when suspicious activity is observed, removing valuables from vehicles, locking car doors, homes and businesses, and using effective alarm systems to deter intrusion and reduce the opportunity for crime to occur.

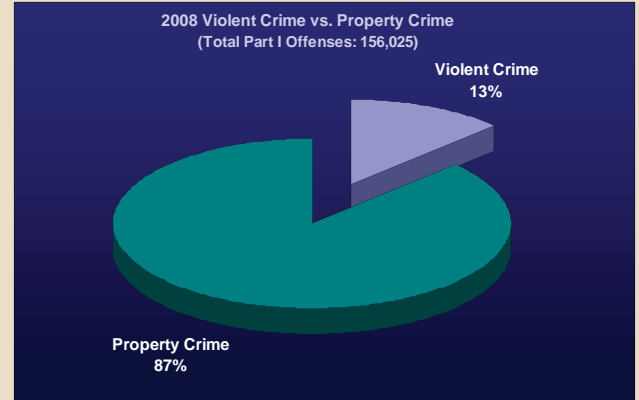
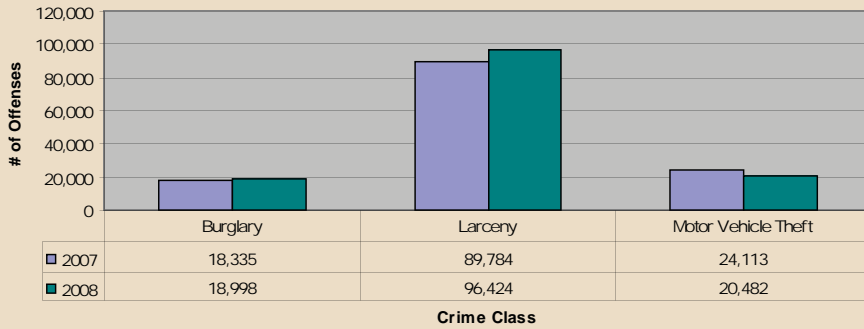

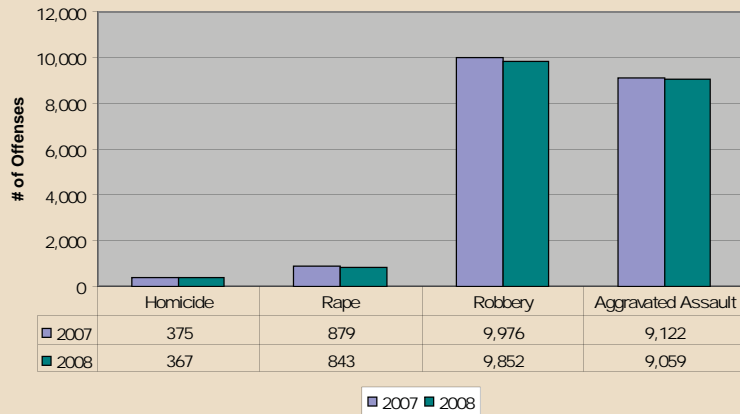


# Crime Trends

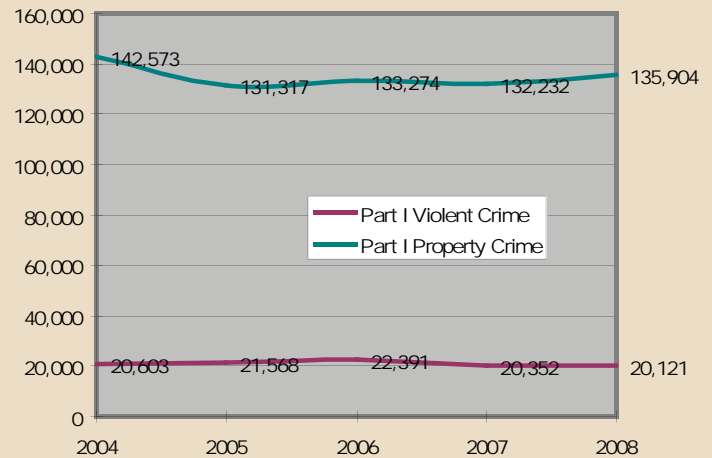
Property Crime 2007 vs. 2008

It must be noted that reporting methods are not uniform throughout this report since some departments used the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) while others used the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). Recognizing the need for additional information about crime, the FBI launched NIBRS as an enhanced UCR Program. The FBI recognized that conversion to the new system would be gradual, so it is appropriate for agencies to still report under UCR. As a general rule, NIBRS crime rates tend to be higher than UCR rates, primarily because NIBRS statistically counts all separate violations within a single criminal event. UCR counts only the most serious crime. The average difference, however, is small.

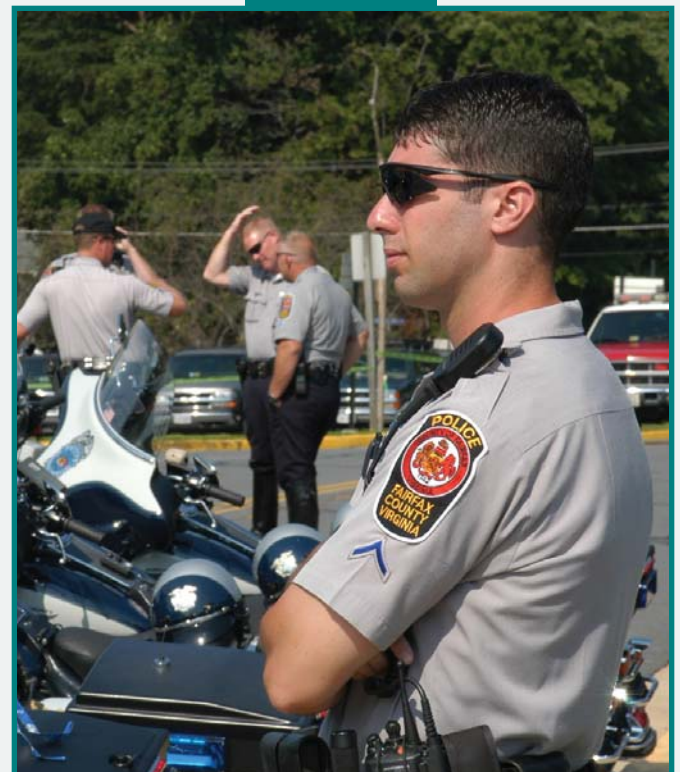
