1:15 - Brian Knox - Urban Hardwood Value Improvement Project

The Hardwood Value Improvement Project (HVIP) is a training program that integrates field, classroom and computer simulation techniques, developed by Dr. The goal of HVIP is to increase the value and quality of hardwood logs in the eastern hardwood region by improving the log bucking skills of loggers and yard workers. The HVIP training program was funded by U.S. Forest Service's Wood Education Resource Center.

1:45 - Dan Rider - MDNR Forest Service - Forest Products Utilization & Marketing Mr. Rider will briefly discuss several recent, current, and future projects of the Maryland Forest Service enhancing forest stewardship and improving wood utilization. He will discuss the marketing challenges of portable sawmills, the success and failure of the Working Woodlot Initiative, wood-to-energy opportunities, and the promises (and challenges) of green labeling wood products.

John Ackerly - Alliance for Green Heat: A nonprofit organization that develops programs and initiatives to facilitate using urban, suburban and small town wood waste for energy production and heating to serve low-income residents.

Stephen Bratkovich - Dovetail Partners, Inc.

Marcus Simms - Treincarnation - uses only 'salvage' logs to honor and value the trees while creating beautiful pieces custom designed for my clients. The logs salvaged died a natural death in the forest, were blown over in a storm or struck by lightning.

Don Outen – Baltimore County: Baltimore County is working with federal and State agencies and consultants to evaluate the potential to use urban waste wood from tree trimming operations for heating, cooling, and providing energy for County buildings.
